

Red Creek wins second by forfeit

The Red Creek baseball team won a Wayne County League game by forfeit for the second time in a week yesterday.

The Rams, who won by forfeit over Marion last Wednesday, were ahead of Lyons 5-0 yesterday when they were awarded the 7-0 forfeit.

Lyons, which had no reserves, was forced to forfeit when John DiSanto, who had been warned earlier in the game for throwing his bat, was ejected in the sixth inning for throwing his bat after striking out.

"Needless to say, words were spoken

after the game," said Lyons Coach Dana Ford. "It was an important game. If we won, we would have tied Red Creek for first place." Red Creek is 8-1, Lyons is 6-3.

Red Creek pitcher Paul Schneible struck out 13 and allowed three hits.

The jayvees and junior high teams are at home against Marion on Wednesday, play at home today against Pal-Mac, and go to Red Creek tomorrow.

The boys' tennis team hosted Lyons on Monday and is at the county doubles tournament at NRW today (Thursday) and tomorrow. They play at NRW next Monday and against Sodus at home on Wednesday.

The girls' track and field team was scheduled at Sodus on Monday, took on Williamson and Clyde-Savannah on Wednesday, and tomorrow, Friday, meet NRW at Wayne.

Next week the boys' and girls' varsity ball teams will travel to Lyons on Monday and entertain NRW on Wednesday.

Boys' track will be at Williamson on Tuesday and will be at the Sectional qualifiers at Lyons on Thursday.

Girls' track will be at the Sectional qualifiers, also at Lyons, on Wednesday, May 23.

Wayne's boys' baseball team finished the first half of the season with a three and five record, but with a little luck could easily be tied for the league lead. Three of their losses were in extra innings and lack of any offense lost their first game.

Red Creek looks like the class of the league with a 7-1 record and Lyons is 6-2. Wayne beat Lyons and should have beaten the Rams.

Wayne's four games last week showed in Wayne's lost at Williamson on Friday. The boys were down after two overtime losses to Sodus and Red Creek on Wednesday and Thursday, but it was a pleasure to watch and listen to the best coach in the league, Max Stoner, who continually encouraged his boys and let them know they were not out of the game although they were down 15-3 at one time.

His enthusiasm finally got the boys going and they scored nine runs in the final two innings to make a game of it. A hard line drive that was turned into a double play in the final inning kept the boys from winning.

Don't feel too bad if the boys don't win the overall county championship this year. They have won it the last two years and have only three hometown seniors on this year's team. Two fine-looking pitchers, Ron Green and Tim Strickland, will be back next year, and there are some great looking freshmen and sophomores coming up, along with some good junior high boys. Barring injuries, Wayne's baseball team will be tough the next few years.

One of the big surprises on this year's baseball team has been the play of Mark Osterhout. "Big O" has not only hit well, but has played great defense at first base.

Unearned Runs Lead To Boys' Downfall

Gary Aman, in his first varsity pitching start for Wayne's baseball team, pitched a four-hitter and struck out 10, but 10 walks and five errors by his teammates, which led to five unearned runs, led to his downfall as the Sodus Spartans squeezed by Wayne 6-5 in eight innings last Wednesday afternoon.

Wayne led 4-3 with two out in the final inning and took a 5-4 lead into the bottom of the eighth, only to have Sodus tie the game in the seventh and win it with two in the eighth, all unearned runs.

Wayne took a one run lead in the top of the first inning when John Sculli walked and scored all the way from first on Ron Cedrull's double.

They added three in the top of the third to take a 4-0 advantage. Al Abraham started the inning off with a double and scored on John Sculli's single. Sculli took second on Cedrull's sacrifice and scored on Kirkpatrick's double. After Lisena grounded out, Malone plated Kirkpatrick with a single. Osterhout singled, moving Chris to third, but the next batter popped up.

Sodus got three runs back in the bottom of the inning on two-hits and four walks. The first batter walked and scored on Jackson's triple for Sodus' only earned run. The next batter flied to right and Jack Lisena's perfect throw cut Jackson down at the plate. The next three batters walked, but only after the catcher had dropped two foul flies. A double scored two

runs, but the runner on third later tried to score on a passed ball and was thrown out at the plate.

Wayne failed to score any more runs in the next four innings but Aman also held the Spartans in check until the bottom of the seventh. Aman knocked down the leadoff batter's hard shot but threw wild to first for an error. The next batter walked and both moved up on a wild pitch. The runners held as the batter bounced out to first, but a fly to right field scored the tying run on what should have been the third out.

