With graduation last week, the sports scene was rather quiet. I did learn through the grapevine that Coach Max Stoner chose Rich Harens as the most valuable player on the baseball team, and Jim Pick as the most improved, but heard nothing about the other spring sports teams.

The American Legion team, coached by Bob Moggay, was scheduled to open their season on Sunday, but the game was cancelled because of graduation activities at Palmyra. This Thursday (tonight) they will get their season underway with a game under the lights at Newark starting at 6 p.m.

Next Tuesday, July 5, Williamson will be at Ontario and on July 8, Ontario will be at Sodus. All night games are at 6 p.m., according to local Legion baseball chairman Don Anderson.

As promised last week, here are the Sectional playoff single game records. The most points scored in a play-off game was eight by Don Robertson, 11-1-68, against Warsaw, which Wayne won 11-0. In that same game, Tom Gentile scored the most goals, five, and Don Robertson scored the most assists, seven.

In team records, the most goals and most assists scored by a Wayne team was in that same Warsaw game with 11 of each. The most shutouts in Sectional play by Wayne was three in both 1968 and 1969, when they were Sectional champions. In 1968 they beat Warsaw 11-0, Honeoye Falls 1-0, and Spencerport 2-0. In 1969 they defeated Hammondsport 5-0, Spencerport 3-0 and Williamson 5-0. Brian Douglas was the goaltender both years and so had a 6-0 record in shutouts in his two years as varsity goalie in Sectional play.

In local soccer games, the Wayne Whips won their first game of the season, beating the Bukovo team of Rochester 2 to 1 on the home field. The Yugoslavs scored in the first 30 seconds of play when, after the Whips kicked off, they went the length of the field and drilled in a hard shot into the right corner of the nets from the left side.

Mike Corney evened the score at the 15 minute mark when he booted one in from 20 yards out, directly in front of the goal. Less than a minute later he added the second goal on a shot from the left side that hit the goal post and went in.

The Whips had several opportunities in the second half as Tim Doyle barely missed two head shots, one hitting the post, and Dean Loucks missed a penalty shot with 10 minutes left. Bukovo was

short a couple of players and Wayne's poor team play made it a rather sloppy game.

The Wings, playing the Hungarian Americans at Cobb's Hill, fell behind 2-0 by halftime but came back to tie the score at 2-2 on goals by Jim Kelly and Glen Cone early in the second half. The Hungarians went ahead 3-2 soon afterwards, but the Wings tied it up again late in the half as the game ended in a 3-3 tie.

This week the Whips play Irondequoit at Bishop Kearney at 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, and the Wings play Penfield Town at Penfield at the same time.

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The Ontario American Legion baseball team opened its season under the lights in Newark last Thursday night and came up with a thrilling 1-0 victory over the Newark team. Marty Aman, on the mound for Ontario, allowed just two hits, one a 10-foot single in front of the plate, and struck out 10. His opponent, Paul VerPlank, also allowed only two hits and struck out 14 but the Ontario team got the breaks.

Ontario threatened in the first when Jim Pick reached on an error but was stranded at third as some hard shots were caught by the Newark outfielders. Newark had a good opportunity to score in the bottom of the fourth when a Newark batter beat out an infield single with no outs and reached third on a throwing error on a pickoff play. Marty, however, struck out the next batter and when the runner tried to score on a grounder to the box, Marty threw him out at home on a fine play. The next batter went down swinging to end the inning.

Ontario got its break in the top of the sixth when the Newark second baseman couldn't come up with Jim Pick's ground ball. Jim stole second and when Chris Wheeler's ground ball took a high hop over the shortstop's head for a single, scored the only run of the game. A Newark batter walked with two out in the bottom of the sixth but Jim Gardner's perfect throw cut him down as he tried to steal second.

The first Newark batter walked in the bottom of the seventh and reached second on a ground ball to third, but Marty struck out the next batter and got the final out on a fly to centerfield.

This week the team was scheduled to play Williamson at home on Tuesday and will be at Sodus at 6:30 p.m. this Friday (July 8). On Sunday, July 10, Wolcott, a new team, will be at Ontario and on Monday, July 11, Marion will be at Ontario. They also play at Palmyra on July 14, at home against Newark on July 15 and at Williamson on July 16. This is six games in nine days, which is a ridiculous schedule for this age group as the most pitchers any team carries is three.

