Wayne Central's 1973 soccer team goes on display tomorrow night (Friday, September 14) at 8:00 p.m. under the lights when Clarence Mephram and his strong Brighton Barons make their annual visit to Ontario. Brighton lost in the sectional finals in Class A last year while Wayne fell in the Class B semi-finals. In their annual game last year Wayne and Brighton played to a one to one tie in double overtime.

Wayne has great potential and should have a great team this year, but injuries in key positions could prove disastrous. They have quality but not much depth as only 20 boys came out for the team. They do have some fine boys on the J.V.'s they could call up in an emergency, but Coach Imhoff wants them to get experience by playing rather than riding the bench for the varsity.

No one likes to be too optimistic, but to me this could be one of Wayne's greatest teams. Nine of last years eleven starters are back and four of them were county all-stars. In Rex Judd, an all-star last year, Wayne has probably the finest goalie in Section V. Rex has great hands, good range, is a good kicker and has no fear. If he can keep off the injury list, Wayne is sure to score several shut-outs even through the defense in front of him may not be as strong as last year. He must stay healthy as the back-up goalie, Bob Van Hoover is already out with an injury. Last year's great line of Chris Collins, Jim Kelly, Rick Lang and Bob Heut is still intact and should be the country's "fearsome four". Chris and Jimm Kelley were county all-stars last year. Billy Reynolds has looked good in practice and will be a good replacement when one of the boys needs a rest.

If there is a weak spot, it is on the defensive line where two fine fullbacks, Craig Osterhout and John Blind, have graduated. To strengthen this position, Coach Imhoff is starting with four fullbacks instead of three as in previous years. This leaves only two halfbacks or a four-two-four formation. With halfbacks like Glen Cone and Billy Drexler, two is all you need. These are two of the most talented and aggressive players you'll find anywhere. Glen was a little prone to injury last year but if he stays healthy, don't worry about these boys getting the ball up field to the line.

Gerry Nagel is the only veteran returning in the backfield, but Jim Mitchell, who did a fine job as a half-back last year, will be a good replacement. Jeff Donofrio, Phil Hyland and Kevin Schultz, who saw some action last year along with Don Marvin, up from the J.V.'s, will probably battle it out for the other two positions.

Wayne will battle North Rose-Wolcott, Sodus, Williamson and Pal-Mac for the "B" crown and Marion and Red Creek, two "C" schools, in defense of the overall championship they won last year.

They will be aiming for their 12th consecutive "B" title. Red Creek and North Rose Wolcott seem to have the best chance of dethroning Wayne as county champ. Clyde-Savannah, a cellar-dweller for the last several years, has dropped soccer.

Wayne will have five night home games this year and one away at Marion. Next week Wayne will play at Pal-Mac on Tuesday in the league opener and Williamson will be at Wayne under the lights on Friday night.

The extra night games will give the students and soccer fans a chance to see more games. With the new split sessions in school, many students will be gone home and others won't get out until after 5:30 p.m. Here's a chance to show your appreciation by attending tomorrow (Friday) nights game and seeing Wayne's fine team in action. The team and the school need your support.

The J.V.'s, once again under the guidance of Ron Leszyk, should also have a fine team. With boys like Brian Ameele, Tom Buchiere, Roy Lang, Dave Gordon, Keith English and several others back from last years team, along with some fine freshmen, they should do very well. When the varsity plays at night, the J.V. games will start at 6:30 on the varsity field, so come a little early and help cheer the boys on. They will be playing Brighton's J.V.'s at 5:30 p.m. tomorrow night, and play Pal-Mac at 4:00 at home on September 18, and Williamson at home beginning at 6:30 on September 21.

Wayne Central lost their first soccer game of the season under the lights last Friday night when they dropped a hard fought four to three decision to the undefeated Red Creek team. This was the fourth night game of the season at Wayne and each time a fine crowd has been on hand. It's a shame these crowds have to watch these fine teams play under such terrible lighting conditions. It's almost impossible to identify the players on the opposite side of the field and many of us go home with headaches from looking into the lights which are so close to the ground. It also must be very hard for the players to judge balls in semi-darkness. Wayne's last goal last Friday night was probably scored because of insufficient lighting while earlier they were denied a goal because the referee couldn't see it from over the line at all.

In the past few years Wayne Central has lost over \$10,000 to the community that owns the portable lighting system. But Wayne put in their own system when they learned they would have had to pay for the lights and over \$500 per night, but the games are not only self-supporting, the school has made a profit. The trouble is the electricity costs probably \$50 a night, so \$100 is actually wasted.

Why have night games? With the extended school day, many students go home at noon while others are in school until after 5:00 p.m. This not only gives them a chance to see the games but parents, friends and soccer fans who work get the chance to see their sons and school in action. Even though the admission price is high (\$1.50) an average of well over 200 paid adults have attended the games. With a lighting system of their own, the admission could probably be cut in half.

Marion put in their own lighting system last year at a cost of approximately \$17,000. It is beautiful. The field is as light as day. A booster club raised the money and I think are being paid back by a percentage of each games receipts. Newark is putting in lights this year with a house to house canvas and a fund drive. Palmyra did the same thing two years ago. Why should Wayne always have to be last?

These lights would not only be used for soccer but could have many alternatives. Marion has theirs inside their track meets. Naturally it would be available for girls soccer at night. It is possible the soccer field could be moved to the baseball field which would allow for night baseball, not only for the school but possibly for little league and Legion ball. With the large classes that are now graduating, possible graduation could be held under the lights allowing more people to attend. There are many possibilities.

I do not feel this should come out of the budget even though it would be a good investment.
