

Graduation losses hurt Wayne

WAYNE—Graduation hit the Wayne Eagles hard, claiming all but two of the top scorers on last year's standout 16-2 club, which shared the Wayne Basketball League championship with Sodus.

Gone are all-league selection Chris Collins, a 17.9 scorer, and Clete Manning, Jeff Loucks and Jim Kelley.

Jerome Stephens and Bob Hetu, the only seniors on this year's team, are Coach Chuck Imhoff's returning veterans. Stephens averaged 11.3 points per game last year, and Hetu hit at an 8.1 clip. Both started at times.

"It'll take us a while to get started," says Imhoff. "You never really know what to expect with a young team. We'll either go with the big kids and hit the boards or go with the little kids and run. The league looks pretty good this year, and it could be tough sledding."

"We're also in the AA classification this year, and there's some tough competition there."

Juniors Dave Gordon, Matt Brown, Bob Bebernitz, Tom Buchiere and Don Johnson and soph Larry Collins are expected to take some of the pressure off Stephens and Hetu.

Gordon, Brown, Buchiere and Bebernitz were all starters on last year's JV team, which tied for the JV team title.

The Wayne wrestlers were supposed to have opened their season on Wednesday night against the always tough Seneca Falls team and tomorrow night (Friday) the 1974-75 edition of the school's basketball teams go on display

against the Spartans of Sodus at the Wayne gym at 6:30 and 8:00 p.m. The only losses for the varsity squads were to each other last year as they shared the county championship. Both teams were hurt heavily by graduation and are in a rebuilding process. The J.V. teams also tied for their championship last year and have a big turnover, as usual.

The starting lineup for the varsity is still not set at this time except for Jerome Stephens and Bob Hetu, but it looks as if the other three starters will be picked from Dave Gordon, Bob Bebernitz, Don Johnson, and Matt Brown. However, don't be surprised to see Larry Collins, Dave Botsford or any of the other boys starting in future games. They are that well balanced. Sodus has only one returning veteran so this should be a good test for both clubs.

Because some players were on vacation and some injured, Coach Imhoff is still undecided on his starting five. While some probable starters were absent, other boys have showed well, complicating his problem. The boys looking the best in practice this week will be on the floor when the buzzer sounds tomorrow night.

The only news I have on wrestling is bad news. I heard nothing on certification or wrestle-offs and was sorry to hear what I did. The bad news is that Teddy Hargarther, a possible sectional champion this year, broke his thumb in practice last week and will be out of action for nearly two months. Also, that Wayne may not have a 177 pounder or heavy-weight, which will put them behind by 12 points before they start a match. Even with all the bad luck don't sell this team short. They have the desire to win and good coaching, which is half the battle.

In next week's action the Wayne wrestlers will be at Waterloo on Wednesday, December 11. This Saturday, December 7, there will be a triangular meet between the Junior High's of Wayne, Marion and Sodus at Sodus at 1:00 and 2:00. The basketball teams will be at Marion next Friday, December 13.

According to a recent issue of the Palmyra Courier, there may be one less team in the Wayne County Soccer League next year. Pal-Mac has been discussing dropping either football or soccer or perhaps switching to the Finger Lakes soccer league which isn't nearly as strong. There just doesn't seem to be enough good players to support both teams and make them competitive in a school of their size. The soccer team finished the season with no wins and 14 losses and the football team had no wins and nine losses, all by big scores. Winning like money, isn't everything but it's nice to have.

