The big news at Wayne last week was that they have another Section V champion. Steve Chinelli, the top man on Wayne's fine bowling team, won the singles championship at the annual Section V Winter Sports Carnival last Saturday by rolling a 611 series. Congratulations, Steve, on a great job.

Several parents and Coach "Chuck" McDonald took 10 area boys to the finals of the A.A.U. wrestling tournament at Buffalo last Saturday. Although there were no first place winners from either the Ontario or Walworth recreation programs, they did come home with three third place medals. Gary Kotvis, at 140 pounds, won his first two matches, lost by a pin in the semi finals and then gained third place by winning in the consolation round. Pat Flint, at 112 pounds, won by a pin in the first round, beat his friend

Robbie Lang 3 to 2 in the second round lost to a boy from Baldwinsville in the semi-finals, and then won by a pin in consolations to take third place. Clint Osterhout drew a first round bye, won by a decision in the second round, lost by a decision in the semi-finals, and then won by a decision in consolations to capture the other third place medal.

The results of the other boys are as follows: Steve Azzono, Brian Hargarther and Gary Marianetti all lost in the first round. Gary, Wayne's fine freshman this past year, had the misfortune of drawing the champion of his class in the first round and lost by a decision, as did the other two boys. Pat Friedman had a first round bye and then lost a second round decision. Billy Affronti won a first round decision and lost by a decision in the second. Robbie Lang had a first round bye and then

lost 3 to 2 to Pat Flint. Jim Jeffers also drew a first round bye and lost a second round decision.

This Saturday the Kings Tournament will be held at Bishop Kearney for all high school boys. Next week, April 4, 5 and 6, will be the Corning tournament. Junior high boys wrestle on Friday, high school boys on Saturday, and an open tournament on Sunday. The Sunday tournament will probably include Dick Lang and Al Flint Sr. My thanks to Al Flint for the Buffalo results.

In the badminton sectionals last Saturday, Brian Benjamin finished fourth in the singles and the doubles team of Steve Wilbur and Bill Eaton finished second. The girls finished fourth in doubles and fifth in singles. (Sorry, girls, I don't have the names)

In table tennis the girls finished second in doubles and fourth in singles. The boys doubles team finished fifth.

The girls' basketball team finished their season last Monday with an easy 36 to 20 win over North Rose-Wolcott to even their season's record at 6 and 6. After a slow first quarter when they led 4 to 2, Wayne outscored their opponents 13 to 4 to take a 17 to 6 lead and coasted the rest of the way. All girls got a chance to play in this final game with Terry Febrey, as usual, topping the scorers with 18 points. Joann Dana had 7 and Terri Corney and Karen Fuller each had 4. Terry Febrey averaged nearly 20 points a game and should be the league's leading scorer.

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There was very little action on the sports front last week. A fine crowd was on hand last Tuesday night to see the girls go through their gymnastics demonstration. Twelve of the 14 girls on the team performed. Mrs. Carlson explained the different exercises and routines, told how points are scored and deducted, and introduced the girls in each event. The girls did a fine job and were applauded many times.

I'm sorry, girls, but because of a hunting incident a few years back I was unable to hear good enough to get the names of each girl who participated in each event, but I did enjoy it very much. A near capacity crowd was on hand.

Five wrestlers competed in the Kings Tournament at Bishop Kearney last Saturday but had only fair success. 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Although the weather hasn't been cooperating too well, coach Max Stoner has his baseball lineup just about set for the coming season. In fact, they braved the cool temperatures last Saturday and played two practice games at Webster Thomas.

Coach Stoner is carrying a 13 man squad and has a five man nucleus with hard hitting Tommy Buchiere, an all-star last year, at short-stop; Brian Ameele, back again at third base; the aggressive Greg Kline behind the plate; and excellent fielding in left and center in the hands of Bill White and Billy Fravel. First base will probably be held down by Ed Priest of last year's J.V.'s or Dick DeGroote. At present, Tom Ellison has a good shot at second base and Mike Harens has the inside track in right field but will have to prove he can handle the spot. Billy Reynolds will be the utility man.

With warmer weather, the pitching could be excellent. Dave Hall, a left, came on strong last year and when he has control can be tough. Dave Gordon pitched some fine ball last year and was very impressive at Webster on Saturday. He has fine control and has developed a fine curve ball. Tom Harmon was the top pitcher on the J.V.'s last year and had a great E.R.A. In a pinch, Bill White, the left fielder, can also help out.

