

Wayne nips Red Creek

Larry Collins scored on a layup with 40 seconds left and added two free throws with eight seconds left to provide the margin of victory as Wayne edged Red Creek, 54-52, in a Wayne County Basketball League game at Red Creek.

The score was tied, 50-50, before Collins, who scored 12 points, went to work. Doug Craine scored a field goal with one second left to reduce the margin for the Rams, whose record dropped to 4-5 overall and 2-5 in the league.

Wayne (4-3 in the league, 4-4 overall) trailed, 43-38, at the start of the fourth quarter before turnovers plagued Red Creek. The Eagles also benefited from a 14-for-17 performance at the foul line. Red Creek hit on 10 of 22 foul shots.

RED CREEK—Sophomore Larry Collins hit four crucial points in the last 50 seconds to lift the Wayne Eagles to a 54-52 Wayne County Basketball League victory over the Red Creek Rams last night.

Wayne, now 4-3 in league play, trailed by seven, 45-38, near the beginning of the fourth quarter, but the Eagles ran off eight straight points, four apiece by Collins and Jerome Stephens, to take a 46-45 lead.

The score was tied at 50, but with 50 seconds left, Collins sank a layup to put Wayne up by two. Red Creek turned the ball over, and with eight seconds left, Collins was fouled. He sank both halves of a one-and-one situation to make the score 54-50.

Stephens, who was averaging over 26 points a game coming into last night's contest, finished with 13 to lead the Eagles. Collins and Bob Hetu both had 12 points for the winners.

The Wayne basketball teams took the spotlight last week when the three teams won all six of their games. The variety had a couple of thrillers, scoring four points in the last 20 seconds to tie Clyde-Savannah, then beat them in overtime Tuesday night. Friday night saw them overcome a seven point fourth quarter deficit in the final 33 seconds at Red Creek.

The J.V.'s turned in two fine performances, rolling over both their opponents, and the freshmen showed great promise in easily defeating Sodus and Lyons.

The varsity wrestlers suffered their first dual meet defeat of the season to powerful East Rochester, but only after they crushed competition from Pal-Mac and Greece Atheneia. The J.V.'s romped over Pal-Mac for their eighth victory of the season, but then lost badly to Greece and East Rochester. The Freshmen, with some of their regulars out, dropped a close match to Rush-Henrietta.

I'm glad there was a good crowd at the Wayne gym on Tuesday night because if I didn't have the proof I might be accused by you people reading this and were not there of writing a Horatio Alger story. Wayne down by four points with less than 20 seconds to go scored twice, the last time with no time left on the clock, to tie the game, and then outscored Clyde-Savannah 12 to four in the overtime to win 79 to 71. Jerome Stephens continued his torrid scoring pace with 36 points to bring his average above 28 points per game.

It started off as if Wayne would have a fairly easy game as they raced to a 19 to 12 first quarter lead. Bobby Hetu and Jerome Stephens gave Wayne a four to nothing lead and after Cattall tied it up with two baskets, Wayne gradually pulled away. Jerome had 10 points in the period and Bob Hetu had five.

Ferraro and Zulauf scored for Clyde as the second quarter opened and after Brown scored for Wayne, Cattall scored a three pointer to cut Wayne's leader to 21 to 19. Wayne built it back up to 27 to 21 on baskets by Bebernitz, Stephens and Brown, but from then until the end of the game the biggest lead by either team was four points. Wayne held just a two point lead at half time, 31 to 29, as Clyde outscored them 17 to 12 in the second quarter.

The third quarter was a real battle, with the score tied four times. Jerome gave Wayne a 33 to 29 leader, but baskets by Zulauf and Ferraro tied it at 33 all. Wayne moved ahead again on baskets by Hetu, Stephens and Brown, but Ferraro tied it midway through the quarter at 39 all. After Gordon missed two free throws for Wayne, Cattall's basket gave Clyde their first lead in the game. Jerome tied it at 41 all, but two Clyde baskets put them ahead, 45-41. Matt Brown and Jerome each pumped one in to tie the score at 45, with 2:15 left in the quarter. OerCola and Jerome exchanged baskets before Cattall hit both ends of a one and one to give Clyde a 48 to 47 edge going into the final quarter.

Bob Hetu saved the game for Wayne as the last quarter started, although no one knew it at the time. Clyde got the time and OerCola was apparently going in alone for a lay up when Bobby

came from nowhere to knock the ball out of bounds when it was nearly to the basket. Wayne trailed by from one to four points until Matt Brown's one hander from the key put Wayne on top, 57-56, with 5:02 left.

Cattall put Clyde on top next, but that man Brown hit both ends of a one and one to regain the leader, 59-58, with 3:54 to go. Cattall scored again, but Brownie was there again with a layup, and with 2:25 to go took a beautiful pass from Bob Hetu to give Wayne a 63-60 edge. The lead didn't last long since Zulauf hit two free throws and a basket with 1:34 left on the clock. Wayne took time out to set up their last minute press, but when time was in Cattall scored two free throws to give them a 66 to 63 lead. With 1:21 to go, Bob Bebernitz was awarded two free throws, but when he missed them both it look like curtains for Wayne. Clyde's Ferraro drew a one and one foul and cashed in on one of them with 57 seconds left, giving them a four point lead, 67-63. The case looked hopeless when, with 28 seconds left, Bernie Cattall was fouled again with a one and one situation. Bernie had made 11 straight free throws, but missed this one and Wayne still had a chance. Jerome scored on a drive and Clyde called a time out with 16 seconds left. Clyde kept the ball until, with five seconds left, that man Cattall was fouled again with another one and one chance. Much to everyone's surprise, he blew this one, too, but Wayne got the ball as a Clyde player knocked it out. On the throw-in, Bob Hetu got the ball, heaved it to the other end where Matt Brown wrestled it from a Clyde player and scored as the buzzer sounded. The score was tied 67-67.