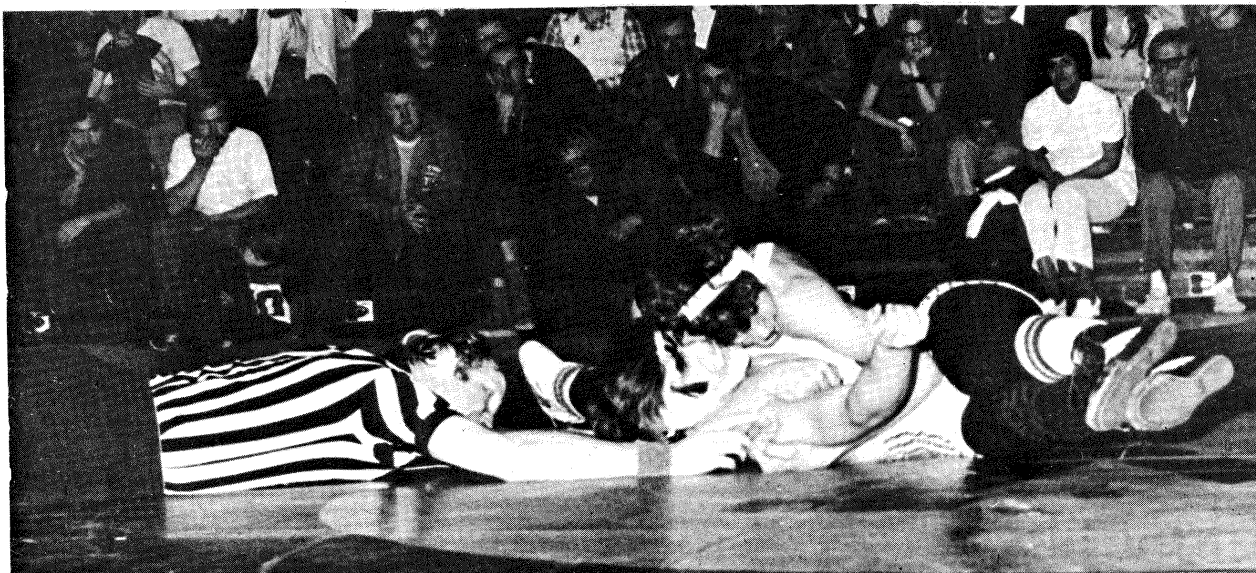
Wayne beats Sodus 46-12

Late victories gain tie for Wayne against Wat

WATERLOO — Better late than never.

Four matches were decided in the final 18 seconds or less, and all went Wayne's way as the Eagles fought back for a 29-29 tie with Waterloo last night in a battle of Wayne-Finger Lakes Eastern Division wrestling powers.

In other Wayne-Finger Lakes action last night, Newark defeated Geneva 42-17 and Midlakes topped Penn Yan 44-13.

Waterloo, staked to a six-point lead at the outset when Wayne forfeited the heavyweight match, led most of the way, but Wayne 177-pounder Don VanDusen clinched the tie by pinning his man with just 18 seconds left in the final match of the night.

"It was a good match," said Waterloo coach Ed Bishop. "Both teams wanted to win, and the result showed how evenly matched we were."

Wayne's last second heroics started in the 98-pound match. Steve Friedman battled back and forth with Waterloo's Mike Wieder for the entire match, finally pulling it out, 12-11, with a last second reversal.

Waterloo came right back. Indian 105-pounder Gary Jensen pinned Wayne's Junior Sanchez at 2:24, to give the Indians a 6-3 lead and set up a tight match at 112.

Waterloo's man at 112, Chris Pontius, held a 2-1 lead for the first two periods and extended it to 3-1 in the final period, but his opponent, Ron Fisher, came up with a takedown in the closing seconds to tie the score and force a draw.

The two teams traded pins at 119 and 126. Waterloo 119-pounder Pete Sperlazza pinning Tim Ferrey at 2:59 and Wayne's Frank Affronti pinning

Scott Sherwood with just three seconds left in the 126-pound match. That match was tight all the way, with Affronti holding a slim, 11-10 lead before the last-second pin.

At that point, the score was 14-11, with Waterloo on top, but Wayne tied it at 14-all when 132-pounder Allen Flint decisioned Dave Carello, 10-3.

