MARION — Having been caught napping in the fourth period, the North Rose-Wolcott Cougars figured it was only right to catch the Marion Black Knights the same way in overtime.

That's what happened as the Cougars caught the Knights unprepared on an indirect kick from about eight yards out with just a few minutes to go.

Marion had been called for obstruction on the play and the officials

ruled an indirect kick for the Cougars. There is no second whistle to start play after such a call and while the Knights were preparing their defense for the indirect kick, NR-W's Mike Virts raced up to the ball and rolled it slightly with his foot.

Ron Blondale then raced in behind Virts and let go with the shot that went into the net.

"No one knew the ball was in the net, including the referee," said North

Rose-Wolcott coach Scotty Martin.

Martin noted that on the indirect kick, "you don't start with a whistle. The defensive players must be 10 yards from the ball, and in this case, with the ball inside the 10-yard line, they must be on the side, 10 yards away, or on the goalline.

"We elected not to give them time to set up," said Martin.

It had looked like an easy win for the Cougars who got a second period goal

from Paul Montour and a third-period goal by Matt Woods, both on crossing passes from Blondale and Jack Jackson, respectively.

"Then we had the fourth period," noted Martin, and the Cougars were stunned when Ed Sarkett booted a "knuckleball" from 35 yards out that bounced off the chest of Cougar goalie Barry Blondale and squirmed loose into the cage.

With six minutes left in the regulation game, the Knights missed a direct free kick from an angle, but the referee recalled the play and Neal DePoint booted home "as pretty a shot as I've ever seen," said Martin.

That fired up the Knights, who forced the game into overtime, where the Cougars regained domination, but Marion almost scored on their one chance, a breakaway.

The victory keeps the Cougars (4-0-2) undefeated in the Wayne County league and sets up Tuesday's big game at Red Creek, where the host Rams are 5-0-1.

"We can't wait for that game," said Martin, whose team tied the Rams in their first meeting.

"We were psyched and we ran as I've never seen us run before," continued Martin.

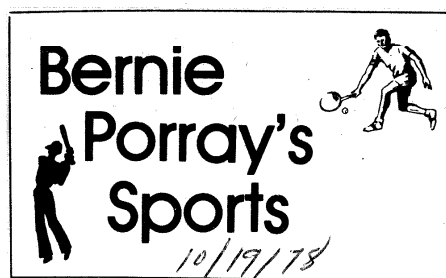
The Cougars finally got the game winner with about a minute to play in the first overtime period as Blondale got the hat trick with his third goal of the game.