In the overtime, Jerome hit two free throws and then a basket to give Wayne a four point lead, which Zulauf quickly cut into with a bucket. With 1:18 to go, Dave Gordon just about iced things with a three pointer. Deulin made one of two free throws and Jerome both ends of a one and one to give Wayne the 79-71 victory.

As reported earlier, Jerome had a whopping 36 points while Matt Brown also had a great, great game, especially in the final quarter when he poured in 12 of his 20 points. Bob Hetu only had 11, but he did some great passing and rebounding. Paul Deulin and Dave Gordon had five apiece.

The J.V.'s finally put their game all together and rolled over the Clyde team 89 to 39. Most of the boys didn't play much more than a half as Coach Stoner used all 14 of his men, with 11 of them scoring. Chris Maimone pumped in nine points as Wayne jumped off to a 28-9 first period lead. Wade Osterhout had five and Bryan Loucks six in the second period as Wayne led 40 to 16 at halftime. Alton Robinson had eight and Mark Bellinger six as Wayne added 20 more in the third period. Jeff Trunzo's seven points were high as seven boys scored 29 points in the final period. Wayne's pressing defense held Clyde to 12 field goals. Bryan Loucks led the 11 boys who scored for Wayne with 16 points. Also in double figures were Alton Robinson with 14, Chris Maimone with 12 and Wade Osterhout with 11.

On Wednesday the varsity and J.V. wrestlers met Pal-Mac and the freshmen competed against Henrietta. At 4 p.m. in the Middle School, the J.V.'s scored their eighth consecutive victory with a 42 to 15 win. Dan Botsford had 4:45 pin, Filaberto Sanchez won by forfeit, Bill Hammond won an 8-5 decision, Don Palermo a 13-6 decision and Chris VanderKamp a forfeit. Dan Welker and Jim Lana both lost by pins, but Dave Affronti came back with a 42 second pin and Lee Belone in 53 seconds before Gary Marionette lost a high scoring 20 to 13 decision. The score would have been higher but regulars Chris Bishop, Tom Febrey, Dana Leuty, Jan Leaty and Tony Robusto didn't wrestle for various reasons. At 6:30 at the Senior High, the freshmen took on Rush-Henrietta and won the first five matches, but lost the next six and won the final one to break even in matches, although they lost in points, 27-24. Jim Jeffers, at 80 pounds, won 7-2, Bob Wambach at 84 won by forfeit, Chris Friedman won 6-0 at 88, Dan Botsford won 7-3 at 98, and Chris Bishop won 10-4 at 105. Bill Hammond lost 4-2, John Zaso lost 7-5, Chris VanderKamp and Bob Zimmerman lost by pins, Bob VanderMortel lost 4-3, Dan Welker lost by a pin and Dave Affronti scored a 13-7 pin.

The varsity won nine of 12 matches, downing Pal-Mac 43 to 9. Steve Friedman lost in an upset, 12-8, Tom Jeffers won 13-6, Ron Fisher scored his eighth pin of the year at 5:56, Ted Hargather had a 1:44 pin, Larry Bamford, wrestling a class above his weight, lost his first match of the season, 10-5. Frank Affronti wasted little time with a 1:30 pin, Al Flint won 9-3, Rick Leuty lost 6-3, Roy Lang picked up four points with a 12-1 decision for his 14th win in 15 decisions. Patsy Catalano got a take-down and fall predicament in the last 30 seconds to come from behind and defeat Pal-Mac's previously unbeaten Jackson, 5-2, Don VanDusen scored a 1:34 pin and Bill Eaton won by forfeit in his first match when Pal-Mac failed to send their heavyweight out. They must have heard Wayne didn't have a heavyweight and could pick up six easy points, but when they saw big Bill they turned chicken.

Coach Rollie Heimberger's freshmen basketball team looked very impressive this week in turning back Sodus 62 to 51 on Thursday, and then rolling over Lyons 50 to 25 on Saturday morning. In the Sodus game Lorenzo Smith scored 17 of his 22 game points in the first half as Wayne took a 38-26 lead. Mike Burns had 10 and Marty Aman six. In the second half Sodus tightened their defense and Wayne had some turnovers as the teams played on even terms. Titus Stephens had seven of his nine points in the second half and Mike Burns added six to give him 16 for the game.

On Saturday morning, after a fairly close first quarter, Wayne pulled away and was never threatened as they downed Lyons 50 to 25, holding them to 10 points in the last half even though reserves played most of the time. Mike Burns poured in 12 of his 17 points in the first half and Titus Stephens

added five as Wayne led at half time, 25-15. Wayne outscored Lyons 19 to four in the third period, with Lorenzo Smith scoring all eight of his game points and Chris Wheeler and Titus each had a pair of baskets. Reserves played most of the final quarter, with each team scoring only six points. Besides Burns' 17 points, Stephens had nine, Smith eight and Wheeler six.

The varsity Red Creek basketball game on Friday night was mostly a defensive battle, especially in the second half when the two teams scored only 45 points. This was about as close a game as is possible. Until the final basket of the third quarter there was never more than a three point spread between the two teams. Wayne had to have great defense because they were not shooting or rebounding well.

Red Creek led 13 to 10 as the lead changed hands six times in the first quarter, but last minute baskets by Larry Collins and Dave Gordon gave Wayne a 16 to 14 lead at the end of the first period. Big Dave scored all six of his points in the quarter. In the second quarter Wayne capitalized on nine of 11 free throws and Jerome Stephens had a basket and two foul shots in the final seconds to give Wayne a 31-30 lead at halftime.