Waterloo went back into the lead when 138-pounder Dave D'Amico pinned Jim Lana at 5:12, and stretched the margin to 23-14 as Chris Birch beat Wayne's Rich Luety, 16-9, in an exciting match at 145.

Wayne tightened it to 23-20 after Roy Lang pinned Indian Paul Rey at 1:36 of the 155-pound match, and the Eagles knotted the score at 23 when Wayne's Patsy Catalano, the defending league champion, decisioned Steve Breese, 7-3.

With the forfeit, Waterloo still held a six-point lead, and Wayne needed a pin in the 177-pound match to pull out a tie. VanDusen had Waterloo's Dan Fegley, who had suffered a concussion earlier in the week, in trouble several times. Fegley managed to stave him off, but VanDusen finally got the pin with 18 seconds left.

Both teams are now 1-0-1 in the W-FL East, and both will be trying to knock off perennial league champ Canandaigua.

Wayne Central's winter sports teams got off to a great start last week winning five of their six contests. Each of the Wrestling teams won two matches while the varsity basketball team had a rather easy time downing rival Sodus by a 67 to 50 score. The only losers were the basketball J.V.'s, who will be a much better team than they showed in their Friday night loss.

The wrestlers opened the season at home against an always strong Seneca Falls team and before they started it was like the calm before the storm. Everyone wondered what was going to happen. Before the season started, Wayne was supposed to be a powerhouse, but Teddy Hargrath is out with a broken thumb, Patsy Catalano decided not to wrestle and Bill Bellingham, who was counted on to fill one of the big holes injured his shoulder. This left Coach Dawson Raymo with seven weight classes to fill with boys who had very little or no varsity experience. Two of the boys happened to be freshmen. On top of this, some of the boys didn't make the weight they figured on so the lineup had to be juggled to the best advantage of the team.

When Chris Friedman at 98 lost by a pin at 1:47 and Tom Jeffers lost his 105 bout by a pin at 5:04, the clouds began to thicken as Wayne was behind 12 to zero, but experience took over at this point as Wayne scored the next 19 points. Ron Fisher took a seven to zero lead and then pinned his man at 2:32. Larry Bamford, who looks great this year, wasted little time tying the score at 12 to 12 with a pin at 1:16. Dana Leuty in his first varsity match came from behind to win a seven to five decision and Frankie Affronti picked up four points in drubbing his man 15 to one to give Wayne a 19 to 12 lead. Al Flint at 138, wrestled a real toughie and lost 13 to 6. Frank Lana also in his first varsity match lost by a pin at 2:24 and Wayne fell behind 21 to 19.

At this point Wayne picked up three straight pins to put the match away. Powerful Roy Lang had a real strong looking boy but pinned him at 1:51 of the first period. Dave Affronti, a freshman, took a seven to one first period lead but was reversed in the second period and was nearly pinned. Here he showed he has great promise when he reversed his man and pinned him at 3:28. Don Van Dusen clinched the match with a 3:53 pin after building up an eight to zero lead. Wayne forfeited the heavyweight match to make the final score Wayne 37, Seneca Falls 27.

The J.V.'s under Coach Doug May looked even more impressive with a 40 to 18 win. Little Bob Wambach, who certainly had no trouble making weight, did a good job but lost by a pin with 30 seconds left in the match. Steve Friedman easily defeated his man 11 to one. Tom Febrey wasted little time with a first period pin at 43 seconds. John Palermo knocked a second off Tom's time with a 42 second pin. Sterling Hyland pinned his man at 2:50 and Jan Leaty won by forfeit to give Wayne a 28 to six lead. Bob Zimmer lost by a pin at 3:51 (but Tony Robusto got the six points back with a forfeit).

Blaine Crandell lost a 2:58 pin but Lee Bel made the final score 40 to 18 when he cradled his man at 3:08. Neither team had anyone in the 177 or heavyweight class. In exhibition matches Jim Jeffers won 15 to zero but Scott Whitcomb and Bill Thurston lost.

