Brighton brightens Mephram's outlook

Except for the fact the game went to two overtimes, Brighton's stay in last year's Section 5 High School Basketball Tournament didn't last as long as the seeding luncheon.

In their first sectional game, the Barons were ousted by Greece Olympia. They figure to erase that memory quickly this year since coach Clarence Mephram calls the team "potentially the best I've had" in 11 years.

To Mephram's coaching colleagues in the Monroe County League East Division the Barons are the team to beat.

The ball-handling will be in the good hands of his sons, Dennis and Bill, and in the frontcourt two juniors, 6-foot-4 Irving McGill and 6-3 Jim Bittker, join All-Greater Rochester Derrick Reaves, who averaged 19.5 points a game last year.

With Reaves and Dennis Mephram providing much of the firepower, 6-5 Alan Brandt aiding the rebounding, and Larry Axelrod spelling the guards, Brighton should have at least as good an offense as it did during the 13-6 season last year, and, more important, should be much improved defensively.

Golden Eagles have depth

Nick Der Cola apparently is returning as coach of the Clyde-Savannah basketball team at the right time.

The Golden Eagles (7-11 last season) have eight strong players returning, and have been mentioned by most of the Wayne County League's coaches as the top contender for the championship.

"Eight people can start, this is not a five-man team," says Der Cola, making his second varsity coaching comeback in the 23 years he has been at Clyde-Savannah.

John Zulauf, 6-foot-3 forward and last year's leading scorer and 6-4 Jim Arnitz give the Golden Eagles more height than usual.

Der Cola's son, Mike, Jeff Noble, George Grantling, and Bryant White started at various times last year. Richard Barnes and Dave Milisani will fight for a starting post.

SODUS — All-league Chris Williams (21.0) graduated leaving Ed LaRock without a high scorer among the returning four starters for the Spartans (11-9). They are juniors Bill Dodge, John Jackson, and Jim Sergeant, and senior Karl Manser, (6-3).

The sixth and seventh men from last year, Jason Cheeseman and Kevin Campbell, both 6-3, and Rick Groot, provide LaRock with experience. "I don't know who's going to start," he says. "That's one question mark. Others are shooting, defense, and lack of a big scorer."

LYONS — The Lions (20-2) Section 5, Class A and league champions, lost four starters, including All-Greater Rochester Dave Schiede. The only returning starter is guard Bobby Scott, who averaged 13 points and six assists a game. Willie Smith, sophomore, will be the team's leading scorer.

"We have more quickness and speed than last year, says coach Rod Verkey. "We have good people but we're untested."

PALMYRA-MACEDON — Two starters, Tom Hickey and Jeff Blyth, return. Gary Burkett (6-5½) give the Red Raiders (10-9) a big man, something they haven't had for years.

"We have nine or 10 people we can use," says coach Henry Burdick. "We have decent size." Burdick likes two sophomores up from junior varsity, guard Steve Lagana, whom he says is "very quick," and 6-2 Paul Johnson.

WILLIAMSON — New coach Jim Leonard, who played college basketball under Bob

MacKinnon at Canisius College, has one starter back Curt Shuler, a 6-3 center.

Williamson (11-8) will miss the rebounding and scoring of Larry Luke.

Two promising players are Dale Van Gander and Calvin Wynn. Leonard likes their quickness. "At least seven junior up from the junior varsity could start," he says.

NORTH ROSE-WOLCOTT (6-13) — Bob Jackson and Bill Bastian, 6-3 forwards, are the Cougars' top rebounders. Guard Mike Minier, the third leading scorer last year (11.0) is the playmaker.

Ken Bundy, a sophomore who averaged 19 points a game for the junior varsity, looks promising for the Cougars (6-13).

WAYNE — High scoring Jerome Stephens and high leaping Bob Hetu graduated and four players on last year's team decided to sit out this season, leaving coach Chuck Imhoff with six lettermen. Guard Larry Collins (12.0) is a key if the Eagles (9-10) are to improve.

