

North Rose-Wolcott tries to stop "Sodus Express"

Canandaigua matmen beat Wayne, 38-12

Pausing only to catch it's breath, the Wayne County basketball league gets right back into the swing of things tonight with a full slate.

The Sodus Spartans (11-0), apparently headed for an undefeated season and top seed in the Section 5 tourney, will play host to North Rose-Wolcott (2-9).

The Red Creek Rams, (8-2) not far behind Sodus, will swing back into action by travelling to Lyons (3-8).

The Marion Black Knights (3-8), fresh off a win over Williamson, will play host to the Wayne Eagles (5-5) and Pal-Mac (7-4) will travel to Williamson to play the Marauders (3-7) for the second time.

Clyde-Savannah, not scheduled for a league game, will bring their 7-5 mark to South Seneca in a non-league contest.

The Sodus-North Rose-Wolcott contest will pit the top against the bottom.

Sodus, after cruising by Wayne 72-58, now stands at 11-0 in league play and 13-0 overall. They boast the best defense in the league, allowing only 50.1 points per game.

Offensively, the Spartans are led by 6'2" junior forward Joe Jackson, averaging 18.2 points a game, a figure good enough for third place in the league scoring derby. Jackson is also an outstanding rebounder and along with junior Brad Perry, give Sodus an unbeatable 1-2 punch on the boards.

Also in double figures is senior guard Jed Dodge, hitting at an 11.0 clip. The only returning starter from last year, Dodge handles the playmaking chores with a deft hand. He also is capable of some deadly outside shooting and is a good driver.

Added to this repertoire are forwards Gary Zeger and Dan Thomas. Zeger (8.4) is the best bank shot artist in the league. Thomas has been a welcome plus since leaving Lyons before the season started. The 6'2" junior has ripped off three straight double figure games and is one of the Spartans better ball-handlers.

Up again this fire power, the Cougars would seem to have no more chance than the proverbial snowball-in-hell. But, the league has seen it's share of upsets so don't count them out yet.

Coach Ted Woods' outfit has been reeling, that is for sure, but if they can play like they did in beating Pal-Mac recently, it could be a good ballgame.

The Cougars' top pointmaker is veteran guard Barry Jones, who ranks sixth in the league with a 14.5 average. Other Cougars who are capable of big nights are guard Chris Cramer, and forward Wes Collier.

NR-W will be hurt by the loss of their second leading scorer, center Royce DuVal (12.1), out for two weeks.

In the first meeting between the two, Sodus won 63-54 at North Rose.

Another interesting game could be in the making at Lyons, where

Red Creek brings their 8-2 mark.

Record wise, the game should be no contest, but Lyons still has Alan Simmons, the league's top scorer. If he gets any help at all, the Lions could give the Rams a run for their money.

Lyons has struggled through a disastrous season so far, beating only Marion, North Rose-Wolcott, and Williamson in league play.

Simmons (21.9) has been the sole bright spot but even another hot hand to help may not be enough.

In the first meeting at Red Creek, guard Nick Sculli pumped in 28 points but the Lions still were beaten 91-79 by the Rams balance.

The Rams boast the top offense in the league, scoring an average of 69.8 points per game. Defensively, Red Creek doesn't fare so well, giving up 64.5, worst in the league.

Red Creek's success lies in their team balance. Four starters are in double figures and the fifth is not far behind. Leading the Rams is 6'2" junior forward Craig Guthrie, hitting at a 16.4 clip, fourth in the league.

He is joined by junior guard Charlie Johnson, (13.6), senior center Bryant LaGoe (12.6) and senior guard Jon Park (10.2). Forward Dave Smith is close behind at 9.7.

Elsewhere, Pal-Mac (7-4) and fresh off a 60-53 victory over Lyons Friday night, will try to beat Williamson for the second time this year.

The first meeting resulted in a 72-63 Raider win. The Raiders

have been up and down lately but now have won two in a row. Mike Morgan, a 6'1" junior, is the loop's second leading scorer, with an 18.7 average. He is supported by Jim Nolan (10.3) in double figures.

Pal-Mac has the league's third stingiest defense and Williamson, losers of two straight since knocking off Red Creek, will be coming off their worst offensive showing of the season.

The Marauders could only put 41 points through the nets in losing to Marion Friday night, and hit for only four points in the final period.

Williamson has had problems with illness but now have everyone healthy. Junior Dave Van Gorder and senior Chip Marcellus, both forwards, lead the offense with average of 11.6.

Finally, the resurgent Marion Black Knights (3-8) will host the Wayne Eagles (5-5), hoping to keep the momentum of their 54-41 win over Williamson alive.

After a disastrous 0-7 start, Coach Joel Griffing's charges have now won three of their last four games to lift themselves out of the cellar.

Still not generating offense (only 52.1 per game), Marion has improved their defense considerably, now allowing 60.1 pts. per contest.

Forward Jeff DeLyser, coming off a 24-point night against Williamson, is the only Black Knight in double figures at 10.3. Kevin Hosmer (9.5) has had good scoring nights, as has center Steve Roegiers.

CANANDAIGUA—The Wayne Eagles lost their second W-FI. Esat wrestling match of the year Saturday when they fell to unbeaten Canandaigua 38-12.

The Eagles jumped out to a 9-0 lead on a decision by Ron Fisher at 101 and a pin by Ted Hargather at 107.

But the Braves, 7-0 in league play, went on to win nine of the next 10 matches.

Geno Affronti, Wayne's standout a 170 , remained undefeated with a decision over Frank Mandrino.

Simmons, Lyons shock cold Red Creek 79-66

Lyons: Coach Frank Lisco has been searching all season long for a lineup that would shake the Lions from the throes of a disastrous season.

He may have found it last night as the revamped (again) Lions upset the Red Creek Rams 79-66 under a blistering first quarter.

The Lions jumped off to a 14-0 lead as they caught the Rams stone cold at the outset. Ed (the Snake) Foster and Mark Lazar meshed quick jumpers and senior Al Simmons canned a free throw for a 5-0 lead with 5:48 to go in the quarter.

Lyons opened with a press that produced six early Red Creek turnovers the Lions wasted no time in converting to points.

Simmons whipped a perfect length-of-court pass to Steve Tricarico for a layup and a 7-0 lead.

Red Creek, meanwhile, was missing their first seven shots, including three layups.

Lazar pushed a rebound back in to make it 9-0. He added a free throw along with a pair from Simmons for a 12-0 bulge.

Foster swished a six-footer to make it 14-0 before the dazed Rams called time out with 4:20 to go in the quarter.

The league's top offensive team had gone 3:40 without scoring,

while Lyons, superpsyched for the game, couldn't miss.

Bryant LaGoe finally broke the Ram's scoring drought with a rebound but Lazar answered that with an eight footer and a 16-2 score.

Charlie Johnson, who played an outstanding game, and Simmons, having his best game of the year, traded buckets to make it 18-4. Not only were the Rams cold from the floor but they had a horrendous night from the free throw line.

Steve Tricarico hit four straight free throws to open the bulge to 20-4. Lyons took the press off shortly after and the Rams began a press of their own.

The quarter ended at 29-12 and the Rams were in trouble. Their leading scorer, forward Craig Guthrie, picked up three quick fouls and spent most of the next two quarters on the bench.

Johnson and Foster exchanged baskets to open the second quarter as Red Creek slowly began to inch back into the game.

By halftime the Rams had pulled to within 13 at 43-30.

The third quarter saw Lyons, with Simmons exhibiting some breathtaking moves, pull away to a 17 point lead, only to see Red Creek slash that to five.

After Simmons scored two

consecutive buckets to make it 47-30, Red Creek rattled off the next six points.

With 5:40 to go in the quarter, the Lions held a 49-36 bulge. LaGoe's free throw and Guthrie's five footer made it 49-39 before Simmons canned a 15-footer.

Guthrie pushed a rebound back in and Johnson hit a 12-footer to draw the Rams to within eight at 51-43 with 3:50 to go in the quarter. Simmon's layup was matched by Jon Park's eight footer but Lou Zacharilla swished a 10-footer to make it 55-45.

Simmons picked up his fourth foul and departed momentarily. During his absence, Red Creek used a fifteen footer by Guthrie, and and buckets by Demarest and LaGoe to draw within three points at 55-52.

