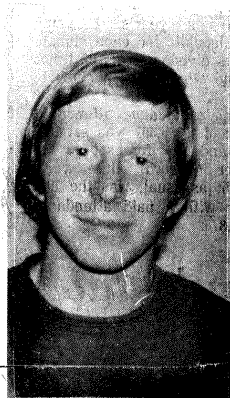

## Eagles lose entire outfield, nine return for '73

ONTARIO - Despite losing the entire starting outfield from last year, along with the No. 1 catcher and pitcher, the Wayne Eagles are still looking good for the 1973 season.

Coach Max Stoner welcomed seven returning lettermen back, including right-hand pitcher Brad Cuvelier, who posted a 5-2 record.

Also back is shortstop Wally Wyse, a .333 hitter, third baseman - leftfielder Dave DeGroote, a .289 hitter, catcher

Tom Crowley, pitcher - centerfielder Clete Manning, first baseman John Blind, outfielder Bob Herbster, and second baseman Jim Peterson.

Stoner will have to find replacements for the outfield he lost (Randy Lucas, Cliff Harrell, Bob Schlegel). Candidates are junior Manning, DeGroote, Herbster and two juniors up from the JVs, Russ Klein and Steve Herrick.

Blind and junior Steve Morrow are battling for the first base job and Peterson has the inside track

at second.

Also vying for second base is Bill Slater (4-3 1.73 ERA).

Morrow.

Wyse is set at shortstop but Stoner is unsure of his third sacker. DeGroote, a senior, played there some last year but is being pushed by junior Dennis Thiele, a transfer from Marion.

Crowley will be the Eagles No. 1 catcher, backed up by Robusto. He replaces the graduated Jeff Kunzer.

The mound prospects are headed by Cuvelier and Manning, both rightys. Stoner indicated that Thiele may be his third

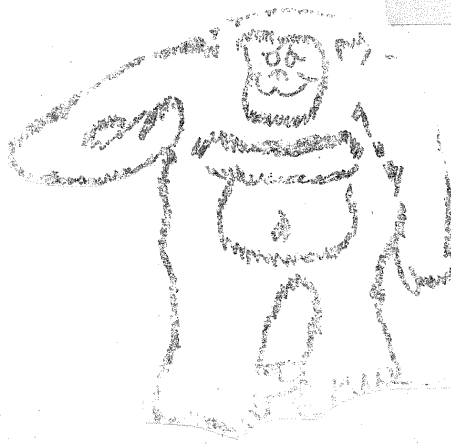
Coach Stoner has lined up two games each with Brighton, Penfield, Fairport and Webster to get his boys in shape before the season opens May 2.

Wayne Central rapped 15 hits to overwhelm Williamson, 14-2, in a Wayne County Baseball League game yesterday at Williamson.

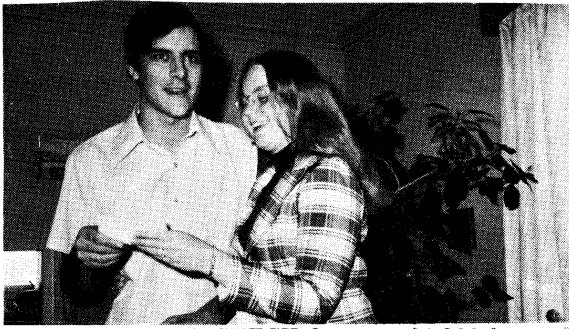
The winning Eagles, now 4-5, were led by Ross Klein's three hits and three runs batted in. Clete Manning picked up the victory.

On Wednesday they downed Pal-Mac also two to one as Mark won six to three and six and nothing, and Chris won six to nothing and six and three while Kevin Schultz and Derek lost three to six, seven to five and three to six. This week they had matches scheduled for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

The baseball team lost to Sodus six to nothing as Wayne could get only one hit off Haak, the fine Sodus pitcher. Brad Cuvelier matched him pitch for pitch until he grooved one to Raney of Sodus in the fifth inning and he put it out of the park. He weakened in the sixth inning and was replaced by Clete Manning.

In losing to Marion 82 and a half to 53 and a half, Norm O'Dell again took the high hurdles in 18.4, Herbie White the 100 yard in 11.5, "Little" Gino Affronti threw the discus a record of 133 feet beating the old record by an amazing eight feet, the 880 relay team of Norm O'Dell, Herb White, Chris Noone and Billy Dixon won with a time of 147.5 and the two mile relay team of Al Loquasto, Tom Seils, Neal Smith and Tom Roome picked up their second victory of the week. "Stormin' Norman" did a great job in the 880 relay making up a lot of ground to help them win.

