Wayne never got closer than 14 points the rest of the game as Lyons led 59-39 at the end of the third quarter and 80 to 57 at the end. Chris Maimone scored in every quarter to lead Wayne's attack with 13 while Dave Gordon had 9 and Larry Collins 8.

The J.V.'s got blown off the court in the first quarter as they couldn't handle the Lyons press and made many costly turnovers. They lost to East Rochester 53-12 as only Dave Weisenreder's 38 pin and Don Palermo's third period pin put points on the scoreboard for Wayne.

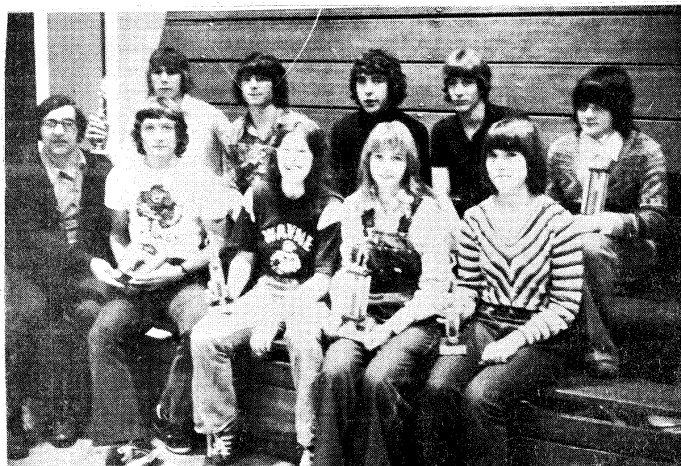

There is much better news to report on Wayne Central sports this week. Probably the best news is that Wayne will have another team in the Sectionals. The girls volleyball team defeated Lyons and Sodus last week to clinch a Sectional berth. They now have a 7 and 3 record with two matches left on January 7 against Pal-Mac and Clyde-Savannah. According to the girls, they are going to spoil Pal-Mac's undefeated record on that date.

They downed Lyons 15-8, 12-15 and 15-8 with Terri Corney, Alison Stead and Cindy Stevens leading the way for Wayne. They then got past Sodus in some close matches, 15-6, 9-15 and 15-12. Lisa Hyatt and Donna Nersinger were top servers in this win.

The varsity basketball team evened their record at 2 and 2 with a fine overtime win over North Rose-Wolcott last Tuesday night. Dave Gordon put Wayne on the boards first with a short jumper and after NRW tied it at 2-2 Wayne led a 17 to 13 lead going into the second quarter. Gordon, Matt Brown and Chris Maimone each had a pair of baskets.

NRW tied the score two minutes into the second quarter and the lead changed hands several times before the half ended in a 33 all deadlock. Dave Gordon pumped in three more and Matt Brown two to pace Wayne.

Jan lost his varsity spot Saturday to Jim Lana, but came home a winner. Young Weisenreder now has five pins and three forfeits in his eight matches.

In the varsity matches, Don Palermo, Jim Lana, Dave Affronti, Gary Marianetti, Steve Friedman and Rick Finney all lost in the first round, which eliminated them. Bob Wambach at 91 won 9 to 8 and then lost 2 to 2 to finish second. Chris Friedman won 6-0 and lost by two pins for fourth. Dan Botsford had a bye and lost 10-2 and 7-5 to finish fourth. Tom Jeffers tied 7-7, won 3-0 in overtime, lost to the eventual champion 4-0 and then lost 5-4 to finish fourth. Ron Fisher won 3-2 and 6-2 before losing in the finals 8-2 to finish second. Zello stars for Geneva

Four members of the Geneva wrestling team were out with the flu, but John Zello looked in perfect health yesterday as he won the 107-pound championship in the Spencerport Christmas Tournament.

Zello ran his record to 12-0 with a 16-0 victory over Doug Keenan of Pioneer (Section 6). Zello's other victories in the tournament, the toughest holiday high school tournament in the state, were by a pin and a 14-5 decision.

He was the lone bright light for Geneva, which finished last out of 14 teams. Huntington, L.I. (Section 8) was first with 236½ points, while Victor was ninth with 97, Caledonia-Mumford 10th with 94½, Bath 12th with 81½, Wayne 13th with 78 and Geneva 14th with 75½.

Wayne's Roy Lang had a much tougher time than Zello but he held off a late rally by Lancaster's John Martinec to post a 6-5 victory at 155 pounds.

"My takedowns are my strong point," said Lang (13-0). "He stepped in front of me and took me down, and nobody's ever done that before. I just had to fight him off."

Caledonia-Mumford's Tom Buckley and Robin (Scott) Parker lost their final matches. Buckley lost, 9-3, to Glenn Jarvis of Athens, Pa., at 114, and Parker, a state runnerup last year, was beaten, 16-3, by Mike Picocchi of Huntington.

The 10th annual tournament featured the defeat of a two-time defending state champion and a pin by Hilton's Chuck Partridge, who was losing, 11-0, at the time.

Huntington tried Jeff Thomas, a state champion at 112 pounds, in the 128-pound class, and the advancement proved too much for him. He lost, 3-0, to Pioneer's Kyle Grunwald, fourth in the state last year at 119. It was Thomas' first loss in two years.

At 134 pounds, Partridge trailed, 5-0, after Pioneer's Jeff Tingue executed a hip throw, and matters went from bad to

Injuries hurt Reds' wrestlers —

Newark coach's dreams turn to nightmares

NEWARK—You can't blame Jack Fisher for feeling snakebit.