Glen Weimer's free throw ended the quarter at 56-52. Lyons had seen a 17 point lead shrink to four points with the fourth quarter yet to come.

Lisco went to his bench for senior Nick Sculli to begin the deciding fourth quarter and he responded with two long jumpers for a 60-52 Lyons lead with 7:12 left.

The Lions once again parlayed a hot streak into a sizeable lead when Simmons and Sculli combined for four points and a 64-

52 lead.

Johnson tried to single-handedly bring the Rams back with a 10-footer and a layup off steal to make it 64-56 with 5:49 left.

Simmons and Smith traded buckets but the Lions refused to fold, outscoring the Rams 13-10 the rest of the way to earn their fourth lead win against eight losses.

Simmons, playing his best game of the year, poured in 31 points. Mark Lazar added 13 and Tricarico and Foster had 10.

Johnson led Red Creek with 24. LaGoe added 13 and Smith 10.

Charts showed Red Creek with a 44-42 rebound edge. Lyons hit 40 percent (29 for 72). Red Creek could manage only 32 percent (26 for 82).

Red Creek is now 8-3 in league and 10-3 overall.

TIP-IN'S Red Creek coach Don Hartley lamented over the Ram's foul line miseries... "We usually hit about 70 percent" he said... "It was just too hard to come back and we never hit well in Lyons. Having Guthrie out hurt too" he said.

Lisco was happy with Lyons' lack of mistakes... "We didn't make as many mistakes early" he observed, "and really hustled"

Red-hot Marion nips Collins-less Wayne

Marion: The Marion Black Knights, despite having one of their top scorers on the bench with foul trouble, stunned the Wayne Eagles last night 48-47. Jeff DeLyser, who hit for 24 points last Friday, sat out much

of the game and ended up scoreless.

Kevin Hosmer, Steve Roegiers, and Tom Haak picked up the slack, however, as Marion won their fourth game in their last five outings.

Hosmer scored 14, Roegiers and Haak 10 apiece as the Black Knights erased a 38-32 Wayne lead after three quarters.

Reserve guard Bruce Stone led the way by pumping in all nine of his points in the fourth quarter.

Wayne now 5-6 was led by Bob Hetu with 12, Clete Manning with 11, and Glen Cone with 10.

The Eagles leading scorer, guard Chris Collins, fouled out a minute into the second quarter and failed to score a point for the losers.

VanGorder sparkles in 73-58 win over Raiders

Williamson: The Williamson Marauders, exploded to a 20-6 first quarter lead and were never behind in beating Pal-Mac last night, 73-58.

VanGorder pumped in his season high of 23 points and got help from Bob Kuhn and Chip Marcellus. Kuhn poured in 16 points and Marcellus added 14 for

Williamson, now 4-7 in league play. Pal-Mac crawled to within five points in the third quarter but the Marauders outscored them 21-17 in the final frame for the victory.

Mike Morgan led the losers with 13 points. Jim Nolan added 12 and Tom Lindsay 10. Pal-Mac is now 7-5 in league play.

The purpose of sports: a view

With the considerable amount of controversy surrounding sports these days, I would like to give a view of sports that I think puts it in a proper perspective. Sports, and it's myriad of games, both team and individual, should serve two basic functions. First is to provide an outlet for activity and second is to entertain.

In it's purest form, sports is a pickup game of touch football, a schoolyard or play ground basketball or baseball game, etc. My childhood, and probably yours to, is full of memories of neighborhood games. That first contact with sports gave a much needed outlet for my physical energy.

That brings us up to the role of organized sports. I feel that the childhood experiences with sports and athletic should form the basis for organized sports.

The motivation and the enjoyment from sports should be the same for all sports. High school sports should be designed to allow, I think, for kids to keep their interest in athletics.

Sports, in my view, is one of the greatest stimulants to the body and mind in these days of conflict. It is a common bond of activity that allows one to escape from the everyday life into a world of sweat, fresh air, the joy of success and the excitement of a close game.

It allows one to be creative and to allow the spirit some laughter and good times.

But in organized sports, these simple values found in sports seem to take a back seat to a new force.....winning.

Pure sport has winning as a secondary motivation. If one does win, fine, but if not, the absolute joy of a good game of basketball, as an example, should make it all worth while.

When the all-pervasive aspect of winning enters with the passion it does in high school sports, the one who suffers is the participant. Sport no longer becomes fun, it becomes a chore. To heck with

whether the players had a game, time, who won? That's attitude of many.

Don't get the idea that I winning is not to be strived. Sports is much more fun when result of all that sweat, hush and bruises is a victory yourself or your team.

Winning should be put in proper perspective on the school level. Coaches stress winning and do what he can to give his player chance to enjoy winning.

He should not make the idea winning such an obsession that obscures the real purpose of high school sport-to become positive force in the mental physical growth of young people.

Sportsmanship may sound an old-fashioned word that laughed at by many of today's youth. It is, in my view, athletics should foster how rather than angry losers arrogant winners.

As I said, this is just one year-old sports editor's view based on my experiences. I undoubtedly would place considerably more emphasis on winning and competitive but I hope most are agreeable to the idea that sport is supposed to be an enjoyable experience sweetened by victory but diminished by losing.

The Vince Lombardi philosophy of "Winning everything...it's the only thing that has no place in high school sports. There would be fewer conflicts such simplifications were not common.

It was a beautiful play. At halftime Wayne led 39 to 30.

Clete scored from underneath and Chris hit a free throw as Wayne took their biggest lead of the game 42 to 30. Gurthie and Johnson scored for Red Creek and then Gurthie hit two more as Wayne's big lead faded, but Chris hit on two foul shots and Jim Kelly and Clete Manning baskets to give Wayne a 47 to 38 edge. After Park scored for Red Creek, Wally Wyse hit one from the side and Chris hit two more from the charity strip to give Wayne a seemingly safe lead 51 to 40 going into the final quarter.

Gurthie found the range again for Red Creek but Wally Wyse came back with a jumper to give Wayne their 11 point lead again with 6:58 left. Red Creek put on a full court press at this point and Wayne started turning the ball over. Big Bryan Lagoe, who had not scored a point, got two baskets and two free throws and after Doug Craine scored his only basket, got two more free throws to cut Wayne's lead to one, 53 to 52 with 4:34 to go. Chris Collins hit two from the charity stripe to increase the lead to three but Gurthie hit four straight long one handers to put Red Creek in front 60 to 55 with 3:05 left in the game. Wayne didn't give up as Jeff Loucks hit one and Jim Kelly got two in close as Wayne regained the lead 61 to 60. Johnson and Kelly exchanged baskets and after Lagoe put Red Creek ahead, Clete Manning gave Wayne their last lead at 65 to 64. With 1:07 left, Smith put in a layup to regain the lead for Red Creek. At this point,

for some unknown reason, Wayne chose to freeze the ball and look for one good shot. This is fine if the score is tied, but when you are behind, your chances of missing the shot or losing the ball are much greater than making the shot. They lost the ball with 22 seconds left without getting a shot off and Red Creek took over. Wayne had to press to try to get the ball and Lagoe got away for an easy layup to sew it up. Jeff Loucks scored with three seconds left to make it 68 to 67.

Max Stoner's boys came up with their best effort of the season and a very satisfying victory. Behind 28 to 4 at halftime and losers 53 to 31 in their first encounter, Wayne held their opponents scoreless for nearly four and one half minutes

and led 11 to three at the end of the first period. Wayne could score only five points themselves in the second quarter as Red Creek took the lead, 19 to 16 but, 16 points in each of the final two quarters gave the Wayne boys their second victory of the season. These boys are finally beginning to move. Neal Smith who has been good defensively all season had his best game offensively pouring in 14 points. Little Jerome Stevens had another good night directing the team and scoring 15 points. Tom Harmon came off the bench in the third quarter to spark the team with two baskets and some aggressive rebounding. There's only one way for this team from now on. That's up.

Wayne's fine bowling team has a chance to take over first place in the league this afternoon (Thursday), when they bowl the league leaders. North Rose-Wolcott. Clyde-Savannah is in third place. Lyons fourth and Sodus fifth in the five team league. Last week Wayne took three of four points from Sodus with Bobby Moak leading the way with 534. Paul Taylor leads the Wayne team in average with 175. Bob Moak has 167. Steve Chinelli, 164, and Pat Renne and Bob Van Hoover are at 150.

