Wayne's boys varsity soccer team lost their first game of the season, 1-0, to Williamson last Wednesday, but came back on Friday to defeat Sodus 2-0 to win their 17th consecutive Wayne County B. championship. The J.V.'s continued undefeated, although they were tied by Williamson by a 1-1 score. On Friday they finally scored some goals and routed Sodus 7-1.

The girls tennis team also fell from the unbeaten ranks as they dropped a heart-breaker to undefeated Lyons 4-1 in a match much closer than the score indicates. One singles and one doubles match had to be settled by tie breakers. It was the first setback of the season for both Peggy Tobin and Lori Youngman in doubles. Earlier in the week Wayne had defeated Marion 4-1 and Sodus 3-2.

The girls soccer teams had only one game each last week and both won over N.R.W. The varsity won in overtime on Janet Dutcher's goal from 30 yards out and the J.V.'s scored three second half goals to win 6-0.

The girls tennis team entertained Marion on Monday afternoon and easily defeated them 4-1. After Robin Lasch dropped a tough 8-10 match to Diane Hecker in first singles, Diane Schmitt routed Robin Miller 10-1 and Terry Jeffers scored an easy 10-2 win over Lisa Smock in second and third singles. In first doubles, Lori Youngman and Kim Schwock downed Linda Kendall and Melanie Thurston 10-7, and Peggy Tobin, and Tammy Lasch had an easy time subduing Luci Albertson and Sharon Russell 10-2 in second doubles.

At Sodus on Wednesday, Wayne and Sodus split four matches before darkness set in and then Wayne took the deciding match on Friday afternoon. Robin Lasch won her first singles match, 10-6, over June Koster, but Diane Schmitt dropped her first match of the year to Sue Baker by a 10-5 score in second singles. Lori Youngman and Terry Jeffers overcame Dorothy Rhine and Cheryl Badag 10-2 in first doubles, but seniors Jean Simpson and Karen Coffman lost to Charlene Berger and Cathy Rolosen 10-6 to even the match. On Friday afternoon, Kim Schwock easily turned back Cheryl Lessord 10-2 to give Wayne the match, 3-2.

Wayne had their chance to win on Thursday against Lyons when they were ahead in two matches, only to lose in tie breakers. Robin Lasch played a super game, only to lose to Lyons' Linda Trombino, 11-10. Diane Schmitt fell behind 6-1 to Karen Young, rallied to come with two, 7-9, before losing 10-7. Kim Schwock defeated Beth Fusmer 10-3 to make the match 2-1, but Peggy Tobin and Tammy Lasch fell in overtime 11-9 to Sue Harley and Cindy Avioli, and Lori Youngman and Terry Jeffers lost to Jackie Lisi and Ami Cipriano 10-5 as Wayne dropped their first match of the

season. They are now 7 and 1. If Wayne got by Pal-Mac this Tuesday they will be challenging Lyons again this afternoon (Thursday) at Lyons in a match that was rained out earlier. If Wayne wins both matches they will tie Lyons for the championship and there will either be a playoff or co-champions. Go get 'em, girls!

The boys varsity lost a close 1-0 decision to Williamson on Wednesday, but it was the way they lost that causes concern. Since they took the physical beating from Marion two weeks ago they have lost their aggressiveness. In three games before Friday afternoon's game at Sodus, they had not scored a goal in three regulation games. They scored one in overtime against Red Creek, two in overtime against N.R.W., and were held scoreless at Williamson.

At Williamson they had more shots on goal and much better shots, but Williamson scored on a goal from at least 30 yards out from the left side of the field and hung on by plugging the front of the goal with defensive men. Wayne did not go to the ball and didn't capitalize on their scoring opportunities.

On Friday they won their 17th county championship, but it was kind of a hollow victory. They only scored two goals (none in the second half) on a weak Sodus team that had only 14 players and no seniors on the team. It isn't that you want to see them overpower a weak team, but this Wayne team scored 27 goals in their first six games for a 4.5 average, and now have only scored five in their last four games, with tough games with Marion (last night), Red Creek, N.R.W. and Williamson coming up in the next 10 days. Hopefully they regained their aggressiveness and scoring ability against Marion last night and will keep their game going through the Sectionals.

