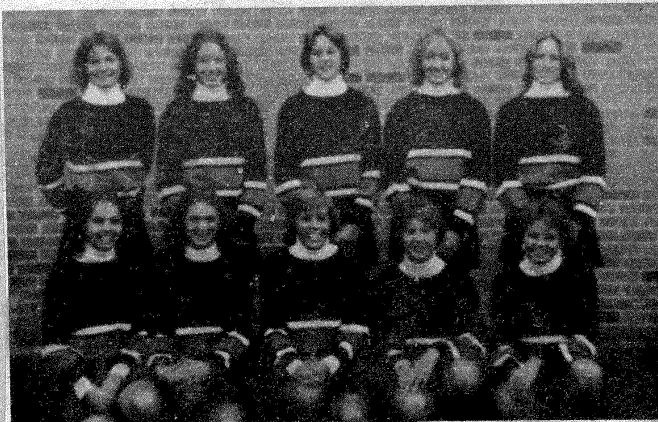

Because Wayne County schools agreed to allow soccer practice a week earlier this year, Wayne's soccer team will open their season next Tuesday, September 13. The girls varsity and junior varsity will beat North Rose-Wolcott at 4 p.m., and the boys will open at home under the lights against Fairport. The junior varsity will take the field at 6:30 p.m. and the varsity at 8 p.m.

Coach Charles Imhoff and 32 players attended camp in Pennsylvania last week, where Wayne's "A" team was undefeated in scrimmage games and the J.V.s lost just once. "Chuck" was impressed, both with his players and with the camp, which specialized in team play rather than in individual positions, as in other years.

Some of the boys who went to camp and you can expect to see on the varsity this year are Tim Reynolds, Tom Miller, Gary Aman, Dave and Mark Metcalfe, Tyke and Dino Morrill, Greg Alexander, Chris Wheeler, Bryan Tallie, J.P. DeLass, Dave Dennison, Tim Doyle, Chris East, Dave Pixley, Mike Corney, Dean Loucks, Bob Hemmerick, Joe Zakowicz, Greg Ott, Guy VanHoover and Randy Lederman.

Coach Imhoff lost seven regulars by graduation last spring, but because he substitutes freely and has some good players coming up from last year's junior varsity, things don't look that bad, and by the end of the year Wayne should have their 17th consecutive county "B" championship. Gone from last year's team are goalie Jim Gardner, linesmen Jim Pick and Craig Hofmann (Wayne's two top scorers) and backs Bob Reynolds, Tom Cooman and "Chuck" Deichmiller.

Besides the boys who went to camp, a few other boys will be trying out for the team, including two exchange students from Germany who reportedly have had quite a bit of experience. One plays on the line and the other has played three years in goal, which is one of the spots where Wayne needs help if they are to be contenders this year. He will probably be battling Gregg Ott and Tim Kotvis for that position.

With practice just starting, nothing is certain, so I am only mentioning names to give you a little idea of what to expect. Four boys who had a lot of playing time and looked good last year on the line and could do much of Wayne's scoring this year are Mike Corney, Tim Reynolds, Jeff Pick and Chris Wheeler. Between them they scored 29 points (goals and assists) for Wayne last year. Tom Miller and Dave Metcalfe did an excellent job as mid-fielders as sophomores last year and should be much improved. Greg Alexander will be the only experienced player at fullback, but Bryan Tallie, Gary Aman, Bob Hemmerick and J. P. DeLass should be able to fill in very well.

Tyke and Dino Morrill, Tim Doyle, Chris East, Dave Dennison, the other exchange student and some of the boys who did not go to camp all have good chances of breaking into the starting lineup. Many of these boys played in the tough Rochester and District Soccer League this summer against older players, many of whom were college players, and did an outstanding job. In my humble opinion, look for another fine Wayne Central soccer team this year.

The girls soccer team faces a big rebuilding job this year after losing players like Terry Febrey, Joann Dana, Lauri Granger, Lisa Hyatt, June Horning and others, but Coach Pat Yates has been practicing daily with a large squad and, with several backs and last year's fine goalie, Sue Fekishazy, back, Mrs. Yates should come up with a good representative team for Wayne.

I haven't had a chance to talk with Miss Comstock, coach of the girls tennis team, but I'm sure she lost some good players by graduation. Her team has won the county championship the last two years and opens their season next Thursday, September 15, so I hope to have some information by then.

Don't forget the big game with Fairport next Tuesday night. Wayne has won the past two years, but Fairport is a big school with fine teams. Let's get the team off to a good start with a good crowd.

Except for the cross country team, all of Wayne Central's varsity and junior varsity teams will see action this week, but only the girls' teams will begin league play. The girls varsity and junior varsity soccer teams were scheduled to open the fall season with games at North Rose-Wolcott at 4 p.m. on Tuesday. That same evening, at 6:30 and 8 p.m., the boys soccer teams were to have played exhibition games with Fairport at home under the lights.