The Wayne wrestlers went on a pinning spree last week as the JV's swamped Pal-Mac 60 to six and the varsity picked up victories number nine and ten with lopsided victories over Pal-Mac, 40 to 18 and Lyons, 53 to six.

The JV's won every match by a forfeit or a pin and Pal-Mac's six points were on a forfeit. Ron Fisher, Mike Harons, Paul Farrell and Don Van Dusen won by forfeit and the following won by pins. Dave Hyland at 1:00. Rick Leuty at 1:04. Bill White at 1:08. Al Flint at 1:45. Larry Mitchell at 1:51 and Marty Slade at 5:47.

For the varsity, the fast improving Larry Bamford had a pin at 5:40. Teddy Hargarther, back from his injury, had a pin at 4:40. Billy Dixon wrestled Ketchim, the County Champion, on even terms for two periods, but lost nine to three. Bobby Azzono dropped a seven to one decision but Roy Lang, who had dropped several close decisions before he beat a Newark boy last week, came up with a pin at 3:54 and brother Rick clobbered his man 24 to two to put Wayne out in front 22 to six. Tom Fisher lost a decision and Steve Welker lost by a pin to make it 22 to 15, but Norm Bargerstock, wrestling in place of injured Pat Catalano, pinned his man at 1:59. Gino Affronti pinned his at 2:39 and Al Catalano pinned his at 4:56 to put Wayne on top 40 to 15.

Dale Barker, outweighed once again by at least 30 pounds, dropped a decision to make the final score 40 to 18.

At Lyons on Saturday afternoon it was no contest. Wayne led 36 to zero after six matches as Larry Bamford got his third straight pin at 42 seconds, Ted Hargarther, Bill Dixon and Bob Azzono won forfeits, Roy Lang picked up his second pin of the week at 3:21 and Rick Lang had a pin at 1:55. Rick could have won sooner but he was only using one hand. He grabbed his opponent by the legs, stood up and pushed his shoulders to the mat. Tom Fisher decided his man 14 to five to make it 39 to nothing but Lyons got on the scoreboard as Steve Welker dropped a questionable eight to seven decision. Norm Bargerstock beat his man 11 to nothing and after Gino Affronti won by a forfeit, Al Catalano picked up a lopsided 20 to nine decision. Dale Barker dropped an eight to five decision to make the final score Wayne 53 and Lyons six. Ron Fisher and Al Flint both won by pins in exhibition matches.

Triple winners a North Rose-Wolcott

Wayne County teams in all winter sports are roaring down the homestretch. Basketball, wrestling, swimming, and bowling leagues are into their last few weeks of competition.

In each of these sports, there remains the post season Section 5 tournament. Wayne County is hoping to bring home a champion in each sport and North Rose-Wolcott may have three of them.

In wrestling, the Cougars are currently holding down second place in the W-FI. West with a 5-1 mark. Coach Ron Behe has two undefeated wrestlers in 101-lb. Denny Verkest (15-0) and 135 lb. Ron Van Deusen.

Verkest may be the premier lightweight grappler in the entire area. He has registered most of his victories via a quick pin, rarely taking over a minute to show his opponent the lights.

He narrowly missed winning a sectional championship last year and is itching to go for it in his senior year.

Van Deusen, not as devastating as Verkest but just as effective, will try to join Verkest as a Section 5 champion.

The Cougars also boast Gary Allen, once-beaten at 141, Joe Van Liere at 170, and Jerry Garrett at 158 and Jerry DeCausmaker at 129 as potential champions.

Pre-quarter finals

The road to the championship begins Saturday, Feb. 24 at the W-FI. West league meet at Victor. There North Rose-Wolcott, Marion, Sodus, and Lyons will represent the county.

At that meet, the league coaches will meet beforehand to work out the seeding of wrestlers. Last year's champion, if he is returning, will automatically be seeded No. 1 in his weight class, if it is the same as last year.

With Honeoye Falls-Lima added to make nine teams, a wrestler-off between the No. 8 and 9 seeds will result in pairings of No. 1 seed vs. No. 8, No. 2 seed vs. No. 7, No. 3 seed vs. No. 6, and No. 4 vs. No. 5.

Seedings area determined by records, against common opponents and against each other.

Other county wrestlers given a chance to win these pre-quarter finals are Walter Scott of Marion at 170 and Sodus heavyweight George Martin.

After the 12 champions emerge from the day's wrestling, they, along with the No. 2 finisher in each class, move to the quarterfinals.

Quarter finals

The quarterfinals will be held March 2, also at Victor. Here, the top two from the W-FI. West in each class will compete against

the Sections 5 Cl from the Living league.

ONTARIO—With 1:16 showing on the clock, Williamson's Dan Cook made a free to give the Marauders a 60-51 lead over the Wayne Eagles.

A Wayne fan behind me said, "That's it. There's no way they can comeback now."

He proved to be a poor prophet as the Eagles put together one of the most amazing come-from-behind wins of the season to beat Williamson 63-61 Friday night.

The Wayne victory came after Williamson had dominated the entire game, right up to that fatal 1:16 period.

Handling Wayne's zone press with relative ease for most of the game, the Marauders fell apart at the seams when the Eagles changed to a man-to-man press in the fourth quarter.

Williamson was also employing a moderately aggressive press that Bob Hetu found an opening in for a layup. Collins' pair of free throws gave Wayne the lead again at 10-8 with 4:23 left in the quarter.

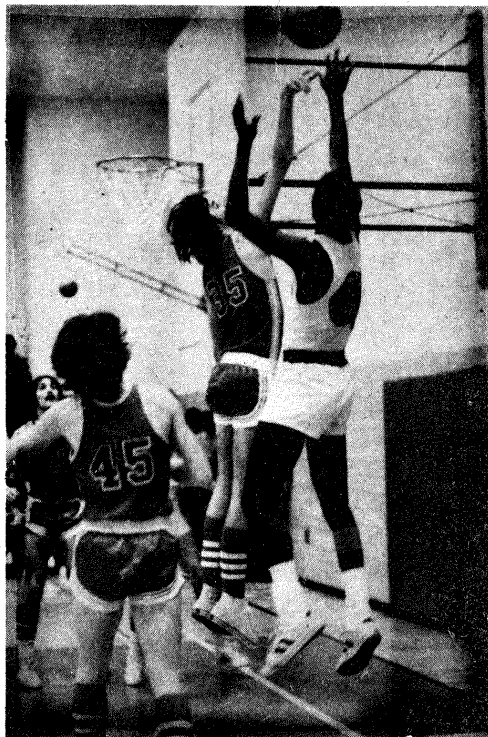

Wayne came up with a steal off their press that Hetu converted into a pair of free throws, making it a 60-57 game with 38 seconds left. Collins' came up with another steal and a layup to draw the Eagles to within one at 60-59 with 28 seconds left, much to the delight of Wayne fans. The press led to a costly Williamson foul and Hetu calmly swished both ends of a one-and-one to give Wayne a 61-60 lead with 25 seconds left.

Coach Chuck Imhoff took the full court press off and had the Eagles pick up Williamson at halfcourt. Manning drew his fifth foul after Williamson had missed two layups, sending Kuhn to the line.

Kuhn hit the first shot to tie it at 61-61 with 14 seconds left but missed the second one. Wayne's Jim Kelly grabbed the rebound and fed Collins, who swished the game-winning bucket from 15-feet away with four seconds on the clock.

Williamson's inbounds pass after the basket hit the ceiling, giving Wayne the ball and the ballgame.

Coolbaugh, as could be expected, was in there for nine of them. Mead and Donk again were responsible for the remainder, scoring one goal a piece in that quarter.

