

# Lions go from pathetic to fantastic, win 4-0

What a difference a day can make. Tuesday Lyons coach Dana Ford alled his team "pathetic" after it was o-hit by Marion. Yesterday the Lions eat Wayne County League leader Wayne 4-0, and Ford says his team is 'fantastic.'

"It was the best we've looked all eason. I guess maybe we're finally utting something together," Ford aid.

Lyons may be getting things ogether, but it's a little late. Wayne as clinched a tie for the league title. Wayne is 12-2, while second-place Lyons is 9-4.

In other Wayne County play, Clyde-Savannah routed Williamson 22-3.

## Lions 4, Eagles 0

John DiSanto had three hits and two runs batted in to pace the Lions to their win. He and catcher John Sculli, who had two hits, accounted for most of the

Lyons offense.

The Lions jumped on top 2-0 in the first inning. Sculli reached first when a third strike got past the Wayne catcher. He stole second and moved to third on an infield hit by Mike Brown. After Brown stole second, DiSanto ripped a single to left scoring both Sculli and Brown.

Sculli and Brown teamed up again for a run in the fifth. Sculli singled and stole both second and third. He then scored on a squeeze play as Brown bunted.

Leading 3-0, Lyons added an insurance run in the sixth. DiSanto singled and moved to third on a hit by Bob Hauf. Hauf stole second and an error loaded the bases. Sculli then singled to drive home DiSanto.

The Lions may have scored more runs if it hadn't been for a triple play by Wayne in the second inning. With

the bases loaded and no one out, Sculli hit a sinking line drive to left that Wayne's Jeff Morrill made a diving catch of. Believing the ball to have been trapped, all three Lyons runners advanced on the play, only to be thrown out.

"We hit the ball pretty well, our defense was decent, and we got some great pitching," Ford said. "It's hard to lose when you have all that."

Lyons got the pitching from Dan Snell. Snell allowed just four hits in throwing the shutout. He struck out four and walked one.

## Eagles 22, Mauraders 3

"We either win big or lose by a run," Clyde-Savannah coach Bruce Daley said.

Yesterday was a big win day for the Eagles. Clyde-Savannah ripped 19 hits and scored 22 runs in routing

Williamson.

# Reed's 13th strikeout saves Lions

Mike Reed had 13 strikeouts yesterday, including three when he needed them in the final inning to preserve a 6-5 victory for the Lyons Lions over the Palmyra-Macedon Red Raiders in a Wayne County baseball league game.

With Lyons leading 6-3 going into the bottom of the seventh inning, Reed gave up two walks and the Raiders pulled off a double steal to put runners on second and third.

again fell behind 1-0 after two innings, but came up with six big runs in the top of the third to put the game away.

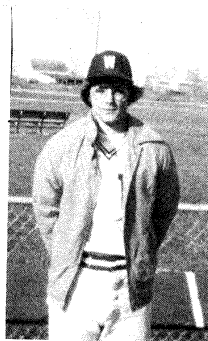

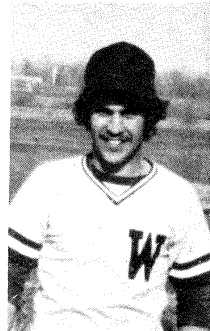
The teams have two games left, both at home. Pal-Mac will be at Wayne today, Thursday, and Sodus comes to town tomorrow afternoon.

## Boys County Champs For Second Year

The Wayne Eagles won their second consecutive championship last Thursday afternoon as the boys came up with five second inning runs to down the North Rose-Wolcott Cougars 6-3.

Wayne went down in order in four of the six innings, but four consecutive hits, a pair of walks and an error in the

second gave them their 13th win of the year and the championship.

The first inning has been a bad one for Wayne all year and last Thursday was no exception. The first batter singled to left field and, when the ball took a big hop far over the fielder's head, it went for a home run. The next batter singled after his pop fly foul was dropped and then he stole second. After a leadoff walk in the top of the seventh, Tim retired two batters on ground balls to second and the third on a pop to the catcher to preserve the victory.

