WAYNE — The Wayne Eagles lost their top bird this year and he took three starters with him via graduation to put Coach Chuck Imhoff in a rebuilding situation.

Jump shot artist Cliff Harrell, now at Monroe CC, leaves a 18 pts per game average to fill and leaves Wayne in the same situation as Sodus and the departed Bob Blakely.

Also lost to the Eagles were starters Bill Burnett (15,4), Paul Schmidt (13,2), and all-league selection Bill Lewis.

The only starter returning to Imhoff is 5'6" junior guard Chris

Collins, who averaged about 8 pts a game last year.

With that situation facing him, Imhoff will have to decide on a starting lineup from four senior lettermen, all the six top players from a very impressive 15-3 IV team of last year





The winter sports program really gets under way for Wayne Central this week. The wrestlers opened their season at Sodus Wednesday night and travel to North Rose-Wolcott tomorrow (Friday) night. The JV's wrestle at 6:30 p.m. and the varsity at 8:00 p.m. The freshmen basketball team opens their season at home tomorrow afternoon at 4:00 p.m., followed by the JV's at 6:30 p.m. and the varsity at 8:00 p.m. all at here against Seduce.

Coach Raymo whose team finished with a fine nine and four record last year is very enthusiastic about this years team. He has several veterans back including league 155 pound champion Al Catalano and runnerup to the champion in 177 pound class, Rick Anderson, plus some fine looking freshmen. All the boys have certified for their weight class which means they have to wrestle at this weight or one higher. They cannot wrestle in a lower class even though they make the weight. In wrestling there is no permanent first or second team. Any varsity wrestler may be challenged weekly and the winner is the one who wrestles varsity, so it is hard to tell you who will be wrestling any certain match. Therefore, I'l just give you a rundown on the 98 pound class Rick Leuty and Mike Jeffers are back after seeing service on both the varsity and JV's last year, but three freshmen are giving them a good battle. Larry Bamford, Brian Schenk and Ed Hawkins have looked real good and any one of the above five could be a starter. For the opening matches it will probably be Rick Leuty or Larry Bamford. At 10. Teddy Hargarther, who did such fine job last year, appears to be top man but three more freshmen, Eric, Johnson, Billy Reynolds and Jeff Halloway haven't conceded a thing. Billy Bellingham and Billy Dixon, both of whom wrestled mostly JV's last year, are trying to get the nod at 112, but another tough young freshman, Al Flint may beat out both of them.

To the Newark wrestlers

I had a visitor today who told me something I feel is worth looking into.

His name is Jeff Kaller. Jeff

was a standout on the Newark Reds football team this year and now is on the Reds wrestling team.

He wanted to know if I knew why the Newark wrestling team not invited to the Wayne County tournament to be held at North

Rose-Wolcott Dec. 29:

I, of course, was shocked to hear that the Reds were not invited after beginning the tournament themselves seven years ago. They had been a participant every year until now, when Jeff says they weren't invited this year.

"I don't understand it," asked the 177-lb. senior, "we've all been looking forward to the tournament and we're even going to send our second team to a tournament in Auburn so we can

go to the county tournament."

Kaller said he couldn't understand why the other schools voted to keep Newark out this year. The Reds are not a powerhouse team and have never even won the routnament. "Wayne and last year Pal-Mac are the only ones that have even won it." Kaller recalled.

He wondered if maybe the fact that Newark was now a full-fledged member of the W-FL had anything to do with it. "But then," he said, "Wayne and Pal-Mac he said, "Wayne and Pal-Mac are too and they wrestle the same schools we do and are Class A schools also."

I felt the question was legitimate enoughto look into. So here's what I did.

I called Al Gentile, athletic director at Wayne Central School and wrestling Chairman for the county. Gentile welcomed me call to explain that "I am not, personally, keeping Newark out of the tournament. By their complete split from all Wayne County sports, they have excluded themselves from the tournament. Geographically they're still in the county but they are not a Wayne County wrestling team "

Gentile continued by saying, "I've been getting a lot of calls from people in Newark who think I'm keeping their wrestlers out. "They do not pay any league fees or any additional stipends to pay for the trophys handed out to the winners.

Concluding, he said the fault for the mixup belongs to the Newark Athletic department. They knew about this but no one ever told the coach or wrestlers, according to Gentile.

He then urged me to call Ced Tiebout, Athletic Director at Newark, and Ted Woods of North Rose-Wolcott president of the Wayne League.

First, however, I called Harold Haupt, wrestling coach at Newark. This is what he said, "I thought that although Newark has left the Wayne County Association, we would still be invited to the Christmas wrestling tournament since it was originated in Newark. It's true we have left all Wayne County sports but we wrestle the same teams the rest of the county schools do."

Continuing, Haupt said, "There will be no change now. The decision has been made. It is hard on the seniors who have aimed for this tournament. But, it's something we'll just have to go along with. It's bad for us but I can see their side of the situation, There should be no hard feelings. I was under the assumption that we were going and there's no one to blame but myself for not finding this out. I'm the guilty one," he concluded.

Next, I called Ted Woods. Ted is President of the Wayne County Athletic Directors and he

explained it further. "Newar made a formal request last yea which was granted, to leave the Wayne County Public Hig School Athletic Association. Th

wrestling tournament for schools that are members this association, Newark is not. Concluding, he said, "Then was no problems as far as Ce

Tiebout was concerned. He kne that we were going to take th action because we had no choic in view of Newark's withdrawa. However, the Newark wrestlir coach wrongly assumed the were still automatically in tl tournament."