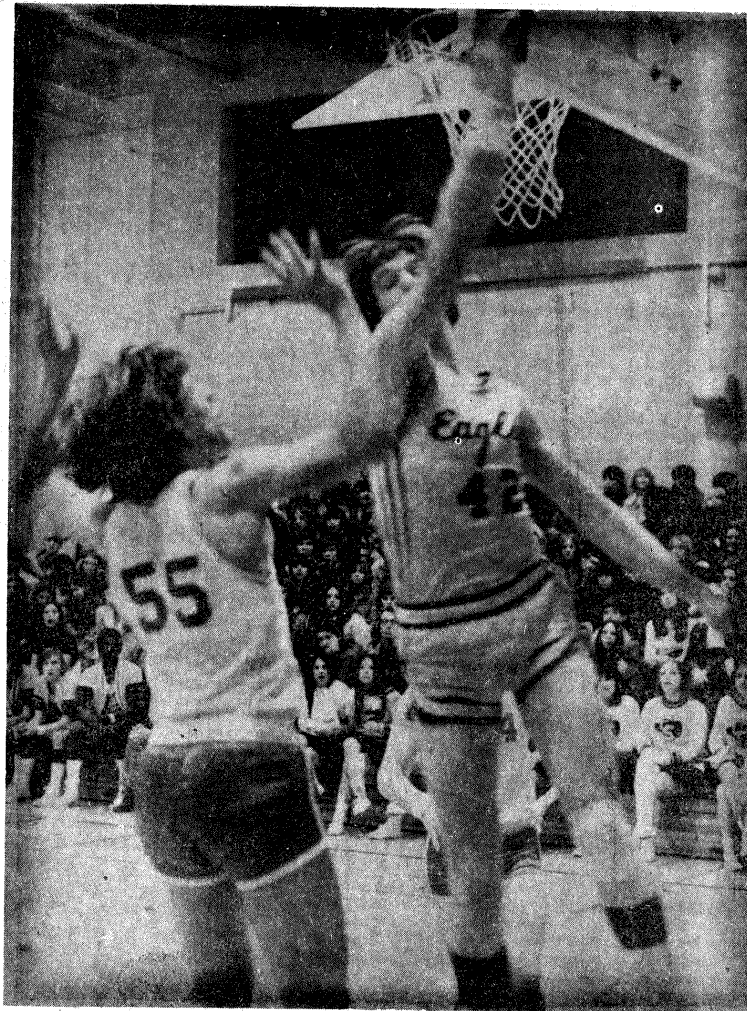
The Raiders began an effort in the third period that would explode in the fourth but ended up with only 12 points with a fairly even distribution of points.

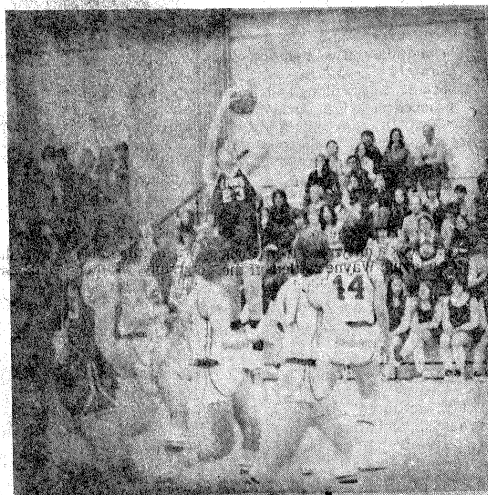

Teams looking for sectional points as season nears end

With only three games left in the Wayne County season after tonight, the Sodus Spartans can clinch at least a tie for the league title.

The Spartans would have to win tonight against Marion and then drop their last three games while Red Creek has to win them all to tie for first.

Tonight, however, most of the county teams area trying to get enough points to improve their chances in the Section 5 tournament.

Sodus (12-0) will host the Marion Black Knights (4-9) in a game that figures to result in the Spartans 13th league victory in a row.

Sodus is rested and completely healthy for the game. They boast the league's top defense, allowing only an average of 50.8 pts. a game.

Sodus also has the loop's second most productive offense behind Red Creek. The Spartans have poured through an average 67.1 points per game.

Joe Jackson, a 6'2" junior forward, leads the Spartans in scoring with an average of 18.4. Senior guard Jed Dodge (11.3) is also in double figures.

Sodus is vying to become the top seeded team in the Class A tournament. A loss to Class C Marion would be hurt their chances for the top seed.

Marion is looking for sectional points as well and an upset of Sodus would help them considerably.

"Everybody's healthy and we're ready for them," said Spartan Coach Ed LaRock. "I

was surprised Red Creek handled them as well as they did," he stated.

Black Knight Coach Joel Griffing is downplaying tonight's game. "Our last three games are crucial to us," said Griffing, "and we're going to have to shoot better than 12 percent to beat Sodus."

Marion shot 12 percent last Friday in losing to Red Creek. The Black Knights possess the league's least productive offense, scoring an average of 51.6 pts. per contest while giving up points at a 60.5 clip.

Forward Kevin Hosmer (10.0) is Marion's leading scorer, with help from Jeff DeLyser (9.6) and center Steve Roegiers.

Sodus won the first meeting, 67-37.

Also on tonight's slate is the Wayne at Lyons match. The two teams have had some wild games the last two years and this one should be no exception.

Wayne (6-6) is coming off a come-from-behind win over Williamson and Lyons (5-8) is coming off a 70-61 victory over North Rose - Wolcott. Both of these Class A teams need the victory for the sectionals and promise to go all out.

Wayne lives and dies by their pressing defense and like to run as often as possible. Junior guard Chris Collins is the one who makes the Eagles fly. Collins exploded for 30 points against Williamson and may give the Lions fits. Besides Collins' 14.3 average, Wayne has forward Clete Manning (13.0) in double figures.

Coach Chuck Imhoff dreads playing Lyons on the Lions' home

court and feels "their record is no indication of the kind of team they are. They're just not that poor."

Imhoff said the Eagles will continue to press and run as they have been all year but hopes his Eagles can outrebound the Lions.

"That's the key to the game," he said.

Lyons, meanwhile, has won two in a row behind some outstanding performances from seniors Alan Simmons, and Mark Lazar, and junior Steve Tricarico.

Coach Frank Lisco seems to have found a viable starting unit and says, "We've got to have this game. No doubt about it."

Simmons is leading the league in scoring with a 23.4 average and is coming off a 31-point game against Red Creek and a 32-point outburst against North Rose-Wolcott.

Wayne won the first contest, 59-55.

In another game, the Red Creek Rams (9-3) will try to improve both their league standing and sectional position when they travel to Pal-Mac to play the Raiders (7-6).

Red Creek, the league's offensive leader with a per game average of 70.2, is coming off a 78-50 victory over Marion. Pal-Mac has lost two in a row to fall out of third place behind Clyde-Savannah.

The Rams are paced by guard Charlie Johnson (15.4), forward Craig Guthrie (15.3), and center Bryant LaGoe (13.4).

Pal-Mac will be going against the league's leakiest defense, allowing 64.5 pts. a game. The

Raiders are averaging 58.5 per game while giving up 59.2.

Junior Mike Morgan, in a scoring slump lately, leads the Raiders with a 17.5 average. Jim Nolan, a sophomore, is also in double figures at 11.0.

Red Creek won the first meeting, 68-62.

Rounding out the league slate will be the Williamson-Clyde-Savannah contest. The two Class B rivals will meet in the Golden Eagles nest with Clyde-Savannah rating the edge.

Coach Nick DerCola's outfit has won three league games in a row to take over third place in the standings. The Golden Eagles (7-5) are being lead by senior guard Walt Coolbaugh, who has raised his average to 17.0, good for fourth place in the league.

He is supported by center Bill Mead (12.5) and guard Greg Donk (12.8). John Solomon, a junior forward, is considered the team's top defensive player and is capable of hitting double figures as well.

Williamson (4-8) is trying to regroup after losing a heartbreaker to Wayne last week. "It's been a real trying season," said Coach Gary Clark, "with injuries and sickness."

However, the Marauders do have forwards Dave Van Gorder and Chip Marcellus ready to go. Van Gorder poured in 27 points last week and possesses a 15.6 average. Marcellus, a senior, is hitting at a 11.9 clip.

Guard Tom Corteville is expected to be ready after missing last week with an ear infection.

North Rose-Wolcott (2-11), has the night off.

Alan Simmons -practice pays off in a real big way

LYONS—People around Lyons could tell. They knew the skinny red-headed kid would be a ballplayer someday.

That lanky red head was Alan Simmons and today those people have seen their confidences come true in a big way.

"When I was about seven-years old," the 6'3" senior recalled, "I used to go over to the neighbors' outside court and just shoot and shoot. I'd shoot and practice all day long and even into the night."