Coach Imhoff, who has some 20 candidates for the J.V. team, also seems pretty well set, especially in the infield. Mark Kline, Greg's brother, will handle most of the catching, Jim Gardner seems set at third base, Mark Bellinger at short, Mike Harens at second and Alton Robinson will probably handle first when he isn't pitching. Jim Pick and Tom Cooman will probably handle two of the outfield posts with the other one up for grabs. Pitching could present a problem.

The freshmen will also have a team this year and coach Doug May has about 30 boys to pick from. It looks as though we have a pretty good baseball program going at Wayne this year.

Things don't look so good for the tennis team. They lost all the first string players from last year's championship team and will probably have to play all their games on the road this year while their court is being re-modeled. Only Arne Lindquist, Rod Madrid and Jim Butler have had much varsity experience, but a couple of seniors, Neil Smith and Jim Williams, have looked good so far. The league season opens Thursday, April 24, so the boys are looking for two things, places to practice and some warmer weather.

Coach Stoner's varsity had a practice game with Victor on Wednesday and play a double header at home on Saturday against Webster Schroeder. Their league season opens on April 22 against Clyde Savannah.

Late home run lifts Williamson

Dave DeZutter belted a two-run home run with one out in the bottom of the seventh inning yesterday, as Williamson defeated Lyons, 5-3, in a high school baseball game at Williamson.

With Lyons leading, 3-2, entering the seventh, Brian Vermulen singled. He then stole

second and third bases and scored the tying run on Steve Giroux's single. Giroux scored the winning run on DeZutter's home run.

Bill Maddock hit a two-run home run in the sixth inning to put Lyons ahead, 3-2. Chris Lund was the winning pitcher.

In other area games, Livonia shut out Wayland, 2-0; Wayne edged Sodus, 5-4; Avon ripped Pavilion, 11-1; Marion defeated Red Creek, 6-3; Savona downed Cohocton, 6-4; Palmyra-Macedon beat North Rose-Wolcott, 4-1, in 13 innings and Alexander whipped Byron-Bergen, 12-4, and Naples downed Bloomfield, 8-3.

Greg Meyer struck out 15 en route to a one-hitter as Livonia won in Wayland. John Kuhn had Wayland's only hit, a bunt single in the second inning.

Livonia's Al Clancy drove in the game's only runs with a single in the second inning. He also had a double. Losing pitcher John Crossett allowed five hits and struck out nine.

Dave Gordon won his first game against two losses as Wayne scored one run in the bottom of the seventh inning.

Brian Ameele, who had three hits, singled in the seventh. He moved to second base on a single, to third on a ground out, and scored on Greg Kline's single.

Jeff Hall's grand slam home run in the fifth inning highlighted Avon's rout of Pavilion at Avon. Teammate Blaine Allen added a two-run home run.

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Because of the windy weather there was little baseball action last week. Wayne dropped an 11 to 9 game against Victor on Wednesday that was called after five innings because of the wind and cold, and two games scheduled with Webster Schroeder on Saturday were blown out even though the weather was warm. In the Wednesday game the pitchers for the tool teams gave up a total of 30 walks in the five innings played.

This week Wayne was scheduled to open their league season against Clyde-Savannah on Tuesday and will host Webster Schroeder in a pair of games on Saturday. Next week they have a pair of toughies in Sodus on Tuesday, April 29, and Pal-Mac on Friday, May 2.

Thanks to Coach Imhoff, we have some final statistics on the basketball season. The teams finished the league season with an 8 and 8 record, which tied them for fifth place with Williamson. As a team they shot 41 percent from the field and an excellent 68 percent from the foul line. They averaged 67.4 points per game to 70.3 for their opponents.

Individually, Matt Brown led in field goal percentage with 43 percent, followed by Bobby Hetu with 42 percent and Jerome Stephens with 39 percent. In foul shooting, Jerome was tops with 76 percent, while Matt and Tom Buchiere had 72 percent and Bobby Hetu 69 percent. Bobby Hetu led in rebounds with 175 while Dave Gordon hauled down 124 and Bob Bebernitz 121.

Jerome Stephens, with an average of 23.5 points per game, and Bob Hetu with 13.1 per game were the only players to finish in double figures. Matt Brown had 8.0. Jerome led the league in scoring with 389 points, to 333 for Williams of Sodus, who averaged 20.8. Bobby was thirteen. He led in assists with 73 to 65 for Larry Collins and 41 for Jerome. In steals, Jerome had 72, Hetu 51 and Collins 49. In turnovers, Collins edged Hetu, 91 to 90. Dave Gordon was way out in front in blocked shots with 19. In Coach Imhoff's personal rating system for all-around play in games, Jerome finished far ahead in total points with 591 to 421 for Hetu and 230 for Brown. In exceptional plays, Bobby Hetu had 30, Bob Bebernitz and Larry Collins 23, and Jerome 21. Dave Gordon had 19 although he had much less playing time.