Denny Verkest.. Hard work pays off

Denny Verkest is rapidly proving that small men can accomplish great things. Standing a mere 5'4' and weighing only 98 pounds, Verkest has emerged into what many consider the best wrestler in

Wayne County.
A senior at North Rose-Wolcott high school, Denny is completing his fourth year of varsity compttition.

"When I was a freshman recalls Denny, "I only weighed 76 pounds but I had to wrestle one weight class higher (105) because we already had a real good 98 pounder in John Abrams."

In that his first season, wrestling against competition nearly 30 pounds heavier than himself, Denny compiled a 6-6 won lost record.

In his sophomore year, Abrams moved up a weight class and Denny, almost 20 pounds heavier, moved in as the lone 98 pounder. In only his second season, Denny completed 20-2 overall reacord, losing only in the Section V Class

B championships.
In his junior year, Verkest continued to improve, finishing with a 22-2 record and finishing third in the sectionals. He suffered his only dual meet loss in the last three years in this junior season when he was decisioned a tough opponent from Dundee

Now, again sweeping through Wayne County competition, where he is undefeated in the last three years, Denny again has his sites set on the Section V Class B championships.

John Abrams was the only sectional champion that North Rose-Wolcott has ever had and he did it twice. First as a 105

pounder in his junior year and then as a 112 pounder in his senior campaign. Denny's goal is to go one step higher than Abrams and to win the Section V A-B championships, thereby earning the right to participate in the state tournament held each year

at the Syracuse War Memeorial. Should he make the state tournament he would be matched against the top 12 wrestlers in his weight class in the state. But prior to that, Denny must defeat prior to that, Definy must dereat the same wrestler that eliminated him last year in the sectional semi-finals. Denny's top opponent, who is from Geneseo, is also in his last year of varsity competition so the sectionals should prove to be a tough hurdle to clear in his bid to qualify for the state tournament.

However, Denny's coach Ron Behe feels that Denny has an excellent chance of defeating his

top rival.
"Denny has improved a great deal this season and he has also gotten a bit stronger while the other boy seems to be about the

same. At any rate it will be a very close match." Coach Behe was full of praise for his top wrestler when asked Denny's overall contribution to the team.

"As team captain, Denny provides a good example for the rest of the team. Always the hardest worker, he shows the rest of the team what is necessary to

produce a winner.."

Indeed, this season the Cougars are off to their best start ever as they boast a 4-1 won-lost record gained a second place finish to Wayne Central in the Wayne County tournament.

In that tournament. Verkest was voted the Outstanding Wrestler by the coaches and officials as he pinned all three of his opponents in quick fashion.

Unbeaten in all eight matches this season, Denny's latest competition came last Friday evening against top rival Dundee. In typical fashion, he pinned his opponent at :20 of the first period to lead the Cougars to a close 32-27 victory.

Verkest, Denny lives with his parents and his two sisters Stephanie, 16, and Julie, 9, in the small hamlet of North Wolcott. The distinct absence of any brothers from the Verkest family seems to be a good sign for other Wayne County schools as they won't have to worry about any future Verkests as opponents. Denny's 56-10 record over four years of varsity competition is a solid reminder of his domination over his Wayne County foes.
Up until this season, Denny has

had no problems with keeping his weight easily below the necessary limit. But this year he has been faced with losing a few pounds before matches.

"I realize what some kids have to go through to keep at their wrestling weights," observed Denny, "so I really don't feel too bad about having to take off a few pounds on occasion.'

Denny has complemented his wrestling knowledge gained at North Rose-Wolcott by attending North Rose-Wolcott by attending two summer camps for wrestlers. After his sophomore year he attended the Manlius wrestling school and last summmer he went to the Lemoyne camp. These summer camps combined with some offseason weight lifting have helped develop Denny into top physical condition and have also given him a mature knowledge of the

Looking back over his four years of wrestling competition, Denny cited the increased spectator interest as one of the most satisfying occurrences of his career.

inned his opponent at :20 of the rst period to lead the Cougars to close 32-27 victory.

The son of Mauriceand Lucretia erkest, Denny lives with his agents and his two sisters. to fill two sections of bleachers for some of our matches. I always wrestle a lot harder if my family or close friends are there to watch me, I wouldn't want to get heat in front of them."

Following his graduation this spring, Denny plans to enlist in the Air Force with the possiblility of making it a career.
"I've talked to a recruiter and

he says that it would be possible to continue wrestling in the Air Force if I could make the team. Our opposition would probably come from small colleges or other branches of the service."
Of course, first Denny would

have to put on a little weight because the lowest he could wrestle in the Air Force would be at 118 pounds.

"It really wouldn't matter, "
suggested Denny, "because I'd
have to put on some weight for the service anyways.'

However, now what faces him is his present goal of a Section V A-B championship. With his matches more than one-third over and having won all his bouts by pins this season, Denny seems well on his way to obtaining his goal.

If his past success and his strong determination are any indication of his future indication of his future accomplishments his goals will most likely become a reality.





shot.


Manning hit one of two free throws before Perry hit two of his own and a 54-49 Sodus lead with 5:44 left in the game.