Those long hours of personal drive and dedication to basketball have paid off for Alan Simmons. In a remarkable high school basketball career filled with outstanding performances and individual honors, Alan Simmons has come a long way from that backyard court.

He is considered by many who know their basketball to be the most talented basketball player ever to play for Lyons, a school that has had a wealth of good ones.



"Those Lyons teams of the early 60's, when I was doing, all that practicing really turned me on to basketball," Simmons explained, "and I decided that I wanted to make a name for myself like Boenheim and Sollene."

The son of Alfred Simmons, a Wayne County Highway Dept. employee, and the late Leona Simmons, Alan feels that basketball just seemed "to come naturally to me."

"With this idea of making a name for myself, I just pushed and drove myself constantly," he explained.

The result of all that work has been letters from colleges such as Oregon State, Minnesota, Washington, Virginia Tech, Tennessee, Syracuse, and Indiana among others.

Simmons burst upon the Lyons basketball scene with a bang. Teaming up with Tim Jansen and Tim Shipley, the Lyons of 1970-71 had probably the best frontline ever to play in the county.

"I could see that as a sophomore he had all the tools," remembered Lyons' Coach Frank Lisco, "and he was going to be one of the best around."

As a sophomore, Alan was named to the Wayne County League first team All-Stars while scoring at a 15.5 per game clip. He pulled down 155 rebounds and handed out 75 assists to help power Lyons to an undefeated league season.

"The thing I remember most about my high school career is scoring 31 points in three quarters against Williamson when I was a sophomore," Simmons recalled. The sophomore year also gave Alan his biggest disappointment. "When we lost to Waterloo in the Class A semi-finals," was his greatest disappointment. "We were just too overconfident," he lamented.

with his participation in basketball. "I've met a lot more people and am not as shy as I used to be. I'm definitely more outgoing," he said with enthusiasm.

Simmons has very strong feelings about Lyons leaving the W-F.L. League they had competed in so long to join the Wayne County league. "I didn't want to get out of the W-F.L. because the competition here is tougher. There are more good ballplayers to challenge you in that league," he commented.

Jansen graduated and Alan entered his junior year with Shipley, Keith Sholly, and Nick Sculli as the nucleus of another fine Lyons team. He remembers last year fondly.

"It was a lot of fun playing with those guys because they were so talented and had a good attitude, Sholly especially was funny. He always had some wisecrack about something. It made it fun to play basketball," he laughed.

Simmons main job on these powerful Lyons team was defense. "I'd always have to guard the other teams top scorer, no matter where he played. Probably the toughest I've ever had to guard was Pat Dunlea of Waterloo. He was as smooth as they come," Simmons related.

This year has been different for



Alan Simmons. Last year he had perhaps his greatest year. He was named to the Wayne County first team again, he was named to the Section 5, Class A All-Tournament team, and was named to the Greater Rochester All-Star team, probably his most cherished honor. He averaged 16.9 pts. a game hauled down 261 rebounds, and gave out 86 assists, all an improvement over his sophomore year.

This year, "I've had to change my game almost completely," said Simmons. "Now, I don't play as much defense as I used to because I have to handle more of a scoring load than I used to." That is an understatement.

Through tonight's game with Wayne, Alan is leading the league in scoring with a 23.4 average and has already pulled down 224 rebounds.

This year's Lyons are only 6-8 but Simmons feels that they are much better than their record indicates.

Personally, Alan, Coach Lisco and most of those who have had to guard him agree that he is at his best when going "one-on-one". Lisco said, "Going to the basket from either baseline, he is real tough to stop. He can use both hands and has about a million ways to get it in the basket."

Lisco is lavish in his praise of Simmons, whom he has coached all three of his varsity years. "As far as ability goes," he explained,

"there's no question he can play college ball anywhere if he wants to. It all depends on how much he wants to."

Continuing, Lisco said, "Alan has had to change his game this year. He realized he had to shoot more from outside so he practiced and worked on it. He can do whatever you need him to do."

"His weak point," I think, is that he needs a challenge to do his best. I try to think of things to challenge him," Lisco observed.

"Alan has got a tremendous amount of talent you just don't see in many kids," Lisco stated.

"Big Red" has come a long way and there is not a person in the county who doesn't think he has a future in sports. If not basketball, then maybe baseball. He is also an outstanding pitcher for the Lyons' baseball team with several no-hitters to his credit.

"If I had to give any advice to young kids," he said, "then I would say that they should practice early. When they first get interested in sports, I think they should work hard and practice as much as possible."

It would seem to be a surefire piece of advice, too. Just look where a skinny 6'3" red-head shooting baskets until dark has gone with that formula.

"He can do anything he wants. He has the ability," feels Lisco.

The rest is up to him but if he works as hard on his future now as he did on basketball earlier, things will look bright for a Lion that roared, Alan Simmons.

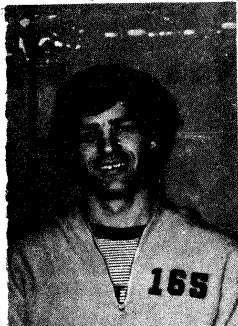

The top two finishers from each weight class are considered quarterfinal winners in Section 5. They will advance to the semi-finals at the War Memorial on March 3.

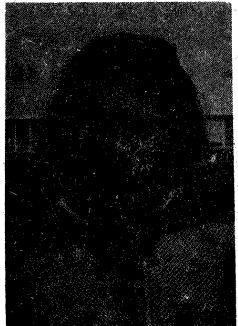

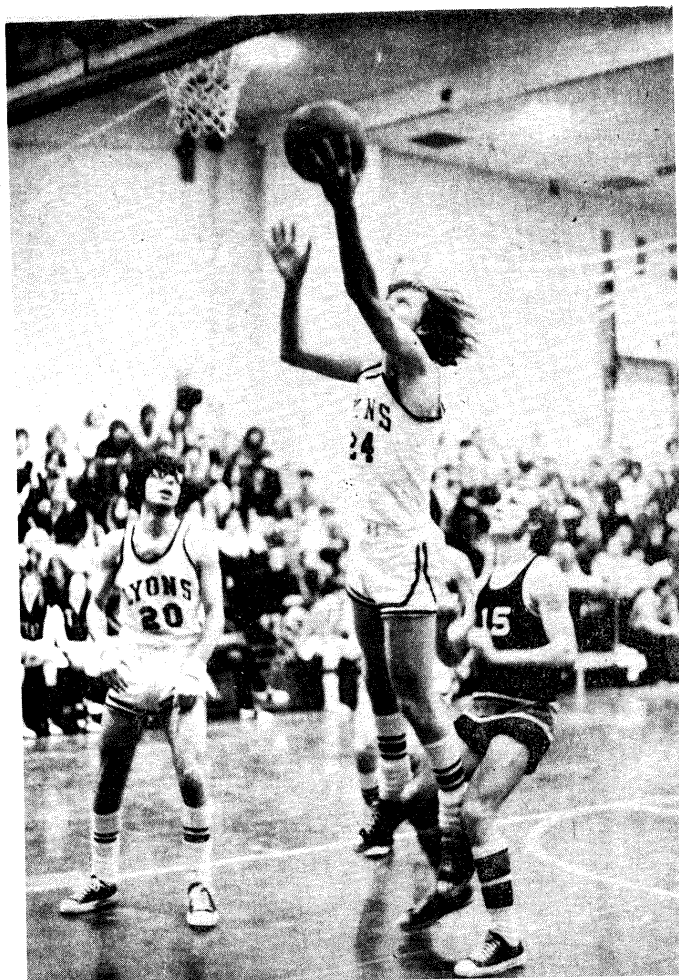

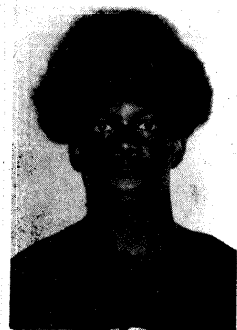
With the Sodus Spartans assured of the Wayne County league championship, there still remains the battle for second place and the B-C crown between Red Creek and Clyde-Savannah.