Bob Hetu tossed in two baskets as the third quarter started, but Wayne scored only three more points during the rest of the period, falling behind 43-38. Dave Gordon fouled out with 2:41 to go to further complicate their rebounding problem.

It looked like curtains for Wayne when Johnson scored for Red Creek as the fourth quarter opened to a seven point lead for the opponents, but this Wayne team doesn't like to accept defeat. Bobby Hetu scored two free throws but then fouled out a few seconds later when he was charged with a very questionable charging foul. Dave Botsford replaced him and immediately poured in a basket to cut the lead to 45-42. Larry Collins, who scored eight points in the final quarter, hit two in a row, and Jerome Stephens added one as Wayne pulled ahead, 48-45, with 3:15 left in the game. Dave Johnson scored a basket and John Johnson a three pointer for Red Creek to put them ahead again, but Jerome Stephens scored on a lay-up to tie the score again at 50 all at the 1:42 mark.

With 33 seconds left, Larry Collins stole the ball and scored to put Wayne on top. With 12 seconds left, Larry again stole the ball, but missed the first shot of a one and one and Red Creek regained the ball. Collins again stole the ball, this time with two seconds left, and he made good on both free throws to sew up the game. Craine scored an uncontested basket to make the final score 54-52.

Stephens had 13, points and Collins and Hetu 12 each. Dave Botsford did a fine job filling in for Bob Hetu, playing great defense and rebounding well. Jerome held to 13 points, was off on his shooting but was held by his shirtil tail the whole first half, unnoticed by the referees.

The varsity wrestlers split their matches on Saturday night at Bishop Kearney against Greece Atheneia and East Rochester. They defeated the Greece team 40 to 13 with the following results. Steve

Friedman won 13-0, Tom Jeffers had a 3:53 pin, Ron Fisher won 3-0, Larry Bamford lost 9-4, Teddy Hargather won by forfeit and Frank Affronti had a 1:40 pin to give Wayne a 25 to 3 lead. Al Flint wrestled an undefeated boy and lost 17 to 4, but Rick Leuty won 5-1, Roy Lang won 7-2, Pat Catalano won 10-1 and Don Van Dusen had a 3:40 pin. Wayne thought they had a heavyweight but he quit before he wrestled a match so once again they had to forfeit.

Wayne dropped their first match of the season when they took on the powerful East Rochester team. Steve Friedman dropped a tough 4-3 decision after taking a 2-1 first period lead. Tom Jeffers was no match for his man, losing 17 to 4. Ron Fisher put four points on the board for Wayne with a 10-0 decision. East Rochester's undefeated Chris Bourne pinned Larry Bamford, but Teddy Hargather got the six points back with a 1:59 pin to make the score 10-17. Frank Affronti lost by a pin, Al Flint and Rick Leuty by decisions. Roy Lang won a 5-1 decision for his sixteenth triumph of the year and Pat Catalano won 6-2 to cut the lead to 26-16, but Don VanDusen had to default because of a third period shoulder injury and Wayne again forfeited the heavyweight to lose it 38-16.

The J. V.'s winning streak was also broken as they were drubbed by Greece Atheneia, 45-15, and by East Rochester, 46-15. Because of lack of space I'll just give the winners for Wayne. In the Greece match Chris Friedman won by forfeit, Jan Leaty had a 2:45 pin and Tony Robusto won again, 6-5. Dave Affronti had a 57 second pin and Gary Marionetti a 1:35 pin.

Wayne had a real tough match scheduled against Victor on Wednesday night, but the match of the year comes up this Saturday night, January 25, at Canandaigua. Both teams are undefeated in the eastern division of the Wayne-Finger Lakes league, and this match will no doubt determine the championship. Wayne's only loss last year was to this team, so they are out for revenge and have a good chance this year. The J.V.'s, also undefeated in league play, wrestle at 6:30 with the varsities going at it at 8 p.m. You won't want to miss this one. The boys need your support.

The only basketball action this week was the freshman game at Pal-Mac on Wednesday night. The varsity and J.V.'s are idle until next Tuesday, January 28, when they travel to Sodus. The girls open their season next Monday, January 27, against Lyons at home. With many of last year's players back they should have a fine season.

Wayne nips Victor in 27-21 match

ONTARIO CENTER — In a battle between two of the area's top wrestling teams, the Wayne Central Eagles squeezed out a 27-21 victory over the Victor Blue Devils, last night.

Wayne, which sports a 4-0-1 record in the Wayne-Finger Lakes League's Eastern Division, upped its overall record to 9-1-1. The Eagles lone defeat came at the hands of strong East Rochester, and they were tied by Waterloo.

Victor, which lost only to Canandaigua in a WF-L cross-over match, before last night's defeat, has a 3-0 record in the Western Division.

Victor had a 15-14 lead going into the 155 pound bout, but the Eagles captured the next three matches, including one by a pin, to clinch the victory. Wayne had to forfeit at heavyweight, but it didn't matter.

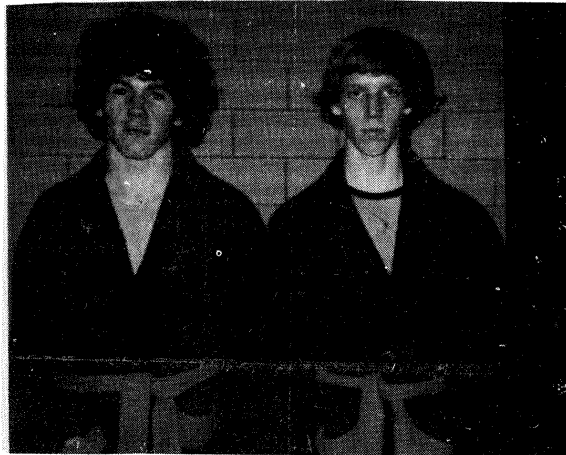

The Wayne wrestlers split their two big matches last week, but they failed to win the one they wanted the most. Their hopes for winning the championship of the Finger Lakes League vanished last Saturday night when they lost

to the powerful Canandaigua Braves, 31 to 19, at Canandaigua. At home on Wednesday night they defeated the strong Victor team, 27 to 21, in a very exciting match.