This afternoon (Thursday at 4 p.m.), Miss Comstock's tennis team will begin the defense of their county championship by playing North Rose-Wolcott at home.

Tomorrow and Saturday, the girls soccer team is in a tournament at Webster with Webster Thomas, Webster Schroeder and Penfield. Two games will be at 4 p.m. tomorrow afternoon, with the losers playing at 10 Saturday morning, followed by the championship game.

The boys also have a big weekend, taking on Brighton tomorrow night at 8 and Greece Athena at the same time on Saturday. In the preliminary at 6:30 tomorrow night, North Rose-Wolcott will tangle with Greece and then will lock horns with Brighton at the same time on Saturday.

Next Monday, September 19, the girls tennis team will be at Marion at 4 p.m. while the girls soccer teams will try their luck against Marion at home under the lights at 6 and 7:30 p.m.

On Wednesday, September 21,

the girls soccer team is at Red Creek at 4 p.m., while the Wayne boys soccer teams will host Sodus at 6:30 and 8 p.m. The junior high team opens their season that same day when they travel to Sodus for a 4 p.m. game. The girls tennis team is at home against Sodus on Thursday.

Coach Comstock had over 20 girls out for the tennis team, which she cut to 12 last Friday. The following girls will be representing Wayne for the 1977 season: seniors Robin Lasch, Lori Youngman, Karen Coffman and Jean Simpson, juniors Diane Schmitt and Peggy Tobin, and sophomores Linda Fuller, Terry Jeffers, Pam Brown, Betsy Dixon, Tammy Lasch and Kim Schwock.

Lost by graduation from last year's championship team were both singles players, Kathy Suhr and Patti Corcoran, and one doubles team, Kathy Arnold and Lynne Loomis. The other doubles team of Lori Youngman and Robin Lasch is rereturning, but they could be playing singles this year. Terry Jeffers, Pam Brown, Linda Fuller and Betsy Dixon all saw action in exhibition matches last year.

Besides the matches mentioned above, the rest of their schedule is as follows: September 26, Wayne at Lyons; September 28, Pal-Mac at Wayne; September 29, Wayne at North Rose-Wolcott; October 3, Marion at Wayne; October 5, Wayne at Sodus; October 6, Lyons at Wayne; and October 11, Wayne at Pal-Mac. Coach Com-

stock thinks Lyons could be the team to beat as they have both singles players returning.

The boys soccer team played the alumni in a controlled scrimmage game last Friday night. They held the graduates to a 0-0 tie after four a 30 minute half before bowing 2-0 after one hour. After four halves the alumni came out on top, 5-4. After this weekend we should know what kind of a team we will have for the 1977 season.

Coach Pat Yates has a young, rather inexperienced, girls varsity soccer squad this year. Of the 21 girls on the squad, only seven are seniors and not too many of those were starting last year. Seven sophomores and seven juniors make up the rest of the team. Team members are Mary Beth McClellan, Jeanine Van Hoover, Dona Nursinger, Theresa Scott, Kim Burns, Shelly Benton, Andrea Whitcomb, Dawn Zakowicz, Kathy Doyle, Janet Dutcher, Lisa Spencer, Kathy Sobie, Cindy Vaks, Jenny McTigue, Cindy Imhoff, Cindy Granger, Debbie Buyze, Molly Perry, Mary Barnes, Mary Ann Updew and Sue Fekishazy. This looks like a rebuilding year for Coach Yates, but they might surprise you as there are many fine athletes on this squad.

First year coach Nancy Anderson had 22 girls out for their team and expects to keep them all. She has her job cut out for her, also, as many of last year's J.V.'s moved up to the varsity.

Good luck to all the Wayne teams as they start the fall sports season.

Even though rain dampened things a bit and caused the cancellation of one game, Wayne's first week of sports was a very successful one. Five Wayne teams won six of eight contests, with only the girls varsity soccer team losing, and then their two losses were only by a goal in each case.

The defending county champions, the girls tennis team, edged North Rose—Wolcott 3 to 2 at home, while the perennial county champions, the boys soccer team, looked very impressive by outplaying two strong Monroe County teams, Fairport 5—2 and usually powerful Brighton 4—1.

The girls J.V. soccer team, with new coach Nancy Anderson, one of Wayne's former soccer stars, and an almost completely new team, rolled over NRW 8—2 on three goals by Julie Hill.

Tommy Gentile's surprising J.V. boys team crushed a weak Fairport team 11—0 as Kevin Taillie, out for soccer for the first time, poured in six goals, and freshman Bill Shay had the three goal "hat-trick."

The girls varsity soccer team, with several sophomores in the starting lineup, lost a tough 6—4 league game at North Rose on Tuesday and split two games at the Webster tournament on Friday and Saturday, losing to Webster Thomas 2—0 and beating Webster Schroeder 6—2.