Wayne scored both of their goals against Sodus in the second quarter. Chris East got his first varsity goal about eight minutes into the quarter on an assist from Ken Hawkins, and Tim Reynolds got his ninth of the year one minute before halftime with Mike Corney and Jeff Pick assisting on the play.

At Williamson, the J.V.'s fell behind 1-0 when they let down defensively for a short period, but came back strong to score in the second half on Kevin Taillie's goal assisted by Dave Pixley, and then outplayed Williamson the rest of the game.

The midfielders, especially Dean Loucks, Scott Combs and Dave Pixley, played a fine game, along with Paul Schwind in goal, who stopped a Williamson penalty kick.

Noted for their defense in the last few games, the J.V.'s poured in seven goals against the young, inexperienced Sodus boys. Billy Shay started it off with a goal in the first period with Dave Pixley assisting. Dean Loucks took a Pat Friedman pass and

scored in the second period, and Bill Shay's second goal, with Kevin Taillie assisting, made it 3-0 shortly before halftime.

Shay got his third goal of the game and tenth of the season on a cross from Tim Kroger early in the third period, and then Tim scored unassisted to give Wayne a 5-0 lead. After Sodus scored, Mike Tyner scored on an assist from Kevin Taillie, and Dave Weisenreder got his first goal of the season when Scott Combs hit him with a pass for Wayne's final goal and a 7-1 victory.

The girls varsity soccer team was rained out at Clyde-Savannah on Monday but got revenge for a loss at North Rose earlier in the season when they beat N.R.W. 4-2 in overtime at home on Wednesday.

Cindy Granger gave Wayne a 2-0 lead in the second period, N.R.W. evened the score late in the third period on a direct kick. After a scoreless fourth quarter, Janet Dutcher scored on a long kick from about 30 yards out in the first overtime to give Wayne the victory.

The girls junior varsity scored three goals in the third quarter to shut out the North Rose junior varsity 6-0. After a scoreless first half, Karen Wheeler got Wayne in the scoring column on a penalty kick off an opposing full-back. Sheila Gordinear scored the next two goals, in a five minute span, and both were assisted by Karen Wheeler. The J.V.'s are still undefeated with six wins and a tie.

The regular season will be winding down this coming week. Today (Thursday) the girls tennis team is at Lyons and tomorrow afternoon they will be at the county Sectional qualifiers. Also Friday afternoon, the girls soccer teams will be at Sodus. Tomorrow night (Friday), the boys soccer teams entertain Red Creek at 6:30 and 8 p.m. On Monday, October 17, the girls soccer teams are at home against Pal-Mac. Tuesday, October 18, finds the cross country team at Marion and the boys soccer teams at N.R.W. at 4 P.M. On Wednesday, October 19, the Williamson girls will be at Wayne at 6:30 and 7:30 and next Friday the girls are at Lyons in the afternoon and the boys play at home against Williamson at 6:30 and 8 p.m.

Lions bow, Cougars split

"Our offense is finally starting to gel," said Lyons coach Mary Lou Wheat. "It's a good time, just before sectionals."

Amy Townsend, Shelly Leisenring and Cheryl Clark kicked in the three Lions scores. Barb Sipes assisted with Townsend's goal.

Lyons dominated the game after a close first half, scoring a goal in the second quarter and two each in the

third and fourth quarters. "We finally started scoring," said North Rose-Wolcott coach Joe Stowell after his Cougars overcame a tight first quarter to rout the Golden Eagles.

Tracy Miner scored two Cougar goals in the second quarter, 30 second apart. The second came on a corner kick. Wayne boots Newark out of tournament

NORTH ROSE — The Newark Reds are out of the Section 5 tournament after bowing to the Wayne Eagles, yesterday, but Coach Dick Jordan already is looking ahead to next year.