The Canandaigua match was much closer than the score indicates. Two matches ended in a draw and two were decided by one point, both going to the Braves. Wayne won four matches and tied two, but once again they had to forfeit the heavyweight class. It's unfortunate Wayne doesn't have anyone for this weight as a pin would have tied the match. Mr. Raymo has stopped every big boy he has seen at Wayne but none seemed to be interested. It's awfully hard to win a championship without all of the positions filled. Even though the match was close (25-19) before the forfeit, it wasn't that interesting as Wayne failed to win any of the first six matches and fell behind 22 to 3.

In the first match, at 100 pounds, the veteran Jeff Gelinas was too much for young Steve Friedman and pinned him in the first period. Ron Fisher and Milton Torres battled to a 4-4 tie. Larry Bamford and Doug Lynn, who split two matches last year, had a great match which ended in a 3-3 tie. Lynn went ahead 3 to 1 in the second period, but Larry scored a reversal in the final heat. This brought up the battle of the night in twodefeated wrestlers, Teddy Hargarther and Bob Hadsell. Teddy jumped ahead 4 to 0 on a take-down and a predicament, but Bob bounced back with a reversal and a near fall to lead 5 to 4 after one period. Midway through the second period Teddy made a mistake and Hadsell got him in the cradle and pinned him. It was the first time Ted had been pinned in two years. Last year Ted lost to Peterson of Mid-Lakes, 14 to 1, in their first match and then beat him in the Finger Lakes tournament. He has vowed Hadsell's decision will be reversed.

Frank Affronti wrestled a fine match against Jim White at 128, but lost to the referee. In the first period, when there were no take-downs, Frank was warned for stalling when he got tired of chasing White off the mat. If one was stalling, certainly both were. White went ahead 1 to 0 on an escape in the second period, but Frankie tied it up with an escape in the third. In the closing seconds the referee called stalling on both boys, but that automatically gave White a point as Frank had been warned once, and White won the match 2 to 1. Simmons' 10-9 win at 145 cancelled any hopes of an Eagle victory, but the visitors won the next three matches to tighten up the final score.

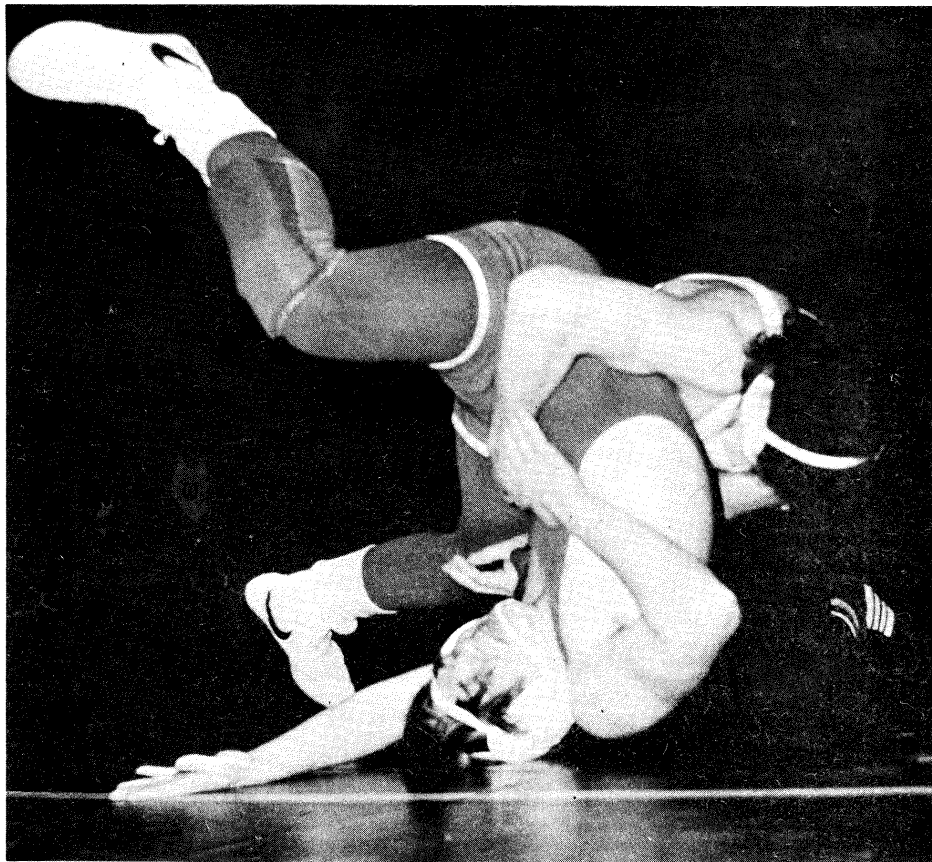

Lions bang the boards for 79-60 victory

LYONS—The Lyons Lions, employing a tough second half defense and what might best be described as a "shoot 'em up and go get it" offense, ran their Wayne County Basketball League win streak to nine last night with a 79-60 victory over the Palmyra-Macedon Red Raiders.

Lyons jumped out to a quick, 8-0 lead as Palmyra-Macedon went scoreless for the first two and a half minutes, but the Red Raiders pulled together well after that opening cold spell, getting the ball up the floor quickly against the Lions' press and hitting nine of 15 shots as they pulled within two, 20-18, at the end of the quarter.