Seniors Matt Brown, Dave Gordon, and Bob Bebernitz are good inside players, according to Imhoff. Chris Malmone and Mark Bellingier, up from the junior varsity, should help.

MARION — Guard Dennis Jones, in his third year of varsity play, heads four returning starters. Jeff DeWandel, Scott Lucier and Kevin Adriaansen give the Black Knights (5-15) more height than in past seasons.

"We should improve," says George Strickland. "We'll shoot decently. We won't panic as we have in the past."

RED CREEK (12-3) — John Johnson, a 6-3 forward-center is the only returning starter. He scored well toward the end of the season. Pete Sechnieble, Joe Collier, and Dave Nagle are potential starters.

"We have four good players," says coach Don Hartley. "But we lack depth."

Sorry, the county all-star soccer team was not out as this went to press so I'll give you a few of the team's statistics. Don Johnson and Brian Amele tied for the team scoring lead, Brian had the most goals, nine, and two assists for 11 points, while Don had the most assists, seven, plus four goals for 11 points, also. Bob Bebernitz had five of each for 10 points, Tom Buchiere three of each for six points Mike DeLass two goals and three goals and three assists for five points, the same number Steve Kumlander had for his five assists. Craig Hofmann had three goals and one assist, while Bob Reynolds, Tom Monahan and Blaine Crandell had a goal each, and Bryan Loucks and Jim Pick had two assists and Dave Metcalfe one.

Wayne finished the regular league season with a 9-2 and 1 record and scored 23 goals to 12 for their opponents. In over-all play, including the sectionals, they outscored their opponents 29 to 23, while winning 12, losing 6 and tying one. Goalie Jim Gardner recorded six shutouts, including two in the sectionals.

It looks like another casualty in the county soccer league, the third in the last five years, as Palmyra has asked to withdraw from the Wayne County league. In five years they have a record of three wins and 68 losses. Their football team is also having a tough time, winning only one of their last 16 in the last two years. Just another case of spreading a sports program too thin.

The basketball team has been chosen and will consist of the following 14 boys: Bob Bebernitz, Dave Gordon, Larry Collins, Matt Brown, Chris Maimone, Dave Botsford, Wayne Coyle, Mike DeLass, Jim Gardner, Drew Smith, Mark Bellinger, Bryan Loucks, Mark Kline and Jeff Trunzo, who is now out with a broken ankle.

Wayne lost only two players from last year's squad, but they were Jerome Stephens and Bob Hetu, the team's top scorers. Four players from last year's squad did not come out for the team this year. Pal-Mac and Clyde-Savannah look like the teams to beat this year. Lyons, Red Creek, North Rose-Wolcott, Williamson, Marion and Sodus each lost at least three regulars.

Half of Coach Stoner's offense for the J.V.'s is out with a broken arm. That, of course, is Mike Burns, who broke is harm playing soccer and then had to have it reset later. He is coming along well and shouldn't have to miss too many league games. Most of the team will be made up of

last year's fine freshman team. Big Harry Huntley and Marty Aman, along with Mike Burns, should give them plenty of board strength, while Lorenzo Smith, Titus Stephens, Chris Wheeler, Tim Reynolds, Tyke Morrill, Charlie Jones, Jeff Zonneville, Scott Mason and Charlie Jones should supply the speed. Mike Carney, a transfer from Marion, has looked good in practice and is in the battle for a first team berth.

The wrestling season opens Wednesday, December 3, with Wayne entertaining both North Rose-Wolcott and Sodus. The first league match will be a week later, December 10, at home against Waterloo. Wayne should have a fine team. More next week.

Wayne Eagles should improve

ONTARIO CENTER—The Wayne Eagles finished an up-and-down Wayne County Basketball League season at 8-8 last year. This year, coach Chuck Imhoff says his team should improve on that.

Graduation took away the one-two scoring punch of Jerome Stephens and Bob Hetu, who between them scored more than half of Wayne's points. Stephens' 24.3 average led the league and earned him a spot on the all-league team, while Hetu averaged 12.7 and was a third team selection.