In the girls tennis match with NRW, Robin Lasch lost to Ginny Weber in first singles 10 to 5, but Diane Schmitt took Terry Weber 10—3 in second singles and Lori Youngman easily defeated Leila Nohadari 10—0 in third singles to give Wayne a 2—1 edge in the match. After Terry Jeffers and Linda Fuller dropped a 10—5 decision to Kathy Baries and Mel Adams in first doubles to tie the match at 2—all, Peggy Tobin and Pam Brown defeated Dawn Bowen and Bonnie Wright 10 in second singles to give Wayne the match by a 3 to 2 score. Jean Simpson and Tammy Lasch won 10—2 in an exhibition match.

A third singles has been added this year, which will allow more girls to play and do away with tie matches. Captains of this year's team are Robin Lasch and Jean Simpson, and the managers are Sharri Brown, Sharon Doyle and Amy Peterson.

***** At North Rose on Tuesday afternoon, the girls varsity soccer team held a 2—0 lead at halftime on a goal by Mary Barnes, but a four—minute letdown after the second half opened allowed NRW to score three times and give them a 6—2 lead (each goal counts two points in girls' games). Kathy Doyle's goal made it 6—4, but the girls couldn't make up for their short lapse and lost it by that score. Donna Nersinger played a great game on defense and Molly Perry stopped a North Rose penalty kick.

Meanwhile, the J.V. girls took a 6—0 halftime lead and increased it to 8—0 on three goals by Julie Hill and one by Sue Smith before NRW scored late in the fourth period.

***** In the pouring rain on Friday afternoon, the Wayne varsity lost to Webster Thomas 2—0 in the Webster tournament, while Penfield turned back Webster Schroeder. In the consolation game on Saturday morning, the Wayne girls picked up their first win of the season by downing Schroeder 6—2. They held a 4—2 lead at halftime on goals by Janet Dutcher and Kathy Doyle, and held the Webster team scoreless in the second half while adding a goal by Cindy Granger.

***** In that first game of the double header on Tuesday night, Tom Gentile's J.V.'s put on a fine exhibition of soccer although Fairport didn't appear to be too strong. Their passing was sharp and accurate, they had good teamwork, they hustled the whole game and their defense was good, with Gary Kotvis in goal and Mike Tyner booting the long ball, and what's more, they scored — 11 times.

They built up a 5—0 halftime lead as young Bill Shay scored twice and Kevin Taillie found the range three times. After a scoreless third quarter, they blitzed Fairport with six more goals, with Kevin getting three more, Billy one and one each by Dave Pixley and Tom Kroger, the exchange student from Germany.

Coach Gentile gave all of his boys plenty of playing time as he emptied the bench. Besides the boys mentioned above, Dean Loucks played a fine all—around game. Don't expect this kind of an effort from these boys every game, but they do have some fine talent.

In the second game, in the pouring rain, Fairport took a 1—0 lead on a hard shot from in front of the goal on which goalie Gregg Ott had no chance. Wayne dominated the rest of the quarter and even the score at 1—1 at the 13:10 mark when Tom Miller and Dave Metcalfe got the ball to Mike Corney in front of the net and he drove a hard shot into the right hand corner from 10 yards out.

Wayne failed to score in the second quarter but they continued to control the game until they went a little flat in the third period and Fairport took a 2—1 lead. Towards the end of the period Wayne came back strong and Jeff Pick tied the score at 2—all, with the assist going to Mike Corney, with 10 seconds left in the quarter.

The fourth quarter was all Wayne as they completely dominated the game. Ten seconds after the period started Pick got his second goal on a cross from Chris Wheeler. At the 12 minute mark Tim Doyle put the game on ice with Dave Dennison assisting on the play. The final goal came with one second left when Tim Reynolds scored an unassisted goal.

The games between NRW and Greece Athena and Wayne and Brighton on Friday night were postponed because of the wet conditions and were played Saturday, with the Saturday night games between NRW and Brighton and Wayne and Greece Athena being postponed indefinitely.

The game between Greece and NRW on Saturday night was a

defensive battle with the only score coming late in the third period on a questionable penalty kick. Neither team showed too much offense, but NRW outplayed the city team most of the way. The goalie for Greece kept them in the game. North Rose is strong in mid—field.

The Wayne varsity played an excellent game against Brighton. Having been beaten by Brighton the last two years, Wayne took a 4—0 lead before Brighton scored with less than four minutes to go.

Wayne scored the 14:55 mark of the first period when Chris Wheeler picked up the ball just past mid—field, dribbled down the left Sideline and dribbled a hard shot from the far corner of the penalty area into the right hand corner of the net. They made it 2—0 with 50 seconds left in the period when J. P. DeLass took a throw—in and passed it to Mike Corney, who hit that same corner of the net from 15 yards out.