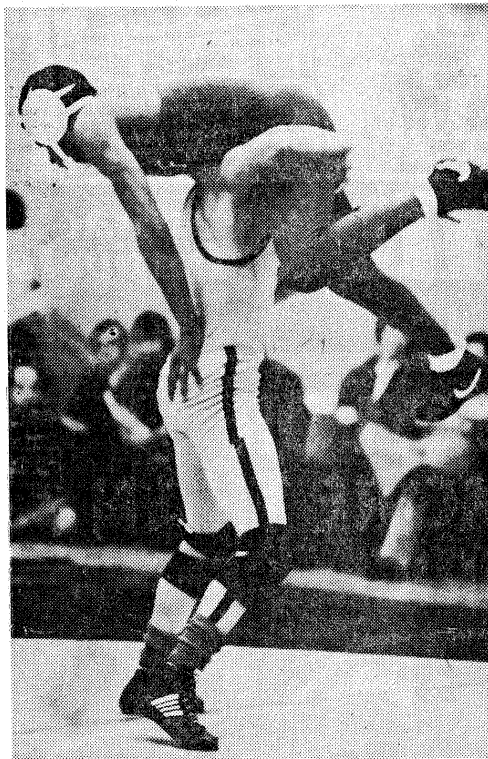

His blond Canandaigua freshman Robert Hadsell says there's three younger brothers at home, which can mean only misery if you consider the accomplishments of Robert and his two older brothers.

They moved the Sectional Show into the War Memorial, but before that (1968) Dick Hadsell won at 130 pounds and Saturday night senior Bruce won at 132 pounds and Robert at 98. Robert is 23-0 and Bruce 29-0. All three champions.

But then the Hadsells weren't the only victorious brothers. Eastridge's Dave and Jim Polsinelli luckily pulled the same trick. There were no other surprises, except for a senior from Greece Olympia who can impersonate Tweetie Bird. Dan Murphy likes to do bird calls, but he didn't flap his arms like some claimed. Murphy, reminding you of a bar room brawler, won at heavyweight despite being pinned twice earlier in the season. In the 14-year history of Olympia, no wrestler had gone as far.

Clayton Barnard, he with the Rock Hudson chin and NCAA champ Wade Schalles, sucker leg, was the most valuable wrestler, pinning all four opponents at 155 pounds. The Hilton senior was an easy choice since no one matched that performance. But back to Canandaigua.

In the last five years Canandaigua has produced 10 Sectional winners and possibly would have had a fourth this year if Mike Chappelle would have survived the Wayne-Finger Lakes tournament. Chappelle was a state runner-up last year but Canough wasn't one to be greedy. "This was my best team ever even without Mike so I can't complain," he said. "They were all great."

In the Class A-B wrestle-offs, the winner goes to the State Tournament this weekend in Utica, the Hadsells destroyed everyone. Young Robert won 14-0 and Bruce pinned Avon's Tom Eastwood in 35 seconds. Canandaigua's third winner, Ron Langdon, won 9-0 over Perry's Gary Craig who was 25-0. Langdon, 28-1, is a

senior and said after the States that would be it for him. "I've had enough of school so I don't plan to go to college," he smiled. "That means no more wrestling."

Spencerport, which edged Canandaigua for the Class A team title much to the disgust of the Walt Teike haters, had two winners. Steve Silver repeated at 112 pounds and Teike made sure that this outstanding senior received the team title trophy by his lonesome. It is something most coaches don't do. Silver repaid the compliment with a 3:23 pin of his B foe while sophomore Frank DeAngelis ate up Dundee's Harold Smith 15-1 to go to the state's 32-0. DeAngelis has never lost, not as JV last year nor in junior high.

The Polsinellis saved county champion Eastridge from a wipeout and in smart fashion. Dave, the 119 winner, utilized his classy stalling tactics to the hilt, edging Tom Mandera in the A finals and Avon's Mike Close in the A-B final. Dave came up with last minute takedown to go with his riding time advantage to win 5-1.

Jim Polsinelli, the stronger and more aggressive of the two brothers, had a hard time at 126, but recovered for a 5-4 A-B victory. Jim finished 27-1-1.

Webster's Bob Menz had a big day, pinning Gates' Mike Macaluso and being the first to stop East Rochester's Rich McPhee, but the 177-pounder just ran out of upset energy and lost to Victor's Mike Guinan 6-3. Guinan was the only Victor survivor out of four and Victor was the Class B champions.

Of the 1,831 paid who came Saturday night, probably only Olympia's Murphy got the whole crowd behind him. Besides Murphy's defeat filled history, he had his aggressive and awkward style going for him. "The little Hadsell kept

yelling at me to get aggressive, so I did," said Murphy.

Even Murphy will admit his doesn't know everything about the sport and that he only tries one or two holds. But he has faith in what he can do if nobody else knows what his intentions are. "I shoot for a guy's feet, that's how I can take him down," he explained.

In the A finals, Murphy met up with Eastridge's Brad Roth, a cocky junior who had made fun of Murphy's penchant for bird whistling. "First the guy swore at me and then he started making fun of me. That was the worst thing he could have ever done. I knew I was going to beat him and that just psyched me more."

In the Roth match Murphy got behind as usual and once slapped Roth's face, good for a penalty point, when the Eastridge heavy proudly motioned Murphy to come and get him. "I hate that when a guy does that; it's demeaning to the other wrestler, like I'm chicken or something," said Murphy. And Roth suffered the consequences, losing 11-6 and not catching Murphy in a pin like he did in the County finals 10 days ago.

In his match with Victor's unbeaten Ron Warner, Murphy was a little confused by Warner's style at first. "I never saw a guy come at me that high before," he said. "I didn't know what to do." Warner took him down and led 3-1 before Murphy caught fire.

CLYDE—The Red-hot Clyde-Savannah Golden Eagles captured their seventh league triumph in a row Friday with a 76-65 win over the Wayne Eagles.

Clyde-Savannah survived a turnover-laden first quarter to shoot a torrid 31 for 53 en route to their 11th league win of the year.

The win also wrapped up the Class B-C championship for the Golden Eagles, who finished one-game ahead of Red Creek.

Once again it was senior guard Walt Coolbaugh who led the Golden Eagles with 27 points. Coolbaugh got Clyde-Savannah off and running with a 20-foot jumper and they were never to trail after that.

Wayne opened with their usual pressing defense that forced Clyde-Savannah into turnovers but the Eagles were unable to take advantage. They committed two more turnovers in the first quarter than Clyde-Savannah, got into foul trouble, and were cold from the field.

Clyde-Savannah, meanwhile, was having little trouble with the Wayne press. "We worked on that all week," said Coach Nick DerCola.

Greg Donk made it 4-0 with a 12-footer before Clete Manning got Wayne on the board with a layup, the best the cold-shooting Eagles could manage in the early going.

Bill Mead, Clyde-Savannah's 6'6" center, who grabbed most of the missed Wayne shots, hit on a layup to make it 6-2. Manning swished a pair of free throws at the 4:13 mark for a 6-4 game.

Coolbaugh and Collins exchanged jumpers before Tom Liseno scored on a drive to make it 10-6. Jeff Loucks drew Wayne to within two at 10-8 and knotted the score at 10-10 with two consecutive jumpers.

Coolbaugh scored on a drive but Collins came up with a steal for a layup to keep it tied at 12-12.

The Golden Eagles then scored the final four points of the first period on free throws by Donk and a short jumper by Liseno to take a 16-12 bulge.