MARTY AMAN - Wayne senior, the top all-around player in the league, was chosen the No. 1 pitcher on the county all-star team. He is also probably the top first baseman in the league, a position he plays when he isn't pitching. He is also one of the league's top hitters with a .435 average.

The sectional qualifier meet is a plateau, reached by only the best athletes. To some it is an indication that they have finally made it in track. To others it is merely a stepping stone to the sectionals, which are to be staged at Hobart on June 3.

The sectional qualifier was conducted at Marion on Thursday, and Wayne was well represented.

Lorenzo Smith sprinted his way into the school record book and a place in the sectionals by finishing fourth in the 440 in 53.8 seconds.

Brian Vandermortel earned two spots in the sectionals with his 10.7 in the 100 yard dash and 24.7 in the 220. Mike Burns reached the sectionals by high jumping five feet, six inches.

Ace hurdler Chuck Fuller broke the school record for the 330 intermediate hurdles. His 44.1 seconds gave him fourth place and a trip to Hobart. Chuck also placed fourth in the 120 high hurdles, running them in 17.2 seconds.

Rick Lutz ran the mile in 4:59 to take a fourth place ribbon and Jeff Town

finished fifth. Ken Hurlbutt ran to fifth in the two mile in 11:06.2.

The excellent 880 relay team of Brian Vandermortel, Chuck Fuller, Mike Burns and Lorenzo Smith will advance to the sectionals after finishing second with a time of 1:38.0.

Congratulations to those who participated.

Wayne track ends its season with a 3-5 record after dropping their final meet to Lyons, which remains undefeated.

# Girls' Team Sets Records

The girls' track and field team finished their season last weekend and, even though their team record wasn't that impressive, they had a super season.

They set six new school records, three by individuals and three by relay teams. Of the 10 girls involved, only one is a senior and three are freshmen.

They dropped their final meet of the season to a strong Marion team on May 19 by the one-sided score of 99 to 29, but still established three new school records.

Sue Scott, a freshman, was a participant in all three. She set a new record in the 440 with a time of 65.9. The old record, held by her sister, Theresa, since 1975 was 67.6.

She then teamed with Joan Nieves, Debbie Reed and Marissa Stephens to set a new record in the 440 relay with a time of 54.7. The old time, set in 1973, was 55.9.

She also was a member of the 880 relay team with Joan Nieves, Debbie Reed and Ann Heller, which broke the old school record of 2:03.3 set in 1973 with a time of 2:00.7. Marissa Stephens is also a freshman, Heller is a sophomore and Nieves and Reed are juniors.

First place winners for Wayne at the Marion meet were Marissa Stephens in the long jump (14 feet, 11 and one-half inches), Sue Scott in the 440 (65.9) and Janet Dutcher in the mile (6:41.1).

Second place finishers were Audrey Stephens in the high jump (four feet, six inches), Deb Reed in the 100 (12.5) and Marissa Stephens in the 75 (9.6).

Finishing in third places for Wayne were Pat Mason in the two mile, Dawn Zakowicz in the shot, Audrey Stephens in the long jump, Beth McGuire in the discus and Deb Reed in the 220.

Last Monday the girls participated in the relays staged at Pal-Mac and came in fifth of the eight county teams. This is the best performance of a three-girl team added up in each event.

Wayne's team of Zakowicz, McGuire and Boutwell took first place in the discus, while in the shot Zakowicz, McGuire and Fuller finished third. Also finishing third were Burns, Dutcher, Greenlee and Jeffers in the two mile; Scott, Nieves, Reed and Marissa Stephens in the 440 relay; and Jeffers, Greenlee, Burns and Dutcher in the long distance medley, which consists of the 220, 440, 880 and the mile.

Finishing fourth in the long jump were the Stephens sisters and Ann Heller. The 880 relay team of Heller, Nieves, Reed and Scott finished in fifth place in the meet, but broke the school record (2:00.7) they had set on Friday in the Marion meet with a time of 1:57.3.