The county All-Star team consisted of Jerome Stephens of Wayne, Larry Luke of Williamson, Chris Williams of Sodus and Dave Schleede and Ed Foster of Lyons. Bob Hetu made the third team.

It was only fitting that the championship game in the senior division of the Wayne County basketball tournament be played between the two clubs that represented the Newark and Pal-Mac quintets during the past season.

The Raiders lost to the Reds in overtime, 74 to 70, in the first meeting but came back in the return engagement to eke out a 79-78 decision on the P-M court. The same players (with the exception of Tom Hickey who played in a younger division) went at it a third time in the tournament finals and this time it was P-M in overtime, 79 to 78. It was a thrilling game which saw the Newark cagers jump to an unbelievable 19-4 early lead at the outset of the contest.

Pal-Mac, which played without the services of Jim Nolan in the first quarter, rallied in the ensuing periods to force the game into overtime. The P-M All-Stars forged to a 72-68 lead with 51 seconds left in the game and made it 74-68 seconds later when Al Brooks was all alone under the hoop.

Coach Joe DeSanto's Lakers refused to quit. They stormed back on a twisting layup by Jim Rivers and two free throw conversions by Tim Tanea with 29 seconds left on the new score-clock. Brooks goes to the line on a one-and-one but misses with 21 seconds remaining.

Rivers gets a similar scoring opportunity for a backcourt violation and dispatches both shots to the score at 74-74 with 15 seconds left.

Rivers steals the ball in the waning seconds of the regulation game and whips it to Mark Lenhart who is off balance when he gets off a last second shot that is wide of the basket. The Pal-Mac club outscores Newark, 5 to 4, in overtime and that was it for the 1975 tournament which was witnessed by 9,088 spectators, according to Larry Darby, tourney director.

Tourney officials said the tournament is the largest of its kind in the state from all reports received at the youth center.

Tim Tanea and Jerome Stephens, the leading scorers in two scholastic leagues this past season, were unanimous selections for All-Star roles in the Wayne County basketball tournament which was concluded at the Alex Eligh Community Center last week.

The selections were made by the Courier-Gazette sports department in cooperation with tournament officials.

Tanea, the top pointmaker in the Wayne-Finger Lakes League (Eastern Division), was a member of the Newark Lakers who bowed to the P/M All-Stars in the finals. The Newark cager scored 93 points in four games while Stephens, the leading scorer in the Wayne County League, accounted for 63 points in three games for the Ontario Bucks.

Joining Tanea and Stephens on the first team are the Nolan cousins, Doug and Jim, who played big roles in the championship game. Doug tallied 109 points in five games and Jim flipped in 78 in the same number of games less one quarter of playing time.

Jim Rivers, a member of the Lakers, received the other first team spot for his outstanding play in the tournament. He netted 71 points but was tigerish in the rebounding department.

Named to the second team in the 17-18 year division were Bob Hetu of Ontario, Al Brooks and Earl MacDonald of Palmyra, Chris Williams of Sodus and Chris Burgess of Newark.

Pat Nolan of Palmyra and Scott Grahl, Barney Lenhart, Jay Burgess and Jay Thomson, all members of the championship Tuskalusa Tucks in the 15-16 year division, were popular choices for first team honors. The Tucks romped to four easy victories in their division. Grahl pumped in 98 points, Pat Nolan knocked in 79 points, Lenhart 59 points, Burgess 56 and Thomson 50 points for their respective teams.

Thanks to B & L Slocum, Old Beam Tavern, and the Macedon Plaza Car Wash (Al Brasser), Ontario will have two fine soccer teams in the Rochester and District Soccer League this summer. These area businessmen are sponsoring the two teams called the Wayne Wings and the Wayne Whips. The Wings will be coached by Charlie Imhoff and will be made up of present and former college players and ex-high school players from the surrounding area. At present the roster consists of Bob Hollis, Art Heberle, Lyle Porray, Bill Drexler, Kevin Hill, Jim Kelly, Glen Cone, Chris Collins, Mike Foley and Roger Hansen, former Wayne Players, Tom Jordan, a fine player from Pen-field, Doug May, former Brockport State star and present J.V. soccer coach at Wayne, Mark Lagoner, Dan Cook and Tom Corterville, ex-Williamson stars, Doug Craine from Red Creek and Mike Erb from Marion.