The Reds were ousted, but the 2-0 loss to a strong Wayne team left Jordan feeling that teams like Newark now can compete with the powerful Wayne County schools.

And Jordan has a young club this year, only three seniors on the starting eleven.

Wayne Coach Chuck Imhoff, however, was far from pleased with the play of his team and figures he'll have to get better "movement and passing" if the Eagles are going to be able to clear the next hurdle, the Palmyra-Macedon Red Raiders.

Pal-Mac, which finished second in the Finger Lakes League, blanked Dansville 3-0 at Marcus Whitman yesterday. The Raiders will take on the Eagles in the quarterfinals at 3:30 p.m., Friday at Marion.

In the other action in the Class B tournament, Pittsford Mendon shut out Rush-Henrietta Roth 3-0 and Brockport blanked Attica 2-0.

Mendon and Brockport will meet on Friday at Spencerport.

The other half of the Class B tournament will swing into action today, all games set for 3:30 p.m. Pittsford Sutherland meets Wellsville at Keshequa, Hornell takes on Marshall at Mt. Morris, Whitman meets Webster Schroeder at North Rose-Wolcott and Honeoye Falls-Lima tangles with Charlotte at Penfield.

Wayne dominated the first half of yesterday's game with Newark, the Eagles outshooting the Reds 22-12, but Wayne owned only a 1-0 lead at intermission as Tim Reynolds scored off assists from Dave Metcalfe and Chris Wheeler at 14:54 into the first period.

In the third period, the Reds took charge and dominated the play, though each team got off five shots.

"We were going to the ball and using our short passing game," said Jordan. Imhoff agreed. "They completely beat us to the ball."

Imhoff, who felt "about the only way to describe" his team's play was "terrible," got his team back in full swing in the final period and 4:36 into the quarter, Jeff Pick scored on a pass from J. P. DeLass, pretty much closing out any hopes Newark had of an upset.

In that final period, Wayne outshot the Reds 8-3.



"I'm not at all displeased," said Jordan, who felt his team "played a good game."

As for the third period, "I think we just outthusted them."

Unfortunately for the Reds, "maybe we ran out of steam a couple of times."

What had to make Jordan and his

team feel pretty good was the fact that during the regular season, Wayne defeated Finger Lakes champion Bloomfield 6-1 in a non-league game.

"I'm more than happy. Our kids played with a lot of heart," said Jordan.

Pal-Mac's shutout was its 11th in 15 games. "Our defense did a good job again," said Pal-Mac Coach Jeff Smith.

Goalie Steve Lagana had to make five saves as Dansville was able to get just six shots off.

The Raiders' scoring was led by Dennis Davin, who scored in the

second quarter and the fourth quarter. Scott Brooks added a second period score.