The Wayne Wings soccer team traveled to Penfield on Saturday night and was beaten by a 4-0 score. The Wings had beaten this team before but were completely outplayed this time. Penfield held a 2-0 halftime lead as they scored 15 minutes into the game on a fine shot at a sharp angle into the left corner of the net.

They scored 10 minutes later as a Penfield player dribbled the ball from the corner through several Wayne players and scored from in close.

Wayne played better defense in the second half but got few shots on goal. Penfield didn't score until the 20-minute mark but then hit a 20-yarder after some nice moves and on which Goalie Bob VanHoover never had a chance.

The final goal was a cheap one as it sliced off a player's foot as he tried to kick it over his head. It came with only 30 seconds left in the game. With a different starting lineup for nearly every game, it is difficult to develop the teamwork necessary to win in this strong league.

After several calls, I could get no report on the Whips' game with Irondequoit.

This week the Wings play at home at 6:30 p.m. Saturday against Hilton and the Whips travel to Red Creek to play that team at the same time.

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The Ontario Legion baseball team played another fine game last Tuesday night as they turned back Williamson 4-1, but then their pitching fell apart on Friday night as they lost a thriller to Sodus, 9 to 8, and their bats went silent on Sunday night as they fell to Wolcott 3 to 1 to even their record at 2 and 2.

In the game on Tuesday night, Williamson threatened in the first inning but did not score. Marty Aman struck out the side, but loaded the bases with walks in between. Williamson scored the first run of the game in the second inning when the first batter singled and went to second on an errant pick-off play. He was attempting to steal third when the catcher's throw went into left field and he scored Williamson's only run.

Ontario tied it in the third on the first of Bryan Smith's three hits, a wild pitch and a throwing error by the shortstop. They added two more in the fifth on three hits and a stolen base. Smith led off with a single and went to second on a ground out. Jim Pick hit to short and Smith was caught at third, but when Chris Wheeler beat out an infield hit, Pick went all the way to third. Chris stole second and Mark Bellinger scored them both with a single to left. The final Ontario run came in the sixth on hits by Gardner and Smith.

Marty Aman pitched a fine game, allowing only three hits and no earned runs while striking out 12 and walking only four. Bryan Smith with 3 for 3 and Jim Gardner with 2 hits and a walk led the Ontario offense.

With Andy Giordano working with his dad out of state, the pitching in the Sodus game was left up to Jim Frauel and "Sparky" Anderson. As neither had worked in some time, they had control problems.

After Ontario went down in order in the top of the first, Sodus scored two runs off starting pitcher Jim Frauel on a walk, a single, an infield error, a single, a walk and another single.

Sodus made it 5-0 in the second on three walks and two more singles, and 6-0 in the third on a single, two walks and a passed ball.

Ontario got a pair back in the top of the fourth as a walk, an error and a single scored a run, and two more walks forced in the second run. They added another in the fifth when Mark Bellinger walked, went to second on a fielder's choice, stole third and came home on an error.

That left Sodus ahead 6-3 and, when they added a run in the fifth to make it 7-3 and held Ontario scoreless in the sixth, it looked like the game was over.

The first two Ontario batters in the top of the seventh were outs and Sodus held a four run lead with one out to go. But this Ontario team has been explosive all year, and things began to happen (Sodus had put in their star pitcher, Jim Sergeant, to start the inning). Mark Bellinger and Rich Harens singled and Jim Gardner walked to fill the bases. When the shortstop bobbled Marty Aman's

ground ball, two runs scored and runners were at first and second. The Sodus pitcher couldn't find the plate and both Tom Cooman and Bryan Smith walked to force in a run and bring Ontario within one, 7-6.

Steve Buchiere, in his first time at bat for the Legion this year, took two strikes and then lined the ball to right center for two runs and an 8-7 Ontario lead. Jim Pick struck out, but all the Ontario boys had to do was get three outs before Sodus scored. They couldn't do it.

Jim Gardner had relieved Sparky Anderson in the sixth and had set Sodus down in order, but the first two Sodus batters in the bottom of the seventh reached base on infield errors and a walked filled them up with no outs. The next batter drilled one over the left fielder's head and the local lads lost it 9 to 8.

Mark Bellinger had an excellent game in the field, making several spectacular plays that stopped Sodus rallies, and Jim Gardner did a great job behind the plate, blocking many low pitches.