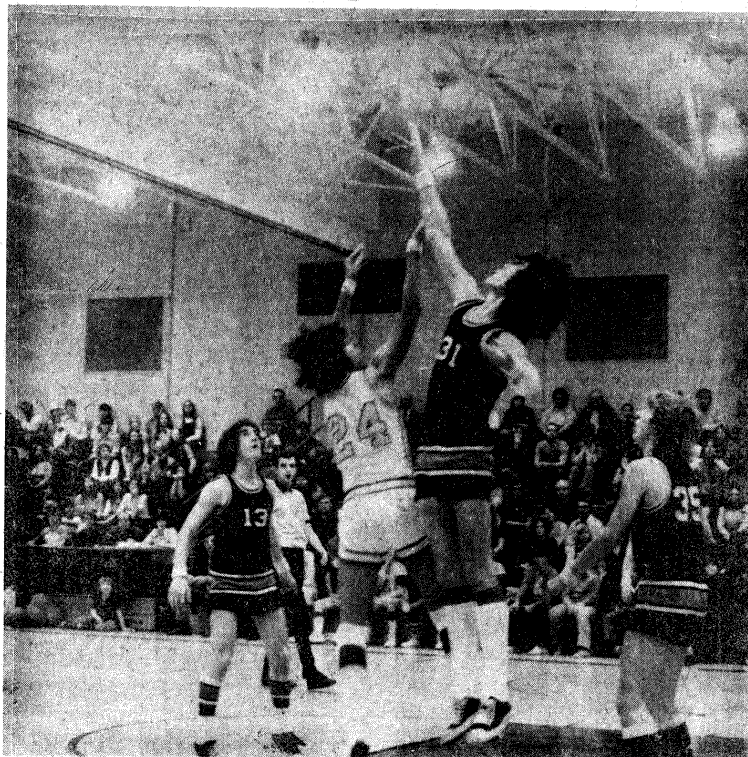
With Wayne still unable to hit with any consistency, Clyde-Savannah reeled off the first seven points of the second quarter. They moved from a 16-12 lead to 23-12 before Glen Cone hit an eight-footer for Wayne to make it 23-14.

It was Wayne's turn to get hot as they scored seven straight points to move within four at 23-19 with 4:59 to go in the half.

Mead then assumed control of the action by hitting a short turnaround jumper and a three-point play, sandwiched around Wally Wyse's bucket. Mead's outburst propelled Clyde-Savannah to a 28-21 margin which Coolbaugh soon upped to 30-21 at the 3:03 mark.

Mead came right back with a layup to increase the lead to 32-21 but Bob Hetu of Wayne drew the Eagles to within nine at 32-23 with a driving layup. Mead, however, wasn't through yet.

The big center pushed in a

Both teams traded buckets until Manning's two free throws made it a 41-31 halftime lead for Clyde-Savannah.

Mead, a bear on the boards all night long, open the second half with a layup. Loucks countered with a 15-footer for Wayne.

Clyde-Savannah then went on a six-point tear behind Coolbaugh who hit two jumpers, and Donk, who hit one, Mannings' pair of free throws was answered by John Solomon's six-footer for a 51-35 Clyde-Savannah lead.

Clyde-Savannah stretched their lead to 16 points with 1:50 left in the third period; after Coolbaugh scored on a layup.

Hetu hit a pair of free throws and a 10-footer to cut the lead to 55-43 as the Wayne press became momentarily effective.

The third quarter ended with the Golden Eagles holding that 55-43 bulge.

The final period began with Coolbaugh connecting on a three-point play to propel the Golden Eagles into a 58-43 lead. Liseno scored on a fast break layup for a commanding 60-43 lead with 5:49 to go in the game.

Wayne hit for three straight points but C-S countered with four straight to earn a 64-46 lead.

Solomon and Wyse traded buckets before Liseno scored on a drive following a steal to give the Golden Eagles a 20-point lead for the first time, 68-48.

In the next minute and a half, both teams swayed bucket for bucket to result in a 76-56 C-S lead.

TIP-IN'S...The win was a sharp contrast to the first meeting of the two, an 88-66 Wayne victory...Wayne Coach Chuck Imhoff was upset over the officials lack of control over the game. "They let it get out of hand," he stated. "Imhoff 'We were blowing layups all night long. You can't ask any more of an offense than to get you a layup and we were missing them.'...Charts showed Wayne hitting on 23 of 66 shots.

Nick DerCola, Clyde-Savannah Coach, felt the Golden Eagles were playing kind of basketball that could take them far into the Class B tournament. "We worked on breaking the press all week. We made up our minds to maintain our poise when they pressed."...Der Cola said, "We shot real well against their set defense, forcing pressure on them to overreact, which is why they got into four trouble."

DerCola praised the play of Mead, who he has been trying to get to go to the hoop more. "He did the job rebounding, scoring inside, and was getting fed for some easy buckets."...Both teams now enter the Section 5 tournament...Clyde-Savannah will be the sixth ranked team in Class B while Wayne will be the 12-ranked in Class A.

Wayne still hoping

ONTARIO—As of this writing, the Wayne Eagles are in much the same situation as Lyons, but only slightly better as far as sectional hopes is concerned.

The Eagles are presently 8-9 overall for -15 points, a fairly sure bet for the tournament but a loss to Class B Clyde-Savannah this Friday could be harmful.

Wayne is a team that lives by its pressing defense and running game. Several times during the season the press has given the Eagles a victory but also has caused their defeat at times.

Coach Chuck Imhoff's crew got off to a rocky start, falling to Red Creek 75-71 before nearly pulling off a win over Sodus. It took a last second free throw to subdue the Eagles, 51-50, the closest Sodus has come to defeat this year.

Following that loss, the Eagles beat Marion (65-48) for their first win of the season. They then dropped two games in the Spencerport Christmas Tournament before rebounding with wins over Williamson (55-53) and Lyons (59-55). A 63-60 loss to Pal-Mac was followed by a 65-46 win over North Rose-Wolcott and a 88-66 thrashing of Clyde-Savannah.

They blew a 68-67 game to Red Creek before falling to Sodus, 72-58. Their up-and-down ways continued with two straight wins (Marion and Williamson). The Eagles they ran into a red-hot

Lyons team and fell 85-63 but rebounded to beat Pal-Mac 69-62 and NR-W 87-75.

As their 8-7 league record would indicate, Wayne is scoring almost as many points as it gives up. The Eagles average 64.5 while giving up 61.9 per contest.

Wayne lost four starters from last year's fine 13-5 team but have fared better than most observers thought they would.

Junior guard Chris Collins, the only returning starter, runs the Eagles offense and is their top ball-hawk on the press. Collins is hitting at a 13.6 rate.

Junior forward Clete Manning is the Eagles top point maker with a 14.3 average and is the team's rebound leader as well.

Rebounding help comes from 6'1" junior Jim Kelly with

sophomore Bob Hetu and junior Jeff Loucks rounding out the starting lineup. Top reserves are junior guard Wally Wyse and forward Charlie Wilcox.

COMMENTS—The Eagles are a very young team, with none of their starters being seniors. An up and down team that plays in good and bad streaks, Wayne can be troublesome with their harassing press.

They lack enough height to challenge the big teams in Class A like Newark, Mynderse, Geneva, Sodus and Waterloo.

They should make the tournament but will probably draw one of the top seeds in the first round. Next year should be a good one for Wayne. Chalk this year up to experience.

At this point Chris Collins hit on two free throws to bring Wayne within four points, 32 to 28, but Daeffler hit three straight buckets and Dunn two foul shots as Waterloo lead at halftime 40 to 28.

It got worse instead of better in the third quarter as Waterloo scored 14 straight points before Wayne scored on a free throw. Wayne scored only three field goals and a total of 11 points in the quarter, with Clete Manning having seven of them. Wayne trailed 62 to 39 with eight minutes left.

Wayne outscored Waterloo 25 to 16 in the final quarter as Wally Wyse and Charlie Wilcox, playing their last varsity game, scored six and five points respectively. Bobby Hetu also had six points. Clete Manning was Wayne's top scorer with 19 points while Bobby Hetu had 14 and Chris Collins, ten. Wayne's big trouble all year has been a bad third quarter. If this continues next year, we'll have to see if we can't have the third quarter deleted from the game.

Even though Wayne finished with a losing record, thanks Coach and boys for some great exciting basketball and the best of luck to two very aggressive boys, Wally Wyse and Charlie Wilcox. Sodus' dream season ends with **LaRock** perfect record; Jo named tournament MVP

ROCHESTER—The 1972-73 basketball season will not be forgotten in Sodus for a long, long time.

That amazing bunch of cutups and madcaps put the finishing touches on an incredible season by beating the favored Newark Reds 55-48 to finish with a perfect 22-0 record and their first Class A Section 5 championship.

It was a performance that hopefully silenced the scoffers, who said the Spartans weren't really that good. The consensus was that if they avoided getting embarrassed by the taller Reds, they'd be doing OK.

It was a game in which Sodus failed to yield to the pressure of a perfect record. A record many felt they had to prove was for real. Newark was to be the acid test.

After the Spartans beat Hilton, Coach Ed LaRock said about Newark, "They'll be the tallest team we've faced all year. We'll have to be at our best to beat them."