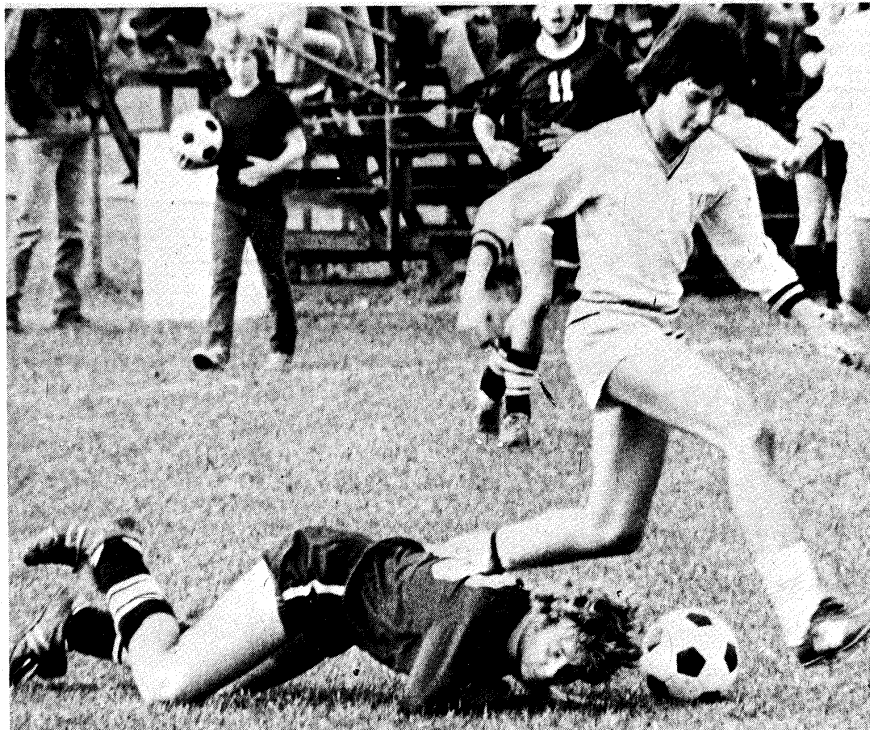

Except for the boys varsity soccer team, the last week of the regular fall sports season wasn't a very successful one for Wayne teams. The boys varsity tied NRW 2-2 at North Rose on Tuesday and beat Williamson 2-0 on Thursday night to finish the season with a 5-2 and 3 league record and 9-2-3 overall. Robin Lasch and Diane Schmitt won two matches in the Sectional doubles semi-finals on Thursday afternoon but lost in the finals on Saturday in straight sets, 6-1 and 6-1.

The girls varsity soccer team failed to score during the week and dropped two of three games although they allowed only four goals. One ended in a scoreless tie. The girls J.V.'s, who have had a fine season, beat Pal-Mac 4-1 on Tuesday, but then lost to Williamson 4-2 on Thursday and dropped an 8-0 decision to Lyons on Friday.

The boys J.V.'s lost 2-0 to NRW on Tuesday and tied Williamson 1-1 on Thursday, and the cross country team beat Marion 26-34 on Tuesday but failed to make the Sectionals in the county qualifier on Saturday.

The boys varsity soccer team came from behind twice to tie NRW on Tuesday and nearly got the go ahead goal twice, but had to settle for a 2-2 overtime tie. Goalie Mike Burns was hurt early in the first period and minutes later the fullback failed to clear the ball and Mike Bundy pushed one into the corner of the net, past the outstretched hands of Toby Wernert. Chris Wheeler tied it later in the first period when Jeff Pick was cut down in the penalty area and Chris booted in the penalty kick.

In the second period, Bundy put North Rose ahead again when a Wayne fullback hit Bundy with a hard shot that rebounded back towards the goal and the North Rose boy beat the goalie to the ball, putting them ahead 2-1. Chris Wheeler evened the score midway through the period when he scored from left wing on a pass from Tim Reynolds.

The final two periods and two overtimes were scoreless even though Wayne nearly pulled it out twice. With about 15 seconds left in regulation time, Chris Wheeler took the ball from the center of the field, down the sidelines to the corner of the penalty area, and drilled a very hard shot towards the corner of the net, but the goalie dove for the ball and hit it just enough to knock it out. With seconds left in the second overtime, Wayne again went the length of the field but the last second shot was blocked.

On Thursday night at home, the Wayne boys outplayed Williamson throughout the game but played just great in the first and fourth quarters. The 2-0 score does not justify Wayne's superiority. The local boys took a 2-0 first period lead and should have scored more.

Jeff Pick put Wayne ahead 1-0 about eight minutes into the game when Tim Reynolds hit Chris Wheeler with a throw-in and he found Jeff open on right wing. Five

minutes later Titus Stephens took a pass from Tom Miller and boomed one in from 20 yards out that just caught the corner of the net.

Wayne threatened several times in the second and third periods and bombed the Williamson goalie in the fourth period, but couldn't find the open net.

That Red Creek is in the finals of the Section 5 Class C tournament is no surprise.

The Rams, coached by Don Hartley, have won the Class C title 10 of the last 14 times.

Even if the Rams don't win this year, it will be the 14th time in the last 15 years that a Wayne County league team has won the Class C crown.

