THE GREATEST MISFORTUNE TO befall the Golden Eagles was National Collegiate Athletic Association ineligibility ruling against stars John (Scotty) Moore and Walt Kempka.

Moore and Kempka were among a group of collegiate stars from New York State who played for an amateur team on Long Island this summer. The team management told the players their participation had been approved by the NCAA. It hadn't been.

"The NCAA declared all 20 athletes ineligible for the fall season," Hughes said. "The players were misguided and technically wrong, but the punishment was too severe."

Moore, who has scored 25 goals for Brockport the past two seasons, was voted the fourth best collegiate soccer player in the nation last year. Kempka was expected

to fill the vital center-fullback, or "sweeper," position in the Golden Eagles' attack.

"The absence of Moore and Kempka makes us far less explosive offensively," Hughes admitted. "We'll have to rely more on our defense."

ALAIN MACA AND GARY BARONE the core of last year's defense, have graduated to the North American Soccer League. Sophomore Bob Garcia, an attacker last fall, has shifted to defense and former Monroe Community College standout Guy Pixley has replaced Maca. Jim May, a junior college All-American, and returnee John Amente give Hughes a solid one-two punch in goal.

Wayne Central grad Tom Gentile, who complemented Moore so well on the forward line last fall, is the big gun on offense. John Peers, a 5-5, 135-pounder from Brockport High, is a hope for the future. His teammates call him Super Rookie.

The Golden Eagles are 2-0 so far this season, with easy victories over New York Institute of Technology and Binghamton State. The first big test is this Saturday (1 p.m.) in the annual Homecoming Game against powerful Akron University.

"If we had all of our people eligible I'd rate us favorites," Hughes said of the Akron showdown. "But we don't.

"I spent three years building what I hoped would be a super team this fall," Hughes said. "The players to have a great squad are all right here, but too many aren't eligible. We'll be extremely strong next year—but I haven't thrown in the towel yet this fall."

Brockport State is the defending NCAA Atlantic Coast Conference champion. With Moore and Kempka the Golden Eagles would be a good bet to repeat that title. Without them, a 9-3 season would be a realistic goal to strive for.

Favorable Ruling for Brockport

The Eastern College Athletic Conference yesterday rescinded an eligibility ruling against Brockport State soccer stars John (Scotty) Moore and Walt Kempka.

Moore and Kempka were among 20 collegiate soccer stars who participated in a non-approved summer soccer league on Long Island and were ruled ineligible by the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

The players appeared before the ECAC's eligibility committee Wednesday, and the committee rescinded the ineligibility decision yesterday. The body then notified NCAA headquarters in Kansas City, Mo.

Mo.

"We are hopeful that the NCAA will lift the ineligibility ruling in time for Moore and Kempka to play next game," Brockport coach Bill Hughes said last night.

Brockport plays host to Akron University at 1 p.m. to-morrow.

Akron University, ranked 18th in the nation, snapped a tie on a breakaway goal with three minutes to play to defeat Brockport State, 3-2, in college soccer yesterday at Brockport.

The Golden Eagles, playing without stars John (Scotty) Moore and Walt Kempka, outshot the victors, 25-14, in the foul-filled game. Fifty fouls were called, with 37 on Akron and 13 on Brockport. Three players, two from Akron, were ejected for fighting.

"It was a rugged game, and I think we'd have won it with Moore and Kempka," Brockport coach Bill Hughes said after his team's first loss in four starts.

The Eastern College Athletic Conference has rescinded an ineligibility ruling against Moore and Kempka, and Hughes is waiting National Collegiate Athletic Association approval before he lets them play.

Nasrah Farrouke broke a scoreless tie with Akron's first goal at 15:04 of the first half. Robert Smith scored 73 seconds later to give Akron a 2-0 advantage, but Bill Mikolenko scored to cut Brockport's deficit to one goal at halftime.

Brockport captian Bill McLean tied the game with an unassisted goal with seven minutes left in the game, but Eugene Alfrett picked up a loose ball off a Brockport defender and drove in to score the game-winner for unbeaten Akron, now 3-0.


