## Cross Country Number One!

Despite the absence of two of their top five runners and an injury to their number one runner on the course, Wayne Central's strong cross country team was still able to defeat the other eight county teams and win the county championship at Lyons last Saturday. It gave the

team an undefeated 16 and 0 record on the year. They also defeated all other county teams in the NWR Invitational earlier in the year.

I stated in last week's paper that the dual meets did not count towards the county championship, but this was not so (Another lie, Johnson). But the team got me off the hook by winning last Saturday. The eight dual league meets counted one half and the county championship meets counted one half. The Wayne team made sure by winning them all.

Freshman star Andy Entingh was out with an injury last Saturday and Scott Vandewinckel missed the meet because of a previous engagement. Mark Silience was Wayne's top runner, finishing fifth with a time of 16:39, 37 seconds behind Chris Lanster of Lyons, who took first place. Tim Houghteling came in eighth, Town ninth, Steve Miller sixteenth and

Todd Rose twenty-sixth to give Wayne their winning total of 64 points.

Others, in order of finish, and their total points were Sodus 82, Pal-Mac 85, NRW 87, Marion 93, Lyons 133, Red Creek 158, Clyde-Savannah 176 and Williamson 228.

In the girls' meet, Wayne finished second to NRW with Janet Dutcher finishing seventh, Kyle Schwock twelfth and Gina LaPlaca thirteenth.

This Saturday Coach Dawson Raymo will be taking seven boys and probably seven girls to the state Sectionals at Alfred-Almond.

Congratulations to Coach Ramo and his team. With only two seniors on the roster, things look very good for next year.

Wayne finished the regular season last Tuesday by winning a double dual meet over Marion and NRW. They won over Marion 24-32 and out-ran NRW 22-35. Marion eked out a 28-29 win over NRW.

Jeff Town finished first in the meet with a time of 14:02. Against NRW, Mark Silience finished third, Andy Entingh fourth, Tim Houghteling sixth, and Scott Vandewinckel eighth. Against Marion, the same boys finished third, fourth, seventh and ninth.

In girls' Sectional play, clocks are kept to record the time each team controls the ball in their opponent's end during the game and in the first two overtimes if the score is tied at the end of regulation time.

If the score is tied at the end of the overtimes, the team with the most penetration time wins if one team has a 20 second advantage. If one team doesn't have the required advantage, they keep playing two five-minute overtimes until one team scores or does pick up the advantage time required.

At the end of two overtimes on Friday, the score was tied at 2-2, but Wayne had 17 minutes penetration time to only seven for Attica.

They have won the B Sectional championship the last three years and 12 times in the last 15 years.

Well, it's happened at Wayne. Title IX has boomeranged. The law was enacted to give girls an equal chance in sports. Schools should have, as nearly as possible, the same number of girls' teams as boys' teams. Except for contact sports, girls should be able to try out for boys' teams if there are no girls' teams in that sport. The same rule does hold for boys.

The girls' volleyball team has won the county championship the past two years and do not need any help this year, but seeing there is no boys' volleyball team, several boys are now trying out for the girls' team.

This could cause all kinds of problems. What if Wayne team has some boys on the team and the other county teams refuse to play them? And if there are more boys on the starting team than girls, is it then a girls' team or a boys' team?

The boys have already been approved by a three-person panel (2-1) so we'll have to wait and see what happens. It is legal, but I hate to see it as there are more boys' teams than girls' at Wayne now and this may stop a few more girls from competing in sports.

# Weakened Red Creek stopped in soccer final

ITHACA — On the wet AstroTurf at Cornell University's Schoellkopf Field, Red Creek met Blind Brook for the state high school Class C soccer title yesterday. And although Red Creek controlled the flow of the game, it could not put a damper on Blind Brook forward Jeff Shulman.

The big senior scored two goals, including the game-winner in the fourth quarter, and Blind Brook won the state title before an estimated 500 frozen fans, 4-3.

Red Creek, which represented Section 5, finished 19-2-1. Blind Brook, from Port Chester in Westchester County (Section 1), finished 18-1.

Pittsford Mendon, another Section 5

representative, lost its Class A championship game to Roslyn (Section 8), 1-0.

Red Creek's Tim McIntyre scored the game's first goal at 7:36 of the opening quarter to give the Mules their only lead of the day. Eight minutes later Shulman tied the game on a breakaway. Second quarter goals by Bob Howard and Mike Bertusch gave Blind Brook a 3-1 halftime lead.

"We've come back before," McIntyre said, "But we just couldn't get going up front."

With good reason.

The Mules played without two of its regular defenders, Todd Prudom and Bob Fitch, both played integral roles throughout the team's sectional championship season.

Fitch, however, left the team after the Section 5 title win over Savona, and Prudom is out with a broken leg, which he suffered Tuesday in a semifinal win. Consequently, Red Creek Coach Don Hartley was forced to start Chet Fisher, normally a forward, at fullback.

When Red Creek fell behind at half-time, Hartley moved Fisher up front. The junior immediately responded with two goals, giving him five in three state playoff games.

