THE ONTARIO LEGION baseball team has a busy schedule the next two weeks. They were scheduled at Newark on Monday, were at home against Pal-Mac on Wednesday and travel to Sodus tomorrow night (Friday). Next Monday, July 16, Marion comes to Ontario and on Wednesday Clyde plays two at Ontario, the first game starting at 5 p.m. Newark comes to Ontario on Friday, July 20.

While some towns are having trouble fielding nine players, Ontario has 18 on their list, with from 12 to 15 showing up for each game so far. This is excellent considering early starting times and boys having jobs. Coach Max Stoner has done a great job getting all boys into most games.

Of the boys who have played all four games, Ron Cedruly is the top hitter with a .538 average on seven for 13. John Sculli is eight for 17 for .470 Chris Malone and Tim Strickland are five for 11 for .455 and Fred Rogers is four for seven, hitting .570 The team average to date is a great .378.

Besides all these players, Ontario has two teams in a Babe Ruth league in Webster. Several of these boys are capable for playing Legion ball but can get more playing time with those teams. There is a bright future for varsity baseball teams at Wayne Central, probably the best of any sport.

AN ALL-STAR GAME was played at Newark last Sunday between June graduated seniors from Wayne and Ontario counties. Before the game, played in Colburn Park, the players from the Newark Co-Pilots put on a clinic for the boys in each position that they played.

In the nine inning game played afterwards, the Ontario County team defeated Wayne County 6-2, but the four Wayne Central boys who played were outstanding. All four - John Sculli catching, Jack Lisena at first, Ron Cedruly at second and Chris Malone at third - played the whole nine innings and collected four of the team's seven hits.

John Sculli led off and had two hits and two walks in five at-bats and drove in the first run. Ron Cedruly was hitless but had a sacrifice and played errorless ball, coming up with one great play back of first base. Chris Malone and Jack Lisena also played errorless ball and each had a hit in four at-bats.


The Ontario County team got the break of the game in the second inning when, after the Wayne County pitcher, Paul Schneible, walked a pair, the next batter hit a fly to center, but the fielder slipped on the grass and fell to his knees and the ball just missed the top of his glove, allowing a three-run homer.

They scored two more in the second for a 5-0 lead on a walk, hit batsman, stolen base, error and single.

After that Schneible allowed only one base hit and one unearned run, but except for the Wayne Central boys, the Wayne team had little punch. They scored one in the fifth on singles by Nortier of Marion, Hauf of Lyons, a walk and John Sculli's single, but left the bases loaded.

The Wayne team had only the one pitcher and only two substitutes, so the coach had little choice.

THE WAYNE WINGS were idle last week but were scheduled to have played Williamson at home last night, Wednesday. Next Wednesday night they play Southeast at the Wayne field.



Jim Frauel gave up just two hits and one unearned run as Ontario beat Clyde 14-1 in the first game of a double-header at Ontario last Wednesday night.

In the second game, Gary Aman struck out nine in four innings and Ontario had five first inning runs and five more in the fourth for a 13-1 run in a game cut to four and one-half innings because of darkness.

In the first game, Tim Strickland, Jim Frauel and Gary Aman each had three hits and John Sculli, Joe Guelli and Ron Green two each as the local boys pounded out 17 hits on the way to the easy win.

John Sculli singled to start off the bottom of the first for Ontario, stole second and scored on a pair of throwing errors. Gary Aman singled and scored from second on Jim Frauel's single to give the

Frauel allowed only two hits and struck out seven.



So what happened? The commissioner didn't even come to the game, in fact just about the only Legion man there was the Wolcott coach.

It doesn't have to be a baseball man to run the league but it does have to be an organizer and someone to keep things running smoothly. Some of the fault lies with the managers, too, but every organization needs a good leader.