Roy Brown, who led all scorers with 21 points, and Foster each had eight, first-quarter points for the Lions.

Lyons began to assert itself on the boards in the second quarter. Twelve

of the winners' 19 points came on offensive rebounds. The Lions connected on only eight of 24 shots from the floor but kept banging the boards until the ball finally dropped.

Palmyra-Macedon hung tough, though, forcing the Lions out of their press, and the Red Raiders stayed within five, 39-34, at the half.

Lyons began to pull away midway through the third period. 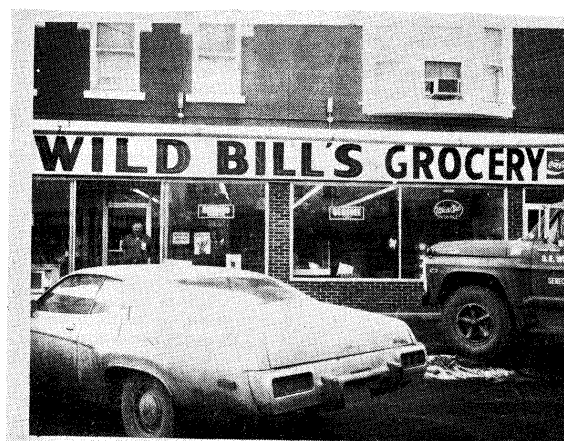

Raymo building a wrestling power at Wayne

Wrestling in Section 5 has become increasingly competitive in the last few years and that is reflected in the development of the sport at Wayne Central School.

The Eagles were 14-2 last season and 12-3-1 this season, winning the Wayne County League title. They were runner-up in the Wayne-Finger Lakes League to Canandaigua.

"Before I came here, we were sliding down," says Dawson Raymo, in his fifth year as coach at Wayne. "I've been lucky. There's a lot of enthusiasm here."

"Our best asset is town recreation program for first through fifth graders," says Raymo. It's in its fourth year.

"I started out coaching a basketball program for youngsters," Raymo says. "I found that they were tired of running up and down the court and scoring a few points. At the time, I was studying behavior and psychology at Oswego State and I learned that youngsters need to be given incentive. I rewarded them with a system of scoring points."

"I laid down mats and started them on a wrestling program," Raymo says. "They became enthusiastic over wrestling because they scored points faster than in basketball."

"I quit coaching basketball and designed a program for youngsters in which they learned basic balance and coordination. I taught them movements related to wrestling by using the trampoline, the balance beam and by skipping rope."

The program already has paid off. Wayne had five winners in the Amateur Athletic Union Junior Olympics in Buffalo in 1974. Wayne's Bill Afronti was named the outstanding wrestler in the event.

"We wrestled Monroe County League schools in a freshman tournament a few weeks ago and we won seven of 12 events," Raymo says. "Coaches told me that we were ahead of those schools on the freshman level."

"The development of Wayne's program is similar to that of other Section 5 schools," says Earl Fuller, wrestling coach at the Rochester Institute of Technology.

"Raymo has created a lot of enthusiasm in the community," Fuller says. "He has the administration and community excited and they support him. Wrestling at Wayne is a community project."

"The more of the peer group that is involved in the program, the more interest there is," Fuller says. "The boyfriends and girlfriends of these cheerleaders and wrestlers will come to the matches because they want to be in-

involved.

"The same thing has happened at Spencerport," says Fuller. "The program was slipping for awhile, then Walt Teike became coach and turned Spencerport into a powerhouse."

"Raymo has studied the sport scientifically and really

knows it," Fuller says. Raymo wrestled under Fuller at RIT after winning four straight Section 10 championships at Massena.

"I can't produce a sectional winner," says Raymo. "The competition in Section 5 is tougher."

Raymo has a few good pros-

pects for this season's sectionals, though. Dan Van Dusen, 180 pounds, Roy Lan, 158, and Ted Hargarther, 119, are the key wrestlers.

Van Dusen (14-1) has pulled Wayne from behind to win two matches and has clinched four others with pins or decisions. On Wednesday night at

Marion, his one-point at heavyweight Eagles the Wayne League title.

"High school wrestling is becoming more so because of people who are knowledgeable how to teach it," says Fuller.

State Mat Tourney at RIT

The New York State Invitational collegiate wrestling championships will be held Friday and Saturday at RIT. Twenty schools are entered including RIT, Brockport, Fisher and UR.

The University of Buffalo is the defending team champion and will be seeking its fourth title in the six years of the tournament. Brockport, the State Conference champions, is expected to challenge Buffalo.

The preliminary rounds begin Friday afternoon at 2:30 with the quarterfinals at 7. Saturday the semifinals are scheduled for noon and the championship round at 6:30.

Leading the Brockport squad are Abe Lang at 134 pounds, John Martellucci at 142, Tom Maddock at 150, Frank Calabria at 167 and

Mackey Tyndall at heavyweight.

RIT's top candidates are Rick Lang at 150 pounds, Jim Hill at 158 and Paul Aviza at 177.

Bernie Porray's Sports...

The big sports news at Wayne last week was in wrestling where Dawson Raymo's high flying Eagles defeated a tough Marion squad 30 to 21 to win the county championship for the seventh time in the last eight years. While in previous years the championship was decided by a county tournament this year it was in head to head combat.

During the season Wayne defeated each of the county teams while Marion lost only to Wayne. Coach Doug May's J.V.'s can claim the same distinction as they were winners against all Wayne County schools that had J.V. teams.