The Whips will be coached by Joe Molino and will have most Wayne's 1974 soccer champions, along with Randy Luke, Tom Drexler, Bill Burnett, Craig Osterhout, Pat Runne, Jerry Nagel and Don Marvin, former Wayne players, and Nate Wynnn from Williamson. The high school players include Bob Hetu, Jim Mitchell, Mike DeLass, Wayne Coyle, Bryan Loucks, Brian Ameele, Bob Van Hoover, Ron Coon, Don Johnson and Jerome Stephens.

Each player will pay a \$15 registration fee to help defray the cost of referees, etc. The officers of the teams, or the Ontario Soccer Club as they are called, are president Roger Hansen, vice president Randy Luke, and Alan Brasser, secretary and treasurer and general manager.

The Rochester league is made up of 34 teams with three divisions. Both Wayne teams will be playing in division III, which is made up of new teams and some of the weaker teams. To advance to the stronger divisions you must win your league championship. In the division III eight team league, besides the Wings and the Whips, are two teams from Penfield, the North Rose Jets, the Webster Coronadoes, the Polish Americans and Rodenhouse. All games will be played on Saturday or Sunday afternoons or evenings, except when the Wayne teams play each other. They are scheduled on Wednesday evenings. The season opener was scheduled for this Wednesday, May 7, at 6:30 when the two Wayne teams played each other. This Saturday, May 10, at 6:30 p.m. the Wayne Wings play Rodenhouse and the Wayne Whips play Penfield, both at the Wayne Central fields.

Al Brasser has spent a great deal of time during the winter getting things organized that these young men might get a chance to play and you soccer fans could get a chance to see some good organized soccer. He deserves everyone's support.

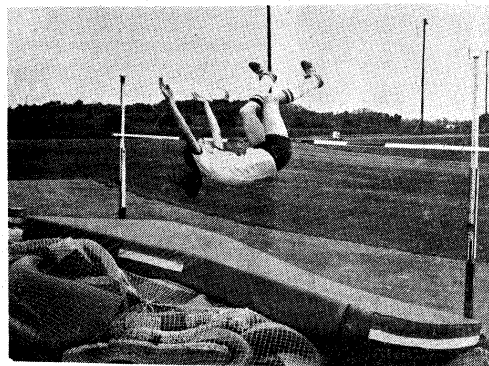

Coach Max Stoner's J.V.'s did not have one of their better years, with a 7 and 11 record, but six of the losses were by four or less points. Chris Maimone led the team in scoring and rebounds. Mark Bellingner was second in scoring and was the team leader in assists and steals. Jeff Trunzo improved the most during the year.

Mrs. May praised her eight varsity and eight junior varsity cheerleaders for their hard work and attendance

and awarded each with a letter or certificate.

Girls gymnastics, another new sport this year, coached by Mrs. Carlson, did not participate in a league this year as no other Wayne County school has the sport.

Besides competing in meets with Monroe County schools, they put on an exhibition before a fine crowd at Wayne Central. Cindy Hinkle, who knew little about the sport until this year, got the trophy for the most improved girl, and Gerry Metcalfe, who performed with excellence and just missed going to the sections was the most valuable.

Coach Raymo's wrestling team, which has improved every year since he has been coach, came up with a fine 12-3 and 1 record and had Wayne Central's first sectional champ in several years. Roy Lang, who had an overall record of 27 and 2, was Section V champion in the 155 pound weight class. He was undefeated in league wrestling and scored 67 points for his team while losing none. Naturally he was the most valuable player. Three seniors had outstanding records, but two saw limited action because of injuries. Don VanDusen was 15 and 1, many of which were pressure matches he had to win or the team would have lost. Teddy Hargather had a fine 10 and 1 record and Pat Catalano was 8-0 and 1. The fourth senior on the team was Rick Lenty, who finished the season very strong and had a 7-6 and 1 record. This was the first winning J.V. team in several years, and with a great freshman team the wrestling future looks bright at Wayne. Lynne Loomis set the school record in the two mile run with a time of 16:21.6 minutes. In the mile relay Nancy Barone, Terry Febrey, June Herring and Theresa Scott ran a 5:05.1 for a school record.

The highlight of the season for this young team was set by Terry Febrey, a sophomore. Her state record of five feet, four inches in the high jump was not only a first in Wayne County but in Section V.

Five girls earned the right to compete in the sectionals, but only Terry Febrey finished first or second and gained the right to West Point. Terry finished fifth in that meet as Section V finished fifth, also, in the 11 section state meet. Terry Febrey was the winner of the most improved player trophy, and Nancy Ormsby took home the most valuable trophy.

In boys' track Mr. Gentile and Mr. Don Vito showed no discrimination by having five girl managers. Dave Dana, Joe Williams, Nick Marcucci and Chris Noone were the captains, and the team finished with a 3 and 5 record.
