### **Around Town**

We figure there are a few screws loose in the heads of Wayne Central School's administrators. They've recommended a new fee schedule for use of school buildings by the towns and community groups, which may cripple community

programs.

Although state austerity budget rules require schools to charge for use of their facilities, most school districts under austerity conditions make the charge a minimum.

Not Wayne Central. The new rates, which have been authorized by School Superintendent Dr. William Crombe, at the suggestion of his staff, were to have been voted upon Wednesday night by the school board (after this newspaper went to press). Although we don't know the board's decision yet, the fact that the administration is even suggesting these exhorbi-

press). Although we don't know the board's decision yet, the fact that the administration is even suggesting these exhorbitant fees is causing anger throughout the district.

The suggested fees are \$15 for the gym or cafeteria and \$2.00 for a classroom at the elementary schools, and \$20 for the auditorium, \$15 for the gym, \$10 for the cafeteria and \$2.00 for a classroom at the secondary schools. This fee would be charged for each night a particular room is used, whether or not it was an ongoing program.

ont it was an ongoing program.

Ontario Recreation Director Howie Revans estimates that the new fees will add \$4,000 to his department's program costs in a year, and Walworth Supervisor Carlyle Darron told us Tuesday that the Walworth Town Board would no longer be able to meet at Freewill Elementary if the new charges go into effect.

The same taxpayers, or their children, who pay for the schools are also the ones who use these facilities for community programs, so the new fees will just take the costs out of another of our pockets.

The above will also strike other community groups such

The charges will also strike other community groups, such as the scouts, who have even less money to work with than the

as the scouts, who have even less money to work with than the towns.

The administration justifies the new charges by saying that the people who use the buildings should be the ones to pay the costs, but we don't think a few hours of electricity to light the buildings merits these charges.

Wayne Central has six buildings, all paid for by the taxpayers, who should be able to use them whenever they want. Instead of hiking the costs, the administration should be thinking of ways to allow more of the district's residents to use their own facilities.

While we're on the subject of schools, that new asphalt walkway behind the high school is generating additional public anger. The high school has needed a bus turn-around for years, but somehow it was always cut out of the budget to save costs. This summer a six-foot wide asphalt strip was laid around the back of the building, in a U-shape from doorway to doorway, with small walks running on each side of the bleachers.

As far as we know, this walk was never discussed by the school board or approved, and no one seems to know what it cost. Like the new \$50,000 phone system, we all hear about it after the fac. after the fact.

Loose Screws?

To the Editor

In the September 14th issue of the "Wayne County Mail," the author of the AROUND TOWN column stated, "We figure there are a few screws loose in the heads of Wayne Central School's administrators." The writer was commenting on the school austerity budget and the "exorbitant fees' the administration is to charge community groups for school community groups for school

Because of their limited because of their immed budgets, most community groups would view any sum too much. However, in terms of today's costs of electricity, fuel, and maintenance, these charges ranging from \$2.00 to \$20.00 are in my opinion more resolistic than exceptions realistic than exorbitant.

It seems unfair to blame this problem on "loose screws in administrators heads." The fact that any charge is being made is the result of action taken by the legislature and by the local voters. The lawmakers and the local electorate who made this austerity deriging are the local electorate who mate this austerity decision are thus the ones who originated the action and therefore are responsible. Maybe there are responsible. Maybe there are some loose screws in those two groups! The school administration's function is to activate the decision made by others.

However, the basic question raised is who should pay for community groups use of schools? No doubt the town fathers would like the costs put on the school district pay the entire cost, or the towns for town functions either through the general fund (all taxpayers) or use fees, or should individual group fees be collected from those who directly benefit, or a combination of these?

I have long supported sharing and the Maximum use of school and town facilities, believing this to be the most efficient use of tax dollars.

Wayne Central has in nonausterity years a local policy of maximum use of schools by of maximum use of schools by community groups. Sounds are now being made for new town facilities in Ontario. It should be remembered that it costs less for a town to pay a use fee to the school for operational costs, than to pay for capital construction and annual operation of a new contraction of a new contraction. annual operation of a new facility. Let us hope the present and future decision makers keep this thought in



It will certainly be a welcome change for both of them after long careers of distinguished public service.

Al Gentile is having some problems operating Wayne Central's sports program under this year's budget cuts, but he's using Yankee ingenuity to solve the worst of them. Because the athletic department can't purchase new equipment under austerity rules, Gentile can not buy those instant ice packs, for instance, for injured athletes. Instead, they're freezing water in Dixie cups and transporting them in coolers to games.

The department is using supplies stocked in the past, but

The department is using supplies stocked in the past, but doesn't have the variety of supplies available in previous years. There are no Ace bandages, for instance, because injured athletes have not returned them in the past.

"At the present time there are no safety hazards," Gentile reports, "but I can't predict what will happen as the season progresses. I might not say the same thing in January." Gentile said the department would use up its remaining supplies, then seek financial help from the Boys Leaders Club, which has over \$400 in its budget from fund-raising events such as the annual donkey haskethall games.

annual donkey haskethall games. Uniforms are another problem. Gentile points out that the junior varsity soccer team has only one uniform for each boy for the 18 game season. Since the uniforms are 12 years old, fans can expect to see some patches as the season progresses.

Gentile also countered some criticism of the service provided by the Ontario ambulance at the recent soccer game with Williamson. A Williamson team member was injured during the game and taken off the field, but the team's coach did not request ambulance service until a half hour later. The OVES arrived within seven or eight minutes after being called.