Red Creek will be meeting the North Rose-Wolcott Cougars in the finals. Both are members of the Wayne County League, and as far as NR-W coach Scotty Martin is concerned, "you won't find a better game in Section 5 than Red Creek vs. us."

Martin made the statement after his Cougars had blanked Finger Lakes league champion Bloomfield 4-0, but before he'd heard a report on the Red Creek-Keshequa game.

The Cougar coach just knew that no one outside the Wayne County league, at least, was going to derail Red Creek.

The Rams started their successful run on the Class C championship in 1963. That was a first for the Rams in the sectional tournament, which began back in 1937 when Charlotte won in Class A and Sodas, another Wayne County school, copped the Class B title.

For seven years, 1963-1969, Red Creek either won the title outright (five times) or shared it (twice).

Wolcott won the 1970 title and Marion took the next two before Red Creek got its act together again and shared the title with Kendall in 1973.

The Rams won again in 1974 and in 1976, leaving 1975, when Holley was the winner, as the only year in the previous 14 that a Wayne County team did not win the Class C crown.

Red Creek will have to be favored against North Rose-Wolcott, based on past records. In two previous games between the league rivals, Red Creek posted a 2-0 victory over the Cougars at NR-W, while the teams played to a 2-2 tie at Red Creek in the return match.

"We're good rivals and good friends," says Martin of the championship matchup Friday night at Hollender Stadium, home of the Rochester Lancers.

Though its tournament record is not nearly so gaudy, North Rose-Wolcott has had its share of success over the years.

Long before the merger, Wolcott captured a sectional championship when it won the Class B title in 1946. The following year, North Rose took the Class C crown.

North Rose shared the 1951 championship with Canaseraga and shared it with Red Creek in 1968.

After Wolcott won the Class C title in 1970, North Rose-Wolcott took its first and only united title in 1974, sharing the Class B championship with Wayne Central in 1974.

So far, in tournament play, the two Wayne County finalists have allowed just five goals.

North Rose-Wolcott, ranked fifth when the tourney began, nudged 12th seeded Marion 3-2 in overtime, thus ousting one of the three Wayne County teams in the tournament.

That was a pivotal game for the Cougars, who then nipped Finger Lakes runner-up and fourth ranked Naples 2-1 before scoring its only shutout of the tournament, a 4-0 decision over Bloomfield, yesterday.

Red Creek scored a Class C tournament high for the year with seven goals against Letchworth in the opening round, but the third ranked Rams gave up two goals to their 14th ranked opponent.

The Rams then scored the tourney's second high total with six goals against sixth seeded Holley in a 6-0 shutout, and came up with a 3-0 blanking of second seeded Keshequa yesterday.

Martin contended that "our defense was super" against Bloomfield, the top ranked team in the tourney, but it will have to be that and more against the Rams, who have scored 16 goals in three tournament games while allowing two.

The Cougar offense has managed nine goals and allowed three.

Somehow, you just have to feel that Martin is correct in declaring that "you won't find a better game in Section 5 than Red Creek vs. us."

Imhoff calls it a career

Wayne soccer coach quits^{11/2/77} after loss to Mendon

Pittsford Mendon ended Wayne Central's soccer season and the 11-year coaching career of Chuck Imhoff, who has guided the Wayne County high school to five of its nine Class B Section 5 titles, said he was calling it quits after Mendon scored a 2-0 semifinal victory at Hollender Stadium.

Kevin Lausin, a junior forward making his first start of the season, scored his first goal of the year and Bill Minsky, the senior whom Lausin replaced scored his seventh goal to send the defending champion Vikings (16-1-0) into Friday's final.

Mendon, the tournament's top-seed, will play the winner of last night's other semifinal between Webster Schroeder (12-4-0) and Pittsford Sutherland (13-2-3).

"This is it," said Imhoff after his team finished 11-3-3. "I'm done."

Imhoff said he turned in his resignation "three or four weeks ago but

decided to stick it out because of the kids."