A fair analysis of the game would be that Sodus was better at what they do best (run) than Newark was at performing their strong point (shooting).

Sodus used the zone defense that helped them lead the Wayne County league in defense. Newark employed their backcourt trap press defense with Matt Burgess chasing on Spartan guard Jed Dodge.

Sophomore Chris Williams got Sodus going by stuffing a missed Danny Thomas shot back in. The Reds quickly tied it up on Mike Tanea's jumper but Williams, forced to contend with 6'7" Chip Bloomer, hit the offensive board again to make it 4-2 with 5:50 to go in the period.

The Reds, following the first of several costly turnovers, went to a full-court man-to-man press and quickly ran off two straight buckets by Bob Bushart and Jeff Peters 12-foot jumper.

That 6-4 lead didn't last long as Jo Jackson, whom LaRock later characterized as "one fantastic ball player" canned an eight-footer. Williams followed with another bucket on an offensive rebound and Sodus had an 8-6 lead with 3:30 to go in the quarter.

After Bloomer scored on a layup, Sodus committed two consecutive turnovers, the last one leading to Tanea's baseline jumper for a 10-8 Newark lead. Williams and Peters swapped buckets to maintain the Newark lead.

The pace picked up in the final minute of the quarter as the Spartans patented fast-break got Jackson a step on his defender twice in a row for layups, and a 14-12 Sodus lead.

With 47 seconds left in the first period, Burgess swished a 15-footer to tie it at 14-14.

But, with 39 seconds left, Williams hit his fifth bucket of the period to give Sodus a 16-14 lead. That lead stood up after Burgess apparently hit with 23 seconds left but travelled on the play.

Thomas picked up two fouls in the opening eight minutes and Fred Cheetham came off the bench to fill-in well. Newark appeared to have trouble getting inside while Sodus, by virtue of their running game, got all of their buckets from close range.

Cheetham increased the Spartans lead to 18-14 with a rebound after a Newark over and back violation.

Newark, feeling that they were having good success from outside in the first quarter, continued to bomb away in the second quarter. Reds' coach Gary Miller later said, "It was that second quarter that killed us. You can't shoot 2 for 17 against a team like Sodus and expect to win."

Tanea scored on a drive but missed a chance for a three-point play. Jackson, who hit 13 of 23 shots from the field, then canned a 10-footer for a 20-16 Sodus lead.

Both teams went cold for a 1:19 period before Thomas hit a 10-footer for Sodus. In between, Burgess had his second bucket nullified by travelling.

With Sodus leading 22-16 with 4:23 left in the half, Miller decided a timeout was needed to try and get the Reds back into the game before it got out of hand.

They returned to slow the ball down, working deliberately for a crack in Sodus' 1-2-2 zone. They got the shot they wanted, But Bloomer missed two straight layups. Jackson then cashed in on two free throws for a 24-16 Spartan lead with 2:39 to go in the half.

With Newark still pressing, Kevin Welch, who helped beat Waterloo with steals, came up with another. Only a fine defensive play by Dodge prevented the layup. Tanea hit a free throw for only the Reds third point of the quarter.

Then, for the third time, Newark had an apparent basket called back because of travelling. The Spartans were quick to take advantage, as they were all night long, as Jackson drove the baselining virtually unmolested for a 26-17 Sodus bulge. Welch hit a 15-footer for the Reds final points of the disastrous second quarter. Jackson "took it to" the Reds once again for a driving layup with five seconds left to give the ecstatic Spartans a commanding nine point lead at 28-19.

The thousands of "Sodus Express" followers were beside themselves with glee. Newark supporters sat in stunned disbelief as the favored Reds struggled through an unimpressive second quarter.

The Reds came out in the second half to reel off the first four points of the half to draw within five at 28-23. Bushart scored on a drive and Bloomer tipped-in his own missed shot before Thomas swished a 10-footer with 5:40 left in the period.

Following Newark's inability to hold a rebound, Sodus capitalized with Jackson's 12-foot jumper from the side to return the Spartans to that nine-point lead. Bloomer and Thomas exchanged buckets to make it 34-25. The two centers, Bloomer and Williams, both scored to keep the nine-point lead.

The rest of the quarter saw both teams come up with eight points apiece to set up the Reds last chance, trailing 42-33 after three periods.

Sodus fans roared as the Spartans came out for the final quarter, hoping they could hold that lead for eight more minutes.

Bloomer ignited some Newark comeback hopes with a layup but with the Reds pressing, Thomas was fouled and calmly swished two free throws.

The Reds went back outside and missed three in a row following Sodus turnovers. Time was running out on the frustrated Reds after Dodge, who played a brilliant floor game, hit a pair of free throws with 6:07 left in the game. Peters hit a short jumper before Thomas made a nice save of a ball going out of bounds. That play eventually resulted in Jackson's layup at the 5:09 mark, giving Sodus a 48-37 lead.

Newark was still unable to display the kind of shooting that won so many games for them. Miller called a timeout with 4:40 left in the season to try and map a comeback.

Gary Zeger hit one free throw and Dodge fed Jackson for yet another layup to all but end it, holding a 51-37 lead with 3:36 left. Peters hit from outside but Jackson took a length-of-the-court pass from Thomas for two points making it 53-39.

Newark got a steal from Bushart that led to Bloomer's layup and Peters followed with a 12-footer to slash the Sodus lead to 53-43 with 2:10 to go, prompting a Spartan timeout.

LaRock instructed the Spartans to slow it down to waste as much time as possible. Newark was still pressing and started fouling to get the ball. Bushart ended his basketball career with 47 seconds left in the game.

The outcome was no longer in doubt. Tanea's three-point play and Bloomer's steal and layup made it 53-48 with 15 seconds left but Williams layup ended the game at 55-48, touching off a outpouring of happiness among Sodus players, coaches, and fans.

The "We're No. 1" chant of Spartan followers throughout the incredible arena season was now undisputed by anyone.

Jackson, only a junior in his first varsity season played one of his better games. "When Joe Jackson wants to play basketball, there is no one who can stop him," said LaRock. Jo had 28 points to earn him the Class A tournaments MVP award in addition to a spot on the first team.

Williams, asophomore, chipped in with 12 and Thomas added eight.

Bloomer, hitting eight of 17 from the floor, led the Reds with 16 points. Peters and Tanea added 10 each.

TIP-IN'S.....Newark Coach Gary Miller, looked at the scorebook and analyzed the Reds problem....."We didn't penetrate much until the end of the first half. We were hitting the outside shot in the first quarter so they continued to put it up in the second quarter and we weren't hitting them." Defensively, we did what we wanted to, hold them to around 50 but offensively, for a lack of a better word, 'We choked.'....."We couldn't hit even the open shots and they were capitalized on it in the second quarter," he added....."Tanea is normally a deadly shooter but just couldn't hit it tonight.".....Miller felt Sodus was

beating the Reds to loose ball and hit the boards hard....."We tried all our defenses, man-to-man zone, everything in our repertoire to stop them," he lamented....."Jackson took the ball to us. We didn't take it to them. We knew we had to hit the open shot to win and we didn't," he explained.

A happy LaRock said the Spartans didn't run as much as we wanted to "But when they did, it usually got results."....."This was a dream at the beginning of the year," he said proudly, "and now it's come true."....."They all can do it," LaRock said, "Jo, Jed, Gary, Chris Williams and Danny Thomas. They handled pressure real well.".....

"I thought at the start of the season, we'd play man-to-man

defense because of our speed but the kids like the zone and they feel they can stop the big man with it," he explained....."Their quickness makes that zone tougher than hell," he related, "How do you move the ball when these kids move so quickly."..... Jackson, Thomas, and Dodge made the all-tournament team, along with Bloomer and Tanea from Newark and Pat Dunlea of Waterloo.

Charts showed Sodus hitting 53 percent (24 of 45) while the Reds could manage only 33 percent (23 of 69).....Newark held a 31-29 rebounding edge.....The Reds committed 11 turnovers, compared to Sodus' 18.....Sodus won their first Class A title ever and finished with a perfect 22-0 record.....They won the Wayne

County league trophy, the Coca Cola top seed trophy, and the Section 5, Class A trophy in addition to Jackson's MVP and all-tournament hardware.....Newark finished at 17-5 in their first year in Class A competition.