However, Imhoff feels his team will be able to score just as many points this year, and the scoring will be evenly divided.

Six lettermen, four of them starters last year, return. Matt Brown, a 6-1 starting forward, averaged 8.5 last year, while Larry Collins, a guard, averaged 7.1. Bob Bebernitz and Dave Gordon, both 6-3, split the other forward spot last year and averaged over 11 points between them. The other returnees are 5-10 swing man Dave Botsford (1.8) and guard Wayne Coyle (1.0).

Bebernitz, Brown and Gordon are likely starters up front and will be pushed by junior Chris Maimone. Other frontcourt possibilities are Botsford and juniors Drew Smith, Jim Gardner and Jeff Trunzo.

Giving Kelly a battle for the starting guard spots are juniors Mark Bellinger and Mark Kline, the best shooter on the team. Rounding out the backcourt candidates are Coyle, senior Mike DeLass and junior Brian Loucks.

"We're changing our philosophy," says Imhoff. "We're going to be an aggressive team this year, a team that can run. We've got good size, but our big guys will be mobile; they'll have to be."

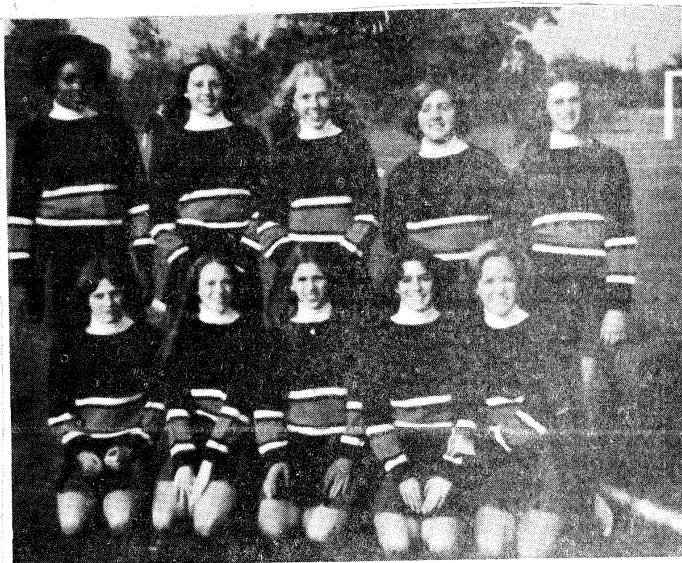

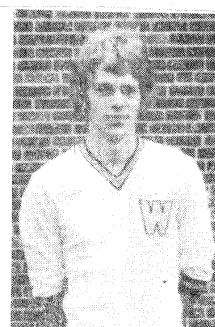
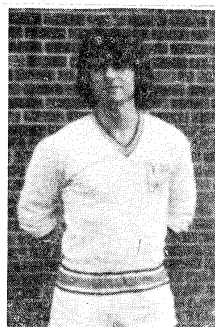

The girls' volleyball team was scheduled to open the winter sports season this week with two matches on Monday and two on Tuesday. On Monday they traveled to Sodas and were supposed to have played North Rose-Wolcott and Lyons. Sodas also played Lyons and North Rose-Wolcott. The host team is responsible for all four matches. On Tuesday four matches were at Wayne with Wayne playing North Rose-Wolcott again and Clyde-Savannah and Lyons playing the same two teams. Next Monday, December 1, Wayne and Marion will be host teams (each responsible for two matches) with Wayne playing Pal-Mac and Marion and Clyde-Savannah playing Marion. The match this past Tuesday was the only time the Wayne girls will be playing at home this season.

The following girls will be representing Wayne after surviving the cut of some 80 players who were out for the team: Lauri Granger, Lisa Hyatt, Terry Febrey, Terri Corney, Karen Fuller, Carolyn Welker, Jeanine VanHoover, Alison Stead, Kathy Dennison, Kim Grace, Donna Nersinger, Cindy Stevens, Debbie Farley, Patty Jock and Linda Smith. They are playing a 12-game schedule with the regular season ending on January 7. The girls basketball season will open at Penfield on January 27. Miss Van Hoover will be coach of both teams.