In basketball the boys' teams had a rough week, dropping all four games. They played poorly at Webster Schroeder on Tuesday night, but came up with a couple of thrillers Friday night against Pal-Mac, losing both games in the final minute. The girls played only one game but came up with their first win of the season as they defeated the strong Lyons team at Lyons that had beaten them soundly in their first game of the season. The second game at Sodus on Thursday was cancelled because of snow, as was the boys' freshmen game that was to be played the same night at Wayne. The J.V. wrestling tournament that was scheduled for Saturday afternoon at Canandaigua was cancelled and their season is over.

The wrestling match with Marion on Wednesday night was a nature and one yours truly had looked forward to all winter. Wayne had lost only three dual matches all year and Marion had lost only one and both were undefeated against Wayne County teams, so the winner would be county champion.

The teams were also meeting strength against strength and weakness against weakness in individual matches. Some of the lustre of the match was taken away when two weeks ago Patsy Catalano broke his hand. Patsy, undefeated in dual matches, would have met once-beaten Walt Scott with whom he split two matches last year. Also Ralph Hartell for Marion, who was undefeated during the year, broke his wrist the same week. He would have wrestled undefeated Roy Lang but there were several other good match-ups.

At 98 pounds, Wayne's Steve Friedman (12-6) went against once beaten Al Pulcini. Pulcini got a first period take down and held the 2-0 lead until, with 54 seconds left in the match, he pinned Steve. Tom Jeffers and Jeff DeRytter battled to a 6 to 6 tie until late in the match when Jeff got a near fall and beat Tom 9 to 6 at 105. The 112 pound class was the battle of two undefeated wrestlers. It was a scoreless battle for over two periods until finally Marion's Rick Ertel reversed

Ron Fisher and picked up some back points for a 5 to 0 decision. Wayne had hoped to have picked up wins in these classes, but were now down 12 to 0.

Things didn't look good as Teddy Hargarther had a sore shoulder and shouldn't be wrestling because if he hurt it more he would be out of the sectionals next week. On the other hand, he had to wrestle if he wanted to wrestle at 119 pounds in the sectionals because by being out with injuries he hadn't wrestled enough at that weight to make him eligible. To darken the picture more the middle weight classes (126, 132, 138, and 145) were coming up and Wayne had only 24 of 61 of these matches during the year. Not that the Wayne boys hadn't done their best, but the average high school boys are in these weights making the competition that much stronger.

Once Teddy got on the mat he soon dissipated everyone's fears about him getting hurt as it took him just 16 seconds to take young Terry Reid down and pin him, giving Wayne six points. Frank Affronti, who has been out two weeks with a sprained knee, showed he is recovered by pinning Gary Van Kouwenberg at 1:17 of the first period, tying the score to 12 all.

Al Flint, who has had his troubles at 132 this year, took a 6 to 1 lead into the last period and then held his shoulders off the mat in a pinning position for the final minute to win at 6 to 4, putting Wayne ahead 15 to 12. Rick Leuty, who has won his last five matches, three by pins, made it 18 to 12 with a 7 to 4 decision over C.J. Hall. Jim Lana pulled another surprise when he decided Tom Ginnett 4 to 0 at 145, picking up the four points in the final period. This gave Wayne a 21 to 12 lead and assured them of a victory if they could get a pin and a decision in the final four matches. Had not Wayne been this far ahead Roy Lang, who wrestles at 155, would probably have been moved up to 167 with Dave Affronti, the fine freshman, filling in for Roy. As it was Roy wrestled at 155 and won his 22nd match of the year with a pin at 52 seconds. Dave Affronti, giving up a 12 pound weight advantage, did a great job but lost to one of the county's best wrestlers, Walt Scott, at 167. Gary Marianetti, the other freshman star up with the varsity, also moved up a class above his weight and even though he lost 6 to 3 he went the distance and showed why he has such great promise. Some great things can be expected from these two boys in the next three years. Old reliable Don VanDusen moved up to heavyweight and beat veteran Jacques Compton 4 to 3 for his 15th win against three losses in the season.

I would like to congratulate the Wayne coach and team on their fine season. Your 13-3-1 record is something to be proud of, as was your sportsmanship throughout the year. I would also like to congratulate the Marion team and their coach, Mr. Habecker, for their sportsmanship and friendliness. Both teams wanted this match badly but when Marion lost they accepted it graciously. Not once during the match did either coach or a player question the referee or scorekeeper. Neither team tried to crawl off the mat and there was no intentional stalling. It was a pleasure to watch it.

The J.V.'s had little trouble as Marion had only four wrestlers. Botsford, Bishop, Febrey, Leaty and Robusto won forfeit. Don Palermo won 11 to 4. Sterling Hyland lost 6 to 5. Brian VanderMortel lost 10 to 1 and Lee Bell won 15 to 3. The final score was 37 to 6. Coach Doug May and his boys also deserve congratulations on a fine season. They won 10 matches while losing four.

The Wayne girls' basketball team won their first game of the season after three losses by beating Lyons on their own court, 46 to 42. Wayne fell behind the first quarter, 15 to 12, but came up with 14 second period points while holding Lyons to four to take a 26 to 19 halftime lead. Wayne outscored Lyons 11 to 8 in the third period for a 37 to 27 lead. Wayne hung on in the final quarter as Lyons 15 to 9 scoring advantage failed to close the gap. Terry Febrey once again led the scores with 17 points, while Joann Dana knocked in 12, Chris LeViner 11, Lisa Hyatt, Laurie Gran, and Michelle Thurston each had two. Lyons had a poor shooting night, making only 17 of 70 field goal attempts, but much of it was caused by Wayne's strong defense and full court press.

Wayne's two basketball games at Webster Schroeder Tuesday night were a couple of ho-hummers. The sparse crowd in that spacious gym made them seem more like scrimmages than regular games.