Coach Chuck Imhoff's varsity basketball team looked very impressive in downing Sodus 67 to 50. They took a four to three first quarter lead and were never headed again. They led 14 to five at the end of the first quarter as Bob Hetu and Jerome Stephens combined for 12 of the points. Larry Collins had the other two.

Wayne took a 26 to 14 lead midway through the second period and when Sodus rallied to cut their lead to 28 to 20, Dave Gordon hit two free throws and Larry Collins a basket to give Wayne a 32 to 21 half-time lead. Hetu had five points in the period while Stephens and Gordon had four and Tom Buchiere, three. Jerome had eight points and Bobby, six as they dominated play in the third quarter, stretching their lead to 15 points, 48 to 33. Bob Bebernitz picked up the other two.

Coach Imhoff used his bench in the final quarter as all twelve players got to play during the game. Larry Collins scored six of his 10 points in the period and Jerome's six gave him a game high of 23. Bob Hetu's two free throws gave him 20 for the game. Bob Botsford came up with four points and Don Johnson, one. Wayne hit on 19 of 25 from the free throw line. Although Jerome and Bob dominated the scoring, all boys played well. Defensively Sophomore Larry Collins played like a pro and Dave Gordon and Bob Bebernitz did a great job defensively and on the boards, holding Sodus star Chris Williams to just five points.

Coach Stoner's J.V.'s had the first game jitters and couldn't do anything right in the first half when they fell behind 39 to 20. They were frustrated by the Sodus man to man defense and had too many turnovers. They came back in the second half and were only outscored 31 to 29, but Sodus whipped them 70 to 49. Their biggest problem was they couldn't contain number 44 and number 52 of Sodus. Between them they scored 55 of the 70 points, 33 and 22 respectively. Number 44 had 22 in the first half which was two more than the Wayne team had. Alton Robinson was high scorer for Wayne with 10 points. Mark Klein and Jim Gardner had seven each. Bryan Loucks and Mark Bellingham, six each, and Chris Maimone and Tom Monahan four each.

The wrestlers had their second matches at Sodus on Saturday afternoon and won easily (46 to 12) as expected. Chris Friedman and Feliberto Sanchez each had forfeits of 98 and 105. Ron Fisher and Larry Bamford each got their second pins of the week to give Wayne a 24 to zero lead. Ron

finished his man in 2:26 and Larry pinned his in 3:58. Dana Leuty lost by a eight to four decision and Frank Affronti lost a very close three to one match to make the score 24 to six. In the 138 match, Jim Lana took his man down and pinned him in just 31 seconds to make it 30 to six. Al Flint got two takedowns in the last period to a 12 to 9 decision and Roy Lang at 155 picked four points with a lopsided 18 to three decision. Freshman Dave Affronti picked up eight points in the third quarter to take a 13 to eight decision and make the score 40 to eight. Freshman Gary Moarionette lost by a pin to one of Sodus' better wrestlers but Don Van Dusen took care of the Sodus heavyweight in just 42 seconds for his second pin of the week to make the final score 46 to 12.

Coach Chuck McDonald's Junior High team also put on a good show at Sodus on Saturday as they wrestled both Sodus and Marion. They won 12 of 21 matches against the two schools and had seven pins. game on Tuesday. Knocking off previously undefeated Williamson 80 to 65 and Dawson Raymo's undefeated wrestlers won a thriller from Mid-Lakes by one point 27 to 26. In J.V. action Coach Stoner's basketballers lost another one but looked much better losing than they did winning last week. Steve Friedman a 3:08 pin, Tom Jeffers a seven to six decision, Ron Fisher a 3:06 pin, Larry Bamford a 3:35 pin, Bill Bellingham lost 14 to eight, Al Flint won nine to six, Frank Affronti lost eight to five, Rick Leuty tied three to three, Roy Lang a 3:10 pin, Dave Affronti a 2:38 pin and Don Van Dusen a 2:40 pin.

Williamson then wrestled Newark and lost 53 to 12.