The wrestling season opens at Wayne next Wednesday, December 3, in a triangular meet between Wayne, Sodas and North Rose-Wolcott, with both the varsity and junior varsity participating. All matches will be held at the high school, starting at 4 p.m. The proposed schedule is as follows: junior varsity 4 p.m., Sodas vs. NRW; 5 p.m., Wayne vs. NRW; 6 p.m., Wayne vs. Sodas; varsity, 7 p.m., NRW vs. Sodas; 8 p.m., Wayne vs. NRW; 9 p.m., Wayne vs. Sodas. This schedule is flexible and it is possible some matches will take place ahead of schedule as the visiting teams don't always fill all the positions and there could be several pins. To make sure you see all Wayne's matches, you should probably be there by 7:30. You shouldn't miss this meet as there will only be four other home matches this year. There are six matches on the road and Wayne will be participating in three tournaments (at Penfield, Canandaigua and Spencerport), and a double dual meet against East Rochester, Bishop Kearney and Brighton at East Rochester.

The prospects for a good team look good on paper as six veterans are back, plus several boys who had some varsity experience. Wayne's biggest loss was Don VanDusen, who was 18 and 5 at 177. Teddy Hargather (14-3) and Patsy Catalano (9-2) will also be missed, but they were injured part of the season and this allowed other boys to get some varsity experience. Also, lost by graduation were Rick Luty and Al Flint.

Wayne's biggest problem could be over-confidence among the veterans. No sports demands more dedication and self-sacrifice than wrestling. To be at your best

wrestling weight you must work hard on your diet, giving up many of those "goodies" during the season. Hopefully, good competition on the team will prevent this problem.

First of all, we have good news at both ends of the roster. We have a new weight class at 91 pounds. It is optional and if both participating schools add the weight class the result of the match is part of the score. At the other end, for the first time in several years, Wayne has a legitimate heavyweight in Rick Finney. In past years Wayne has had to forfeit that class or a 177 pounder moved up.

Before I start running down the weight classes, don't feel bad, boys, if I leave some of your names out. When I talked to Mr. Raymo he had no roster and I am going by what I can remember in talking with him and from last year.

At 91 pounds, the new position, Bob Wambach, Jim Jeffers and Ron Jonas, a newcomer, are battling for the job. Chris Friedman, who started out at 98 last year, before losing out to his brother, Steve, is the leading candidate for that position. Dan Botsford, who wrestled some at 98 last year after Steve Friedman broke his arm, is after the 105 spot. Tom Jeffers, who was 10 and 8 overall last year at 105, is the likely wrestler at 112. Steve Friedman, with a fine 12 and 6 record at 98, seems to be set at 119. Tom Febrey, after five years with the freshmen and J.V.'s, and who saw some varsity action last year, has a shot at 126, but Don Palermo and a couple others are giving him competition. Ron Fisher, a fine 20 and 4 wrestler last year at 112, will probably be at 132 if he doesn't make weight for 126. Clint Osterhout, a fine-looking freshman, is also in the battle for these positions. The biggest battle is probably for the 138 weight where Jim Lana, who spent half the season on the varsity at 138 with a 3 and 6 record, and Jan Leaty, and outstanding freshman last year, are in a battle that could go either way. Frank Affronti, who was 13 and 11 overall at 126 and who won four of six in the sectionals, should improve at 145. Roy Lang, who was Section V champion at 155 last year and had a record of 27 wins against two losses, hopes to equal or better those figures at the same position this year. Two boys who did a great job filling in for Wayne last year as freshmen when injuries occurred should hold down the next two positions although they are getting a lot of competition from Lee Bell, who came on strong for the J.V.'s at the end of last season, and Ken Manning, a good-looking newcomer. Unless these two can do something about it, Dave Affronti should be at 167 and Gary Maranetti at 177. Both have great ability and only need experience. As said, Rick Finney is expected to be the heavyweight.