Tim Reynolds gave Wayne a 3—0 lead 12:44 into the second period when Dave Metcalfe booted the ball up the center of the field and Tim outraced the

goalie to the ball to score.

There was no score in the third period even though Wayne threatened several times. Twice Wayne hit the crossbar and the Brighton goalie just got a hand on Mike Corney's hard shot from in front of the goal to tip it over the bar.

Titus Stephens wrapped up Wayne's scoring eight minutes into the fourth quarter on a shot in close in front of the goal with J.P. DeLass getting his second assist of the game.

Brighton scored with 3:40 left in the game when Wayne's fourth goalie of the game took too many steps and the Barons scored on a short indirect kick into the top of the net.

This was an excellent team effort. Everyone played and everybody hustled, passed well and played great defense. Six different players have scored in the two games and Tyke Morrill and Ken Hawkins just missed by inches. The starting defense of Bryan Taillie, Gary Aman and Bob Hemmerick, with Gregg Ott in goal, have looked great and, what's more, are only juniors and will be back next year. Everyone is optimistic about this team and, barring injury, they could go a long way. The crowds have been good and the Wayne fans have enjoyed seeing some scoring. The periods have been lengthened from 18 to 20 minutes, which is an advantage to Wayne as they have a great bench and Coach Imhoff is using everyone.

It was nice to see a couple of local men making their refereeing debut in the J.V. soccer game on Tuesday night. Al Brasser and Don Smith did an excellent job, but I think they'll have to admit they had plenty of coaching from some of the spectators on the sidelines. One of last year's stars, Bob Reynolds, made his debut the same day at Red Creek. You can also expect some help, Bob, from the fans, who have never called one wrong, when you ref at Wayne.

There is another heavy schedule this week. On Monday the tennis team was at Marion and girls soccer teams hosted Marion at 6 and 7:30 p.m., weather permitting. Last night (Wednesday) the girls teams were at Red Creek at 4 and the boys teams entertained Sodus at 6:30 and 8 p.m. Today (Thursday) the girls tennis

After two weeks of competition, Wayne Central still has four undefeated teams even though the varsity soccer team was tied 3-3 by Marion. The girls tennis team ran their record to 3 and 0 by turning back Marion and Sodus, each by 4-1 scores; the boys varsity soccer team outscored Sodus 5-0 and Bishop Kearney 4-2, along with their 3-3 Marion tie, for a 4-0-1 record; the boys junior varsity beat Sodus 2-1, Marion 2-1 and Bishop Kearney 2-0, and now are 4 and 0 on the season; and the girls junior varsity team scored 4-2 and 2-0 victories over Marion and Sodus to run their record to 3 wins, no losses.

The girls varsity, in a rebuilding year, with six or seven sophomores in the starting lineup, are playing well but losing some close games because of inexperience. They lost a heartbreaker to Marion 6-2 in two overtimes, dropped one to Red Creek 4-0, and then came back to beat Sodus 6-3 for a 2 and 4 season record.

The cross country team saw action in the Sarah Coventry Invitational at Newark, where they finished seventh in their division.

The tennis team started things rolling on Monday afternoon when they turned Marion at Marion by a 4-1 score. In first singles, Robin Lasch lost to Kiane Hecker 4-10, but Wayne swept the next four matches and two exhibition matches. Diane Schmitt took Robin Mullin 10-3 in second singles and Lori Youngman breezed to a 10-2 win over Lisa Smock in third singles.

Don't hold your breath waiting for local town boards to stage public meetings on the effects of the county-wide reassessment. It's an election year, and the politicians know a hot potato when they touch one.

The Wayne Central school board is also desperately trying to wash its hands of the matter by trying to put all the blame on the town and county for doing the reassessment.

Considering that most Ontario residents are paying more in school taxes now than they paid for their total tax bill (county, town, school and special districts) five years ago, we think the school board should be taking a good, long look at how they spend our tax dollars.

As far as the reassessment goes, the county would have had to do it sooner or later in order to comply with the state law and court pressure to comply with it. County Assessor Don Johnson has a point when he says that the problem is with county and town government and school district budgets, not the reassessment.

Pressure groups and citizens asking for new government services are what has gotten us into this tax mess. About 95 per cent of school districts' budgets, for example, are required by state mandates and salary contracts, and the poor taxpayer is suckered into thinking that his "no" vote on the remaining five per cent of the school budget will save him some money.

In fact, the state education bureaucrats have made sure that if the taxpayers turn down a school budget, parents and students will be the only ones to feel the effects since the only parts of the budget that can be legally done away with are things like textbooks, sports and bus transportation.

We are under no illusions that tax bills are going to go down, no matter how loud the citizens scream, but we hope the noise will at least force governments and schools—and citizens—to make decisions about what services are really needed, and those we can not afford.