Wayne went ahead 5-4 in the top of the eighth when, with one out, Mark Osterhout doubled to center and Gary Aman singled, his second of the game, to give Wayne the one run lead. Wayne couldn't stand prosperity, though, as Sodus came back with two unearned runs.

The first batter reached on an infield error and went to second on an error by the catcher. The next batter singled in the tying run but was thrown out by Chris Malone as he tried to steal second. Aman then walked the next three batters to fill the bases and Ron Green relieved Gary. The next Sodus batter then hit a slow roller to Sculli at shortstop, whose throw pulled Osterhout off the bag as the winning run scored.

Sculli, Aman, Malone, Osterhout and Cedrull each had a pair of hits to lead Wayne's 12-hit attack. Al Abraham and Todd Kirkpatrick had the other two.

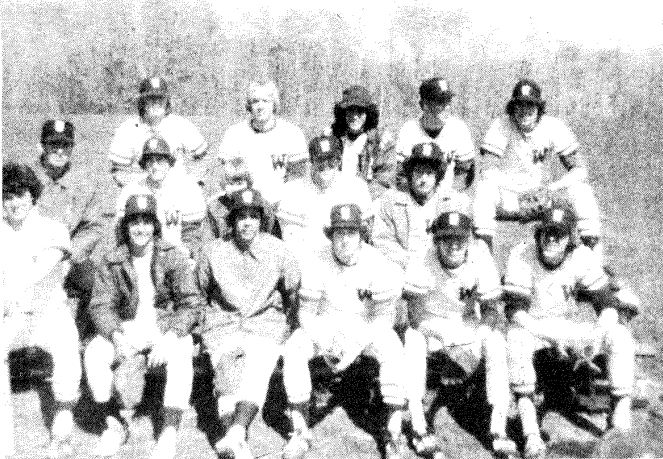

Twelve Runs Not Enough

Wayne Central's boys' baseball team took a 3-0 lead after an inning and a half at Williamson last Friday, but the Marauders came back with six runs in the bottom of the second, four in the fourth and five in the fifth for a 15-3 lead. Wayne rallied for seven runs in the top of the sixth and a pair in the top of the seventh, but it wasn't enough as the home team handed Wayne its third loss in three days, 15-12, and lowered the locals' record to three wins and five losses after the first half of the season ended. John Sculli opened the game with a walk, went to

third on Ron Cedruly's single and scored when the left fielder let the ball get away. Ron moved to second on the play and, after two outs, scored when the pitcher erred on Chris Malone's ground ball. With two out in the second, Mark Finney singled, stole second, went to third when the throw went into center field, and scored when the fielder threw wildly to third.

Tim Strickland, who hadn't thrown in 10 days because of a bruised hand, couldn't find the plate in the second inning and gave up five walks and three hits as Williamson took a 6-3 lead. It wasn't Tim's fault the runs were scored as all were unearned as a result of an infield error.

The first batter walked and moved to third on an infield error. The next man popped to Ron Cedruly back of first base and when the runner on third tried to score, Ron threw him out at the plate for what should have been the third out. Three walks, a double and single then produced the six runs. With four games in five days, Coach Max Stoner had no choice but to leave Tim in as his pitched staff was exhausted. One pitcher quit this week.

Senior Janet Dutcher is top-seeded in the mile walk, which is a new event this year. This event is optional in team meets this year and does not count towards teams points, but will be in the Sectionals this year.

The Williamson meet will be included with the Clyde-Savannah meet, making it a triangular meet at Wayne on May 16. The Marion meet, which was rescheduled to May 28, will not be run on May 31 at Wayne.

Wayne's second inter-divisional meet was at Pal-Mac on May 2 and Wayne once again came away the loser in team scoring. This meet gave Wayne a chance to get girls in the right positions for their first division meet with Red Creek on May 9.

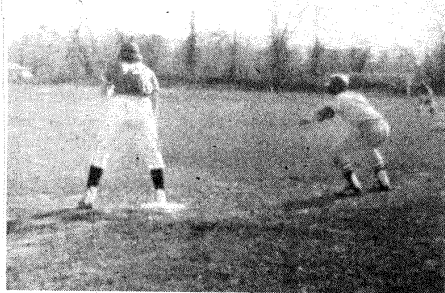