With all the competition for varsity spots, the J.V.'s, coached by Tom Gentile this year, should come up with a good team. About 40 boys are still trying for positions on the two teams. Several boys, including Larry Bamford, Dana Luty, Dan Welker, Tony Robusto and Filaberto Sanchez, who wrestled last

year, are not out for the team this year for various reasons.

The varsity basketball team scrimmaged against Marcus Whitman and Victor last week and Coach Imhoff was quite pleased with what he saw. The first stringers held their own against both clubs. Big Dave Gordon was very impressive. It looks as if he may develop into the player we had all hoped he would for the last three years. The season opens Friday, December 5, against Williamson at Wayne.

Tigers down Blue Knights

Ken Faubel's decision over Mike Burczak in the heavyweight bout clinched a 23-18 victory for the Rochester Institute of Technology against Geneseo State in a non-league wrestling match last night at RIT.

Faubel's 7-0 victory, worth three points, came after the Blue Knights Dan Murphy pinned Carl Romaster of RIT at 5 minutes, 12 seconds of the 190-pound match to narrow the Tigers' lead to 20-18.

Rich Lang, formerly of Wayne Central pinned Greg Tordy of Geneseo at 1:42 of the 177-pound match.

Bob Rutan of RIT won a 16-8 decision, worth four points, at 142 pounds, and Mike Iannello, a junior varsity wrestler inserted into the match, drew Bruce Janowski at 126 pounds.

Improving Wayne 'looks strong'

ONTARIO — The Wayne Eagles have improved every season in the Wayne-Finger Lakes Wrestling League under Coach Dawson Raymo and they have come close to capturing the title. But, for the most part, their biggest headache has been the Canandaigua Braves.

"We've have managed to beat every team in the league over the past several years, but we have never beaten Canandaigua," says Raymo, who hopes things might be different this year.

Last season, the Eagles posted a 5-2-1 record, finishing third in the Eastern Division behind the Braves and the Newark Reds, a team which has been steadily building its program to rank as one the league's top clubs.

"On paper, we look strong," says Raymo, "but every year it seems we lose somebody because of an injury and it winds up hurting us." us.

Raymo lost four key wrestlers through graduation, including 119 pound ace Ted Hargather, but he feels that he has the wrestlers to replace them.

Also gone is 177 pound Ron VanDusen and Raymo feels he may be harder to replace than anyone else. VanDusen was unbeaten in the league and placed second in the Section 5,

Class A tournament.

Raymo has six lettermen and he considers his top returnees to be 155 pound Roy Lang and 145 pound Frank Affronti. Lang was sectional champion at 155 last year, while Affronti placed third in the sectionals at 126 pounds.

Other veterans are 112 pound Tom Jeffers and Steve Friedman, 119 pound Larry Bamford, 126 pound Ron Fisher and 138 pound Jim Lana.

Raymo figures his strength will be in the upper middleweights, but noted that "I feel we have wrestlers capable of winning any match."

The top candidates at the new 91 pound class are Jim Jeffers and Bob Wambach, both freshmen, while battling at 98 pounds are newcomers Dave Weisenreder and Chris Friedman.

At 105 pounds, Raymo is looking at Dan Botsford and Roberto Sanchez, while Tom Jeffers and Steve Friedman are both currently at 112 pounds.

Bamford is set at 119 pounds while Fisher is being battled at 126 pounds by newcomer Tom Febrey.

Earl Comstock, a transfer from Caledonia-Mumford and Quint Osterhout are at 132 pounds, while Lana is the top man at 138.

Affronti is at 145 pounds while Lang is at 155. Newcomer Dave Affronti, Lee Bell and Gary Maranetti are at 167

pounds. The loser of the 167 pound wrestle-offs will go to 177 pounds, according to Raymo.

Rick Finney, another newcomer is the heavyweight.

Raymo rates Weisenreder at 98 pounds and Osterhout at 132, as the most promising newcomers.

