The Myers-Ingraham American Legion baseball team won the County Championship last Tuesday night when they downed the Palmyra Legion six to zero at Palmyra. This is the first county championship for Ontario in 10 years and

they won it in championship style by turning back the two top contenders, Sodus and Palmyra, in their last two games, both away from home.

On Tuesday both teams threatened in the first two innings but didn't score. Tom Buchiere's fine play on a ground ball in the hole between third and short saved a run in the second. In the third, Ontario broke the ice when Russ Klein singled with two out and when Steve Herrick's hard single to right got by the right fielder, Russ scored from first. Russ Klein sacrificed and reached base on an error that scored Buchiere and Peterson. Klein scored on Steve Herrick's infield single to make it four to zero. Tom Crowley got another infield single and when the third baseman threw the ball into right field, Ontario had runners at second and third. Herrick scored on a wild pitch to give Ontario a five to zero lead. Ontario added a run in the sixth when Billy White walked, stole second, and scored on Tom Buchiere's single.

Congratulations to Coach Bob Mogray and his team on a fine job and to their sponsors the Ontario Myers-Ingraham Post. This was a well coached, fine bunch of gentlemen everyone could be proud of. These boys never missed a game and were always on time. I had the privilege of umpiring some of the games and saw some of the away games, and never once did I see them question an umpire or act in an unsportsmanlike way. This was a well balanced, aggressive team that earned their championship.

I wish I could report that they were still trying for the state

championship, but that hope ended last Sunday night when they met Geneva under the lights at Newark and lost three to one. Ontario jumped ahead one to nothing in the first inning when, with two out, Russ Klein singled sharply to center. Steve Herrick then drilled one to right and when the ball got by the fielder and rolled to the fence, Russ scored Ontario's only run. Geneva tied it in the bottom of the inning when the lead off man hit one to Tom Buchiere that took a bad hop and was safe at first. He stole second and third and scored on a fly ball. Geneva's second run came on a homerun over the left field fence by the first baseman and the final run was the result of a thrown ball that hit an umpire and allowed the runner to score from second. Brad Cuvelier, in his final game, pitched fine ball but Ontario could not hit or score after the first inning as the Geneva pitcher struck out 14. Each team collected only two hits. Most of these boys will be back next year so we can look forward to another good team.

In league scoring Bob Hetu scored 201 points in 10 games for a 20.1 average, Bob Bebernitz 217 in 12 games for 18.1,

Don Johnson 213 in 12 games for 17.8, Larry Collins 186 in 11 games for 16.9 and Wayne Coyle threw in 166 points in 12 games for a 14 point average.

In soccer Bob Bebernitz won two trophies. One for the best juggling of the soccer ball and the other for the best percentage of penalty kicks.