Wayne Central's track team split a pair of meets last week losing to a strong Williamson team 84 to 56 on Tuesday and then turning back Sodus on Thursday, 86 to 51.

At Williamson Wayne was only able to finish first in four events; Tom Marcucci won the long jump (16 feet 2 inches), Herb White won the 100 yard dash in 11.5, "Little" Gino Affronti threw the discus 118 feet and one inch, and the mile relay team won.

Wayne had five double winners against rival Sodus. Norm O'Dell won the high hurdles and the long jump with a jump of 17 feet and 10 and one half inches; Marty Doyle won the mile in 5:06 and the two mile in 11:30; "Little" Gino Affronti threw the discus 122 feet and eight and three quarters inches and the shotput 41 feet and eight and three quarter inches; Rex Judd jumped eight feet six inches in the pole vault and won the 440 in 61.7, and Herb White won the 100 yard dash in 11.0 and the 220 in 24.5. Dennis Wilson won the low hurdles and ran a leg on the 880 yard relay won by Wayne. The other three were Dan Goff, Christ Noone and Don Johnson. Dan Goff also won the high jump with a jump of five feet two inches. Tom Roome, Neal Smith, Bob Cleays and Alan Loquasto won the mile relay in 4:12.5. Sodus won the 880, the two mile relay, and the triple jump. Wayne lost to Newark earlier, but edged Victor 67 and a half to 66 and a half in a triple meet. Wayne has two triple meets scheduled this week. They were scheduled to meet Clyde-Savannah and North Rose at North Rose on Tuesday, and this afternoon (Thursday) run against Marion and Red Creek. Wayne has a big advantage over most teams with 11 girl managers.

The tennis team lost their first home match in four years when they dropped a tough match to Marion on Tuesday, two to one. Mark Hedgepeth dropped a heart-breaker six to four, four and six, and seven and nine. 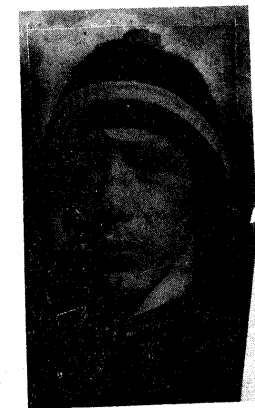
# Pal-Mac beats Wayne, Ehler breaks record

# The unsung hero: The benchwarmer

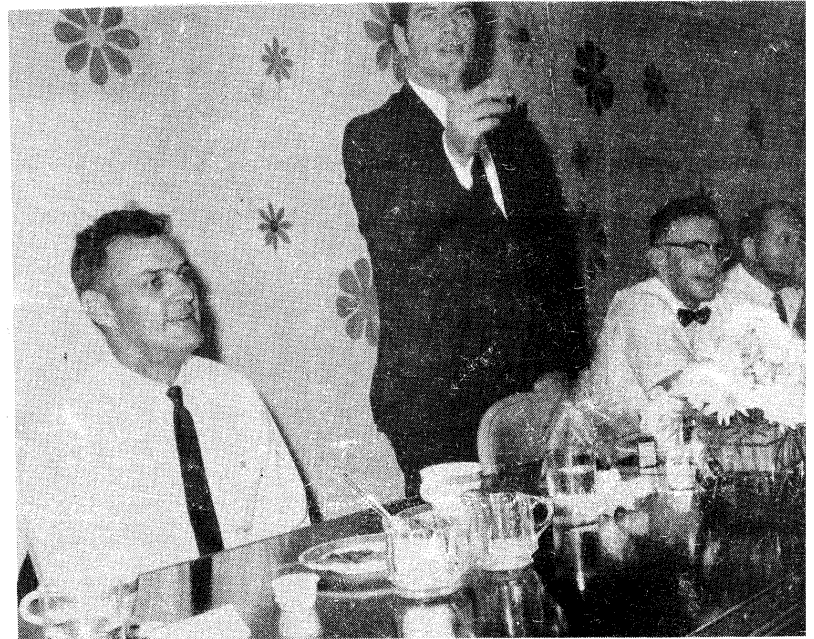