Don't ever try to tell former DeSales griddier that all his brains are in his feet. He's got proof that his brains are in the right place.

Nick Quartaro, who owns the University of Iowa record for the longest field goal, and who led the Hawkeyes in scoring this season with his talented foot, has been named to the Big Ten All-Academic team.

The junior place kicker owns a 3.04 academic average at Iowa while studying for a journalism degree. And that's not one of those snap courses. I know.

Nick contributed 40 points to the Hawkeye total this season with 19 extra points and seven field goals, including a 50 yarder against Penn State, which broke his own school record. Quartaro ranked sixth in Big 10 scoring.

Earning the Big Ten honor also puts Nick in competition for the national All-Academic team to be selected this month.

When you go north of the border into Wayne County, you are getting into soccer territory.

While most fall sports fans south of the county line think of fall as the time of year for football and maybe a little cross country, in Wayne County, it's soccer, and in soccer, it is Wayne Central.

That school has won 15 consecutive Class B league championships and has added the Section 5 title 10 times since 1953 plus capturing one in Class A.

At Gentile, who sometimes has been better known around these parts as

wrestling coach and official, started the great string of victories at Wayne, including a Class A title in 1958, when the Eagles routed highly regarded East High in the finals 9-1, after ripping Jefferson 12-0.

In 1966, Gentile turned the team over to Chuck Imhoff, and the results have hardly been different. In 10 seasons, Imhoff's teams have won 10 Class B league titles and five sectional crowns. Three other times the team lost in the finals and twice the Eagles lost in the semi-finals.

In 10 years, Imhoff's teams have won 148 games and lost only 26 while being tied in 11. They have outscored the opposition 610-151.

In 1968, the team had a 19-1 record and the following year went 18-0-1. During that 39 game span, the Eagles had 30 shutouts, giving up just 13 goals while the Eagles scored 163.

From 1966-1969, Wayne won four straight Section 5 championships, led by the son of the team's former coach. Ton Gentile set a national schoolboy record when he scored 124 goals in his four year career, which is something when you consider that opponents in that stretch scored only 39 goals.

The idea of two wrestling matches in one day, especially against top competition, is appealing to Geneva Coach Bill Brooks, who plans on making the double-double dual meet hosted by the Panthers over the weekend, an annual event.

Next year, however, Geneva probably will travel to Rochester to take on teams like McQuaid and East High. Those two teams regularly battle for the top spot in the City-Catholic league in Rochester, and that kind of competition, win or lose, has to be a help to rebuilding your program.

Worried Wayne pulls out W-FL mat win

MIDLAKES—Wayne wrestling coach Dawson Raymo agreed with Midlakes coach Bob Ruggles that the Screaming Eagles had Wayne "worried, but we just ran out of gas at the end."

Midlakes led most of the way, but

Top scoring teams meet in Wayne loop

The top two scoring teams in the Wayne County basketball league have at it tomorrow night when the undefeated Palmyra-Macedon Red Raiders pay a call on the Sodus Spartans.

The Raiders have a 3-0 record and have beaten their three previous opponents by a margin of 22.7 points per game. Pal-Mac started relatively conservative, scoring a 60-58 thriller over Clyde-Savannah. Since then, the Raiders have taken off, scoring 73 points against Red Creek and 91 against Wayne.

That figures out to a 74.7 points per game average and the Raiders are likely to need every one of those points, if not more, when they go against the Spartans, who lead the league in scoring with a 78.8 points per game average.

Sodus, however, has a 3-1 record, having been tripped up in its third game of the season, dropping a 79-74 decision to the Lyons Lions.

Still, the Spartans are winning at an 18.5 point clip and undoubtedly offer

the Raiders their stiffest competition of the still young season.

While these two powers are going at it, the second place Lions (4-1) draw a bye, and the Clyde-Savannah Golden Eagles (3-1) host the Wayne Eagles (2-2).

The league schedule rounds out with three teams seeking a second win and one hoping to get into the victory column for the first time. Williamson (1-3) calls on Red Creek (1-4) while Marion (0-3) visits North Rose-Wolcott.