On Sunday night against Wolcott it was a matter of weak hitting as the Ontario team could come up with only two hits against mediocre pitching. Marty Aman, as he has several times this year, had a bad first inning, allowing four hits and two runs. He wasn't hit hard, but the ball seemed to have eyes as it wiggled between the infielders. Wolcott added a run in the second on a single and double, but they garnered only one single off Marty for the next five innings as he struck out five in a row at one time.

Ontario made it 3-1 in the bottom of the second as Marty Aman bounced a double over the right field fence and scored on two wild pitches. The only other Ontario hit was a double by Chris Wheeler in the sixth, but he was left stranded. Marty Aman ended up with 10 strikeouts, but his good pitching went for naught as the team couldn't come up with the hits in the clutch.

The pitching and hitting better shape up as they have a heavy schedule this week. On Monday they were scheduled at home against Marion, on Wednesday night they traveled to Palmyra, and tomorrow night, July 15, Newark comes to Ontario. On Sunday, July 17, Ontario will be at Williamson, and on Wednesday, July 20, Sodus will be at Ontario.

In soccer, the Wayne Wings came up with one of their best performances of the season as they shutout the Hilton Dutchmen 3-0, a team they had tied earlier in the season.

Jim Kelly got the Wings on the scoreboard at the 18 minute mark when he anticipated a move by the fullback, intercepted a pass to the goalie and drove it cleanly into the net. Three minutes later Tom Buchiere crossed a ball from the right hand corner to Dan Cook in front of the goalie, who scored from six feet out.

Wayne's third goal of the half and final one of the game

when Jim Kelly was knocked down in the penalty area on a sure goal. Rog Hansen went to the penalty line and easily hit the left hand corner of the net.

The second half was mostly a defensive game as Hilton penetrated Wing territory, but Wayne's fullbacks allowed them few shots and goalie Bob VanHoover's booming punts sent them back up the field. A good game by all the Wing players before their best crowd of the year.

The young Whips dropped another one as Red Creek drubbed them 11 to 2. Tyke Morrill scored on a penalty kick and Mike Corney headed

in a direct kick for the Whips' scoring.

This week the Wings play Pittsford at Pittsford at 6:30 on Saturday night and the Whips are at home against the Scuderi Eagles at 3 p.m. on Sunday at the Wayne field.

According to Tom Johnson, about 18 junior and senior high wrestlers will be going to wrestling camp up in northern New York in the near future. I also understand several boys will be going to soccer camp this summer.

Town Dedicates Station, Flagpole

Walworth Fire District No. 1 hosted a large gathering of Walworth citizens, friends and guests this past Sunday afternoon, August 1, at their new fire station off Church Street in Walworth hamlet.

The occasion was dedication of the newly constructed fire station and dedication of the flagpole, the latter in memory of long-time Walworth resident and town supervisor Charles J. Hack. Special guests included Congressman Frank Horton, retired State Assemblyman Joseph C. Finley of Walworth, and Wayne County Fire Coordinator Donald Walbourne.

Several members of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors were also present. They had served with the late Supervisor Hack on the county level, and included Butler Town Supervisor Marion Crane, Sodus Town Supervisor George Arney (also chairman of the county board), Palmyra Town Supervisor Leroy Aplin, and Ontario Town Supervisor Robert N. Pinkney.

Present Walworth Town Supervisor Carlyle Darron, who was a councilman on the Walworth Town Board during part of Hack's tenure, was on the program. Former veteran town councilman, deputy supervisor under Mr. Hack and interim town supervisor Marvin Ebert was also present, as was Mrs. Lois VanHooover of Walworth, who is clerk of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors. Former Ontario Town Supervisor Bruce Thompson was in the March Kings Band. He also served many years with Mr. Hack.

Following "Stars and Stripes" and "America," by the March Kings band, with Walworth Town Justice Ronald O. Brown, who also served with Mr. Hack on the Walworth Town Board, leading the singing and band, Reverend John Cook of Walworth Baptist Church offered the invocation.

Fire company president David Bulterman then assisted Mrs. Charles Hack with the unveiling of the plaque at the foot of the flagpole, which can also be seen from the Hack residence on Sherburne Road to the south. Mrs. Hack accepted the dedication in memory of her late husband and on behalf of herself and her family. Mrs. Hack was also presented an engraved replica of the plaque on the flagpole base. The base was constructed by Duane Hemelink, a son-in-law of the late supervisor.