Imhoff, who leaves with a 180-25-15 career record, said he turned in his resignation "three or four weeks ago but decided to stick it out because of the kids."

He is resigning, he said, because of "problems at the school. We don't have a field to practice on at school. They (the school board) took our field and made it a game field for everybody."

Everybody includes football.

"Football just tore the field up," said Imhoff. "Heck, I said it was a waste of time. We're not being provided with the proper facilities and we should get that consideration with the kind of teams we've had through the years."

Imhoff said he will remain as the school's basketball coach.

Lausin, a 5-foot-7, 135-pounder, hastened Imhoff's departure by scoring the eventual game-winner only three minutes, 53 seconds into the game.

Lausin, who sat out most of the season because of mononucleosis, took a pass from team-leading scorer Bill Champaigne on the left side of the goal and fired into a virtually wide open net on the right side.

"The pass was right there," said Lausin. "The goalie gave me almost the whole right side."

Lausin's goal quickly silenced those ready to second-guess coach Joe Borrosh's decision to start him.

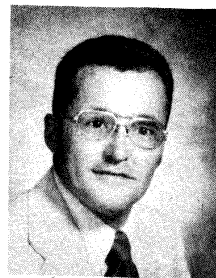
Borrosh also pushed the right button in starting goalie Bill Maloy over Jeff Teal, who had started most of Mendon's games this season.

"I felt sorry for Jeff," said Borrosh, "but Maloy played a super game."

Maloy had eight saves but couldn't relax until Minsky's goal put the game on ice with just 1:55 left.

Wayne Central's hopes for another Section V soccer championship ended last Thursday night when the Wayne boys dropped a hard-fought 2-0 game to top-seeded and eventual co-champion Pittsford-Mendon at Hollender Stadium in Rochester.

Kevin Linsin scored a rather easy goal for Mendon in the first four minutes of the game when he took a pass from his left wing and scored on an untested shot into the right corner of the net. After that Wayne's defense tightened and they played the Monroe County team on even terms until Mendon scored the clincher with less than two minutes left in the game on a scramble in front of the net off a corner kick.

Wayne had a few good scoring opportunities but luck wasn't with them as Mendon's goalie happened to be in the right place at the right time. Coach Chuck Imhoff felt his boys played a fine game and credited Tom Miller with doing a great job on Pittsford's top scorer, Bill Champagne, and another fine defensive job by his fullbacks, especially Gary Aman. I was sorry I had to miss the game, but I spent a week of vacation at Clifton Springs, where I had another wedged shape piece of bone taken from my right leg that morning and didn't recuperate in time. I always have been a little slow.

Losing the game last Tuesday evening wasn't the saddest part as Coach Imhoff announced after the game that he was retiring as Wayne coach because of all the trouble he had had with the board and administration over the use of the field, especially letting outside football "tear up the field." He said he felt the great teams Wayne has produced over the years deserved a decent field to play on. He has had to keep the field in shape himself (a job he is not paid for), do all the marking out and pull the roller behind his own car if the field got rolled, and felt it wasn't worth it when others were allowed to use the field.

Many of us agree with him 100 per cent, even though we know we are losing one of the best coaches in the state. There is nothing worse than working for people who don't have the "guts" to back you up. The board and administration say the lights on the field were put up for community use. Yet their rules on use of the field bar all baseball and softball.

The summer soccer league is allowed to use the field but their league season runs in June, July and August, and during that time the school has a higher rate for electricity, so the school has to charge at least \$350 a night for its use, so this automatically rules out their playing on it. Three years ago they were able to play one late playoff game on it.

This leaves our administrators with one sport to control, football. The past two years only one group, the 17-18 year old division, have asked for the use of the field, so you are talking about rules for about 25 boys and the adults who run them.

We are supposed to have intelligent businessmen run-

past two years heavy damage has been done to the field because they came up with an agreement that did not allow them to cancel a game after a heavy rain even though they knew it was going to do much damage to the field at taxpayers' expense. One year is bad enough, but two years in a row is something else. Maybe it's time we starting replacing some of these experts.