Action Friday wraps up the pre-holiday schedule for the league teams.

Pal-Mac and Sodus each have three players averaging in double figures with the top scorer being Sodus' John Jackson, who ranks second in the league to Lyons' Bobby Scott. Jackson has a 19.3 average while Scott goes into the holiday break with a 22 point mark.

Pal-Mac has the fourth leading scorer in Terry Vanderwall, who is hitting at an 18 point clip.

Clyde-Savannah has the league's third best winning margin, having beaten four opponents by an average

of 10.5 points per game. That comes mostly from defense, the Golden Eagles having allowed only 46.5 points per game, best defensive mark in the league.

That could be a plus or minus for the Golden Eagles against Wayne. If the host Eagles can stay close to Clyde-Savannah, they could be trouble. The Eagles' victories have been by one and four points. In their other two games, they been beaten soundly.

Williamson boasts the league's third leading scorer in Eligha Hill as the Marauders go against the Red Creek Rams, who, while owning just one victory, have faced the top four teams in the league in the last four outings.

Marion needs to find scoring punch from somewhere, no Black Knight averaging in double figures as the team owns the lowest scoring mark at 44.7 points per game, while losing three times by an average of 30 points per game. North Rose-Wolcott owns only one victory, but that was a stunner over the Lions, and the Cougars have five players averaging

in double figures, which could be bad news for Marion.

In varsity wrestling, Wayne held a 28 to 23 lead over Waterloo going into the final two matches last Wednesday night, but lost one by a major decision and the other by a decision to suffer their first defeat of the season, 30 to 28. The match was close all the way and was actually settled by a superior decision which gives five points for a 12 or over point spread. Bob Wamback lost 8 to 2 at 91 but Chris Friedman tied it up with a 5 to 1 win. Dan Botsford lost 9 to 3 at 105 and Junior Sanchez lost by a pin at 112 to put Waterloo ahead 12 to 3, but Steve Friedman had a 4:12 pin and Tom Febrey an 8 to 1 decision at 119 and 126 to knot the score at 12 all. Ron Fisher remained unbeaten and unscored on with an 8 to 0 win, but Jim Lana lost 12-0 to put Waterloo ahead 17-16. Frank Affronti at 145 had a 1:42 pin and Roy Lang won by forfeit at 155 to put Wayne ahead 28 to 17. This put the pressure on Wayne's two fine sophomores, Dave Affronti and Gary Marianetti as Wayne had to forfeit at heavy-weight. They were wrestling a couple of veteran seniors and did fine the first two periods, but experience made the difference in the end. Dave was behind only 5 to 2 going into the final period, but lost 13 to 4. Gary trailed only 7 to 5 with two minutes left but lost 13 to 7.

Against Bishop Kearney at East Rochester on Saturday night, Wayne was in the match until the final bout when they lost 30 to 21. Chris Friedman put on another fine performance with an 11-1 win but Dan lost by a pin at 3:51. Steve Friedman picked up another win 6 to 3 but Tom Jeffers lost a major decision 13-5. Tom Febrey tied the match at 19-all with a 9 to 2 decision and it remained tied as Ron Fisher wrestled his man to a 3-3 tie with a reversal in the final seconds. Jim Lana lost 9-5 and Frank Affronti lost 6-4 as B.K. went ahead 18-12. Roy Lang got three points back with a 7-1 win but Dave Affronti hurt his shoulder and lost by default. Gary Marianetti put Wayne back in the match with a 2:34 pin after building up a 6-2 lead, but Rick Finney, a sophomore who lacks only experience, lost by a pin.

Even though Wayne got clobbered by East Rochester 38 to 16, they held a 13 to 12 lead after six matches. Chris Friedman, the little sophomore who has really come on this year, won his fifth match of the season with a major 8 to 0 decision. In his five wins only two points have been scored against him. Dan Botsford lost by a pin but Chris' brother Steve Friedman