The J.V.'s took a 12 to 6 first quarter lead and then led until the final two minutes when Schroeder scored two baskets to win 38 to 35. Jim Gardner, Mark Kline and Drew Smith each scored two baskets in the first quarter, and even though Bryan Loucks' two baskets were all of Wayne's second period points, they still led at halftime 16 to 14.

Two baskets by Gardner and one each by Loucks, Kline and Maimone increased their lead to 26 to 20 after three quarters, but they fell apart in the final period, giving up 18 points while scoring only 9 to lose by three. It was not only a low scoring game but there were no free

The games on Friday night against Pal-Mac were in direct contrast to those of Tuesday night, even though the varsity seemed hopelessly out of their game the first half. They fell behind by 18 points, at 27 to 9 and 36 to 18, and still trailed at halftime by a 43 to 30 score. Jerome opened the game with two free throws but Pal-Mac then went wild scoring 10 of the next 11 points and building their lead to 18 to 9 at the end of the first quarter. They continued their assault as they scored the first nine points of the second quarter to lead 27 to 9 before Wayne rallied for seven points to cut it to 27 to 16. Pal-Mac came right back to up it to 43 to 31 at halftime.

Coach Imhoff's lecture at halftime did some good as Wayne poured in the first eight points after intermission to cut the lead to five. The two teams traded baskets for the next few minutes until, with 3:37 to go in the quarter, Jim Nolan and Al Brooks each scored two easy lay-ups to put Pal-Mac back on top again by 13, which prompted Harold Granger to say, "That's it; they'll never catch up now." But that's the nice thing about this team. They never think they're beat. They scored 10 of the last 13 points of the quarter to trail by only six, 58 to 52. Two free throws by Hetu and bas' ts by Brown, Hetu, Bel nitz, Stephens and a tap in by Devlin at the buzzer brought them back. The scoring twins, Hetu and Stephens, each had eight

points in the quarter.

Jerome scored on the tip-off as the final quarter opened and Tom Buchiere hit two free throws as Wayne trailed by only two. After Dave Nolan built it back to five, baskets by Hetu and Brown cut the lead to one, 61 to 60. Pal-Mac led by 4, 68 to 64, with 3:26 left but two foul shots by Hetu and a basket by Stephens tied the score at 68 all with 1:13 to go. Jim Nolan made one of two free throws to put Pal-Mac ahead with 59 seconds left, but Bobby Hetu's tip in on a missed basket put Wayne ahead for the first time since the opening seconds with 20 seconds left. Pal-Mac came down the floor and worked the ball into big Jim Blyth who scored on a bank shot from the side with 10 seconds left.

Wayne still had time to score but lost the ball with four seconds left and the game went down the drain. As the team's mascot said afterwards, "You can't lose 'em much closer than that." Wayne's one-two punch of Stephens and Hetu had 26 and 22 respectively.

The J.V.'s played their best game of the year and led a rugged Pal-Mac team 62 to 61 with 2:15 to go, only to lose in the final two minutes, 67 to 64. Gardner, Maimone, Kline, and Bellinger divided Wayne's 19 first period points as the teams battled to a 19 all deadlock. Wade Osterhout's seven points were high in the second period as Wayne scored 20 to Pal-Mac's 19 to take a 39 to 38 halftime lead. They continued to lead after the third period as each team scored 16. Bryan Loucks had 8 and Jim Gardner and Chris Maimone 4 each. No one scored more than two points in the final period as Wayne led until the two minute mark and then were outscored three baskets to one. Chris Maimone and Jim Gardner played all-around good ball and scored 15 and 14 points respectively. Ball hawking Bryan Loucks had 11, Mark Bellinger 8, Wade Osterhout 7 and Mark Kline (My apologies - I've been spelling his name Klein and it should be Kline had 6.)

The schedule for this week found the boys' basketball teams at home against North Rose-Wolcott on Tuesday and they travel to Clyde-Savannah this Friday. The girls have no games scheduled this week but will be at home against Pal-Mac on Monday, February 24. The freshmen were at North Rose-Wolcott on Wednesday, February 19, and will be at home tonight, February 20, against Fairport at 7:00. They travel to Fairport Saturday morning. Their final game is tentatively scheduled for Monday night at home against Pal-Mac.

The wrestlers were at eliminations at Webster Schroeder Wednesday night and the top four winners from that round will be at another elimination tournament at Canandaigua on Saturday.

Except for the weekly thrill night that the varsity basketball team puts on, there wasn't anything too exciting in the sports field last week. The varsity chose last Tuesday night at Williamson to put on their act and it was another good encore as they waited until the final six seconds to insure a 70 to 69 victory. On Friday night they went down to the Lyons den and were devoured, 87 to 66, by the powerful Lions. The J.V.'s dropped two more games, losing to Williamson, 67 to 47, and to Lyons, 74 to 71. The girls' basketball team dropped their third game in a row, this time to Sodus at home by a 52 to 37 score. The varsity wrestlers had an easy time, winning their eleventh match of the year by downing North Rose-Wolcott 57 to 4. The North Rose team may be even worse next year as they had no J.V.'s for our boys to wrestle. Coach Rollie Heimberger's freshman team got revenge for the drubbing they took at Fairport last week when they beat that same team, 46 to 40, at home on Tuesday night. Saturday morning they dropped their third game in eight decisions, losing at Lyons 68 to 56.

Wayne's varsity basketball team bounced back from their loss to Marion with another of those wing-dingers at Williamson on Tuesday night. They built up a 12 point lead in the fourth quarter and then had to hang on and weren't assured of victory until the final six seconds. The lead see-sawed back and forth in the first quarter with Jerome Stephens' eight points off-setting four 30-footers by Chris Lund. Larry Luke's basket with two seconds left gave Williamson an 18 to 18 tie at the end of the first quarter.