Now we've lost one of the best coaches in the business because of their shortsightedness. I hope they are satisfied. I imagine one group is, but the other only may have second thoughts when they start looking or someone to replace a man of caliber of Chuck Imhoff.

No one will miss Charles more than I. Soccer is a hard sport to report on and you don't like to give all the credit to the ones who score. Assists are often hard to pick up and, with many players in the game, it is hard sometimes to see who is playing at his best. Chuck has always given me 100 per cent cooperation. Whether it was on the field, after the game or on the phone the next day, he always willingly filled me in on all the details. He knew who played well and all the boys that assisted on plays. When he had stats sheets, all-star selections or whatever announcements that came along, I always got them first.

Thanks, Chuck, for a wonderful association and good luck in your future endeavors, specially this year's basketball team. Next week I hope to have some figures on Coach Imhoff's 12 year career and a few statistics on the 1977 team.

I can't close the fall season without a word on the great job done by the girls cheerleading teams. They must have been undefeated as they continually cheered the boys on in weather that most of the time wasn't fit for ducks. When they started shouting, "We've got spirit, how about you?" they usually drowned the other team out. I don't know how they didn't all have pneumonia as they were too busy cheering to wear jackets. Both varsity and junior varsity did well, but a terrific job by varsity cheerleaders Karen Mistal, Janice Bamford, Teresa Shay, Kim Baker, Hollie Peterson, Lorey Slichta, Cathy Mann, Nancy Ellison, Cathy Tobin and Brigid Hennessey and their coach, Mrs. Emison. The thrill of the season for me was when two of these girls had the courtesy to come over and offer me their blankets one night as I sat watching the game in the pouring rain.

Final figures on the 1977 soccer season show that Wayne finished with an 11-3 and 3 season. Allowing one point for a goal and one for an assist, Chris Wheeler led the team in points with 18 on 10 assists and 18 goals. Tim Reynolds was a close second with 17 points and was top goal scorer with 11 goals. Mike Corney had 15 points on 6 goals and 9 assists, while Jeff Pick finished with 12 points on 8 goals and 4 assists. Titus Stephens had 4 goals and an assist for 5 points, and Dino Morrill 3 goals and an assist for 4 points. Dave Metcalfe and J. P. DeLass each had 4 assists. Tyke Morrill and Tom Miller each had two points, while Chris East, Tim Doyle, Dave Dennison and Ken Hawkins each had a point.

Wayne won the B league championship, but Red Creek finished first overall in the county. Red Creek's record was 6-1 and 3, while Wayne and N.R.W. tied for second with 5-2 and 3. Marion was 4-4 and 2, Williamson 3-5-2, and Sodas 0 and 9. Wayne outscored their opponents 43 to 20 and had six shutouts while failing to score only twice.

Next year's coach will have a fine nucleus to build from even though four of the top five scorers will be graduating. Mike Corney will be back leading the way, and Tim Doyle, Ken Hawkins, Chris East, Greg Ott and Dave Dennison saw plenty of action this year and will be back. A fine goalie in Paul Schwind and some good-looking J.V. players should make Wayne a top contender again next year.

With this year's team finishing with an 11-3 and 3 record, it gave Coach Charlie Imhoff a 168-32 and 16 12-year career record at Wayne. This is a .885 winning percentage and it is improbable that any future coach will ever come close to this figure again. In his 12 years, Charlie's teams scored 687 goals to only 189 by the opposition. Five times his teams won the Section V championship, three times they lost in the finals, and three times in the semi-finals. His 1968 team had a 19-1 record; in 1969 the team was 18-0-1.

During those two years they scored 30 shutouts and 163 goals to just 13 for their opponents. He had two All-American players in Tom Gentile and Kevin Hill and set Section V records with six consecutive shutouts in Sections in 1968 and 1969. Many other individual records were set in league and Sectional play by members of Coach Imhoff's teams. It's little wonder we hate to see him retire.