"I had to start Fisher at Fullback because Prudom broke his leg," said Hartley, who had hoped to add a state title to 12 sectional championships. "Then, in the second half, after they'd

gotten that big lead, he had to go to the offense."

Said McIntyre: "If we had left him (Fisher) up front, it would have been a different story. But we couldn't. We just didn't have any fullbacks."

Fisher collected his first goal at 11:05 of the third quarter when he headed in a crossing pass from David Gregg.

Early in the fourth quarter Shulman broke through the Red Creek defense for the fourth time and knocked a left-footed shot past sophomore goalie Kevin Tomko.

Less than two minutes later, at 4:15, Fisher controlled a long lead pass from Tony Newport and drilled an 18-yard shot past Blind Brook goalie Jeff Lord.

However, Medium-range shots by Newport and Gregg in the final minute failed, and so had Red Creek.

Shulman, who had thigs his own way against the depleted Red Creek defense, said: "They didn't have many guys back there. I was 1-on-1 all day."

Tomko, who hadn't allowed a goal in quarterfinal and semifinal wins, said: "They had four good shots, and every one scored. They (the defense) would let them set up, then all of a sudden the ball was there."

"But I'll be back—and we'll be back."

and power volleyball where the height of the net is set at less than eight feet, the fitness of given student to participate in mixed competition shall be determined by a review panel consisting of the school physician, a physical education teacher designated by the principal of the school, and if requested by the parents of the pupil, a physician selected by the parents."

This would seem to allow the boys the opportunity to try out for the girls' team if the review panel approved, but as you move on to interschool guidelines, you read as follows:

"The following guidelines for administering this regulation are congruent with the intent and regulations of the Federal Title IX amendment:

"When overall equal and comparable athletic competitive opportunities are limited, the denied sex must be allowed the opportunity to try out under the conditions set forth in the regulations for a specific sport other than those identified in subclause (2) of the regulation.

"Equal and comparable athletic opportunities include facilities, budget, personnel, scheduling of games, practice time, equipment, supplies, publicity, levels of competition, travel and allowance."

As you read these two paragraphs, you could easily come to the conclusion that the Wayne boys are the denied sex in this case and should be allowed to try out for the team, but according to Dr. Grenda and Dr. Tynor, the important words here are "equal and comparable athletic opportunities."

In as much as Wayne has something like 14 boys' sports and only 11 girls' sports, no boys should be allowed to try out for girls' teams until there are at least an equal number of each.


This would seem to say also that girls should be allowed to try out for a boys' team if there is no girls' team in a specific sport, but not necessarily so.

In subclause (6) it says "when team membership is sought by a person of the opposite sex, the athletic director should see that the

abilities do not exceed the physical abilities of the other sex, so as to create a hazardous condition." Such a circumstance would warrant denial of participation. The panel is responsible for this determination.

When circumstances permit, the first sports added at Wayne Central will have to be skiing and bowling, which were cut with this year's austerity budget. After that, no boys' sport can be added until the number of girls' teams equal the number of boys' teams.

All this is probably about as clear as mud to you readers, but I hope it answers some questions. Athletic Director Al Gentile met with the boys involved last Wednesday and explained the situation to them, so they understand why they were denied the chance to try out.

## Boys Turned Down For Volleyball Team

In last week's Scoreboard I mentioned that several boys were trying out for the girls' volleyball team, in accordance with subclause I of Title IX, which says that "when only one interschool team is provided, no student shall be

excluded solely by reason of sex except under conditions listed in the regulation."

I also said that the panel that has to be set up in such cases had voted 2 to 1 to allow the boys to try out.

My statement was a little premature as the vote was on the interpretation of the rules and the panel wanted to be sure they were right before they made their decision.

Dr. Norman Loomis and Athletic Director Al Gentile took several hours on different days from their busy schedules and, along with Gail Heimberger, the third member of the panel, made several calls to the State Education Department in Albany, trying to get a clear interpretation.

Finally, last Tuesday they got in touch with Dr. Ted Grenda, the director of the Division of General Education, and Dr. Mae Tynor, who gave them the correct interpretation.

Title IX was signed into law in May of 1975 and went into effect on July 1 of that year. In essence, it says that boards of education should maintain an equitable division of facilities, budget and personnel for boys and girls, which is further elaborated on in the Title IX final

These regulations have been amended different times, the last time less than one year ago. The problem is confused more by having both federal and state regulations.

Written by lawyers, the law is very complex and difficult to interpret because a regulation will tell you something and then say except in certain cases and refer you to several subclauses.

The amended regulation of Section C reads as follows:

"(1) - Equal opportunity to participate in interschool competition, either on separate teams or in mixed competition on the same team, shall be provided to male and female students, except as hereafter provided. In schools that do not provide separate competition for male and female students in a specific sport, no student shall be excluded from such competition solely by reason of sex, except in the sports set forth in subclause (2) of this clause or in accordance with the provisions of subclause (3) of this clause.

"(2) - There shall be no mixed competition in the following sports: basketball, boxing, football, ice hockey, rugby and wrestling.

"(3) - In the sports of baseball, field hockey, lacrosse, soccer, softball,