The teams matched each other basket for basket for the first half of the second quarter, but with the score tied at 25 all, baskets by Luke, Lund, DeZutter and Schuler against a basket by Stephens gave Williamson a 33 to 27 lead with 2:00 to go. Wayne cut the lead to 36 to 31 at the end of the half.

Williamson took their biggest lead of the game, 38 to 31, as the third quarter opened, but Wayne came to life at this point and moved ahead 46 to 40 on three baskets by Larry Collins, two by Matt Brown and one by Jerome Stephens against a lone basket by Williamson's DeZutter. They traded

Williamson was called for an intentional foul on the throw-in and Bob Hetu sank one of the two shots to insure the victory. Luke's basket at the buzzer made the final score 70 to 69.

It was a good team victory, with four boys in double figures. Stephens had his usual good game with 24 points, Larry Collins had his finest game of the season with 15 points, and Bob Bebernitz and Matt Brown each had 10. Wayne actually won the game at the foul line where they converted 16 of 23 while Williamson was making good on 7 of 9. Wayne committed only 11 fouls in the game.

I hate to mention the J.V.'s because I'm supposed to report the results and not criticize, but I get more disgusted with them every game. This is absolutely no criticism of Coach Stoner because he has probably the best coaching record in the county and agrees with what I have to say. This is, in my opinion, the best J.V. team in the county, but has won only 4 of 12 league games. In Chris Maimone, Drew Smith and Jeff Trunzo they have more height than any Wayne team in a long time. They have three good, speedy guards in Mark Belling, Bryan Loucks and Mark Kvein, and some good, rugged forwards in Jim Gardner, Wade Osterhout and

Mike Lewis. They run and fast break well and are good shooters. Their big trouble is they don't shoot when they have the open shot. They look for someone who is more open and by that time they're covered, too, and they usually lose the ball before they get a shot off. Usually a coach sets a boy on the bench for shooting too much, but last Friday Coach Stoner sat a boy on the bench for not shooting. He's probably Wayne's best shooter but wouldn't throw the ball up. Remember boys, there are only two seniors on the varsity and Coach Imhoff won't be needing too many boys next fall. Unless you want to retire as sophomores, you'd better get on the ball. Now is the time to prove yourselves, not ten days before the season starts next fall. Coach Imhoff might have his mind made up before then. How about showing your coaches you want to play with a big win over Pal-Mac on Friday? You've proved you can dot it in practice and in parts of games this year. Let's put it all together for a change. Your coach has worked hard to make you look good, and you are making him look bad.

The J.V.'s took an 11 to 10 first quarter lead at Williamson, but then fell behind 27 to 24 at halftime and 47 to 41 after three periods. They scored only one field goal in the last eight minutes to get whopped 67 to 47. Ricky Leuty his fourth at 3:48, and Jim Lana his second at 5:32. Roy Lang wrestled former Wayne wrestler LeRoy Nof-tell, and won 8 to 1 for his 21st win of the year against one loss. Dave Affronti and Gary Marianetti won by forfeits at 167 and 177, and Don Vandusen moved up to heavy-

weight and pinned his man in 24 seconds. It was Dan's eighth pin and his 14th win against three losses.

Rollie Heimberger's freshman basketball team did an about face last Tuesday night when they beat a Fairport freshman team 46 to 44 in overtime after the same team had beaten the 72 to 48 last Saturday. Wayne built up a 28 to 14 halftime lead and then had to hang on as Fairport tied it at 44 all in the closing seconds. Hobbie Jones' basket in the overtime won it for Wayne. Titus Stephens was high point man for Wayne with 16, while Mike Burns was right behind with 14. Both teams played great defense in the second half.

A bad first quarter cost Wayne a 68 to 56 game on Saturday morning at Lyons when they were outscored 26 to 7. It was just a case of Lyons hitting their open shots and Wayne not taking advantage of theirs. Lyons scored 10 field goals to two for Wayne. After the first quarter Wayne played them on even terms, but could never rally enough to get back in the game. "Harry" Huntley, who is still troubled with his broken leg, had his best game of the year, pouring in 16 points, but had trouble getting back on fast breaks. He had ten points in the third quarter. Mike Burns and Titus Stephens each had 11 and Tyke Morrill had five points, four in the last quarter. Once again all 16 boys had a chance to play.

The girls' varsity basketball team had only one game last week, and they lost that to Sodus, 52 to 37. As in their first two games the girls had a good first half, trailing by only one point at halftime, 20-19, but Sodus used the fast break to gradually pull away in the last half. Wayne trailed 34 to 27 at the end of three quarters. Terry Febrey led the Wayne scores with 17 points, while Joann Dana had 10, Laurie Granger 6 and Chris LeViner had 2. Lisa Hyatt and Terry Febrey boarded well for Wayne.

Wayne's varsity lost at Lyons, 88 to 67, last Friday night just because they were up against a better team. Lyons has height, scoring ability, good defense and, most of all, a very strong bench, and should make a good showing in the sec-

tionals. Lyons out rebounded Wayne, 68 to 43, which just about tells the story. Big 6 foot four inch Dave Schleede missed his first two shots but hit the next seven in a row to help Lyons to a 26 to 18 lead at the end of the quarter. They scored the first 10 points and led 14 to 3 before Wayne cut the lead to eight on two foul shots by Matt Brown just before the quarter ended. Brown cut the lead to six as the second quarter opened, but that was as close as Wayne could get the rest of the game. Lyons increased their lead to 43 to 28 late in the quarter, but two baskets by Dave Gordon and two free throws by Paul Deulin reduced the defeat to 45 to 34 as the half ended.

Jerome cut the lead to 45 to 36 early in the third quarter, but Lyons poured in five unanswered baskets to take a 19 point lead and just about sewed up the game.