Joe Finley remarked on the fine work of Walworth firemen and read a poem he had penned especially for the occasion. He then introduced Congressman Frank Horton, who presented the flag for the new flagpole, which has flown over the U.S. Capitol on July 4, 1976. Congressman Horton also commended the fine efforts of his close friend, Mr. Hack, and the splendid services provided to the Walworth hamlet and to other communities in our county by volunteer fire companies.

Ernest Hack, of Macedon, brother of the late supervisor, raised the colors on the new flagpole, with Mrs. Sylvia Bulterman, president of the Walworth Fire Company Ladies' Auxiliary leading the

Pledge of Allegiance.

The Fire station dedication followed, with acceptance of the building by Walworth Town Supervisor Carlyle Darron. Darron noted that the Town of Walworth has fine fire and ambulance service from Walworth Fire Company and equally fine volunteer efforts on fire coverage by Lincoln and West Walworth Fire Companies, also within the Town of Walworth.

Wayne County Fire Coordinator Don Walbourne, of East Williamson, spoke of the fire communications' network in Wayne County, based at Lyons. He explained how fire companies are dispatched from the control center following phone calls on fires and that the county control center can activate each or all of the fire sirens in Wayne County by radio signal. He also highlighted additional features of fire and ambulance communications in Wayne County.

Charles Pembroke, chairman of the Walworth Fire District No. 1 Board of Fire Commissioners, thanked several persons for their efforts in construction of the new fire station. Also introduced were other members of the Board of Fire Commissioners, including Clayton (Bill) Clark, Clifford Nortier, Bernard Porray and Peter VanHanehgem, a veteran of numerous years in the Walworth Fire Department. Past chiefs, line and social officers and ladies auxiliary members were also introduced.

Reverend Neil Arnold of the United Methodist Churches of Walworth gave the benediction. Refreshments and tours of the new fire station followed. Ladies auxiliary members had charge of the refreshments and reception following the dedication ceremonies.

Walworth Fire Department was established September 29, 1929 with Theron G. Sutton acting as the first chief. The department operated with a chemical cart purchased by George Wignall for \$50, while land for a small fire house was obtained from Ormond Franke for the sum of \$1. In 1931, an addition to the building was necessary to accommodate the department's first truck, a Sanford.

In 1950, the doors on the small fire house were widened to accommodate the department's Chevrolet pumper until space for a larger building could be located.

In the summer of 1950, a small plot of land was purchased from the Grange and a building constructed. This building was outgrown four years ago, when the department's equipment included a Ford Pumper, Ford tanker, Chevrolet pumper, ambulance and van.

Walworth Fire District No. 1 voters decided in favor of a new fire hall on April 17, 1975. Bids for the construction of the new hall were advertised shortly thereafter, with Arc Construction being awarded the contract. Mrs. Rosalin Herriman served as architect, with Christopher B. Mumford serving as attorney.

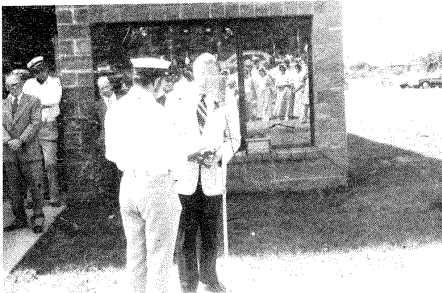
The building was essentially completed in April, 1976, and the fire apparatus was then moved in. Included in the building is an 80 x 80 foot truck room which houses the department's fire apparatus. The 30 x 40 foot dining room has a seating capacity of 100. The fire department equipped the kitchen area with cupboards and appliances as well as pro-

viding the new tables and chairs in the dining room with funds raised from various department activities. As their contribution to the kitchen, the Ladies' Auxiliary purchased a freezer. Two meeting rooms and the radio room complete the building.

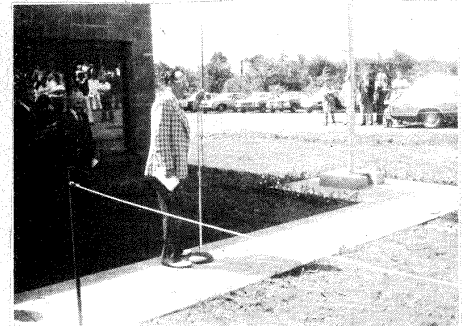
With the help and cooperation of many, many individuals, the Walworth Fire Department has a central location for equipment and various functions.