In recent weeks, the Newark wrestling coach has seen his dreams of an outstanding wrestling season turn into nightmares. Fisher had great expectations for this season because he had lost only one man from last year's team which finished second in the league with a 6-2 record.

Since the start of the school year, Fisher has seen the nucleus of his team severely weakened. He has lost seven of his eleven returnees due to injuries

and eligibility problems.

His biggest loss is Brian Willemssen, who is out for the season with an arm injury. Willemssen, a senior, placed first in the Newark Tournament last year and is a defending Section 5 AA champion.

Injuries also have taken veterans Dave Molina, Dick Wood, John Hodgson, Doug Parkinson, and Andy Sheer out of the lineup for the season.

Fisher has not fully recovered from the shock of the sudden series of in-

juries. "Right now I don't know what to think," he said. "We're going to take one match at a time and not look ahead. These kids are tough; I'll just try to keep their attitude up."

The depleted Reds are 2-3 on the season. They started the schedule with wins over Palmyra-Macedon and Marion and then lost to East Rochester, Bishop Kearney, and Canandaigua.

"We've already faced the toughest part of our schedule," Fisher com-

mented. "We should win the majority of the bouts in our remaining matches, but forfeits may come into play." The Reds have had to forfeit the heavyweight class since Molina's injury.

Fortunately for Fisher, his healthy lettermen are strong wrestlers. Fisher noted, "All our returnees are good. They were good last year, and they figure to be better this year."

The Reds will be pinning their hopes on Harry Allerton and John Guchone who pinned several opponents last year. Allerton, undefeated this season at 167, is a "threat to win the sectionals" according to Fisher.

Guchone, a 138 pounder, was voted the outstanding wrestler at the Newark Tournament last year and is 3-2 so far this season.

The other veterans on the roster are Norm Mayville, Tom Hethcoat, and Greg Hardy. Mayville is 4-1 at 112, and Hethcoat is 3-2 to date at 145.

Chris Avery has been a pleasant surprise for Fisher. Avery, a 126 pound junior, was not a regular last season, but he has compiled a 4-1 mark this season. "Chris looks better each match. He is constantly improving," said Fisher.

The Reds other starters are freshmen Jerry Hughson (98) and Jeff Palermo (105), sophomores Ken Rowe (119) and Bart Howlett (155), and senior Dale Martin (177).

The Reds return to action Jan. 3 at the Attica Tournament.

Zello, Lang win mat titles

SPENCERPORT—John Zello of Geneva won the 105 pound weight class championship and Wayne's Roy Lang won the 155 pound title in the Spencerport Christmas Wrestling Tournament, although the best showing by a Wayne-Finger Lakes team was Victor's ninth place finish in the 14 team field.

Huntington, a Long Island powerhouse, won the team title with 236½ points, taking five championships. Spencerport placed second, while Wayne finished 13th with 78 points and Geneva was 14th scoring

75½ points.

Zello won his first match by forfeit and then pinned Parvin Mensch of Athens (Pa.) in 1:45 and decisioned Dan Kasper of Hilton 14-5 to gain the finals. Zello overwhelmed Doug Keenan of Pioneer, Section 6 champion and the top seed, 16-0 in the finals.

Lang was top seeded at 155 and had little trouble reaching the finals, winning one match by a pin and taking 8-1 and 6-3 decisions. In the finals he met John Martineck of Lancaster, the second seed. After building a 6-0 lead, Lang held off Martineck's closing rally to win 6-5.

Victor's top finishers were Jim Abraham and Dave Condon who took fourths in the 145 and 177 pound classes respectively. Due to an unorthodox scoring system, Chris Hahn was Victor's high scorer. Hahn, wrestling at 167, won his first bout by fall but was pinned in his second match and moved to the consolation bracket. Hahn then

went on to pin his last two opponents to record a team high 19 points.

Geneva, despite its last place finish, had the best won-lost record of the WFL teams. The Panthers were 16-16 while Wayne had a 16-22 mark and Victor was 19-21.

You will have to take the referee's word that a pin has been recorded because he has his nose jammed into the mat to see if there is a pin and only from this vantage position can it be determined that two shoulder blades are on the mat.

The referee must be alert, agile and deftly nimble. He must move around the opponents with the quickness of a cat.

He must also know what in billy-ho he is doing and looking for and if you're a novice at the sport you'll soon learn what it's all about. We're still learning... and loving every lesson.

In baseball you can see the base hit, in basketball the basket, in football the touchdown, in volleyball the spike and in horse racing your horse finishing last. If you can see a pin in wrestling it'll be on a competitor's warmup jacket.

We took in Saturday night's jamboree with Wayne Central and it was worth the price of two admission tickets even if we rode in on our press card. It was a great show, really. The only complaint was that the gym wasn't filled to capacity. We hope it will be Saturday night.

When the Wayne Eagles came flying into the gym they reminded us of a karate group. They looked awesome in their black robes. The young 'uns appeared ready to throw a karate chop against one end of the gym and another on the wooden bleachers.

It was a great moment for the young athletes ready to grapple the Reds on the mats or on the snow banks outside.

There's a loud cheer when Coach Jack Fisher leads his Reds into the gym to the blare of a recording. It's jungle music or hard rock. The wrestlers go through their warmups in preparation for the big match.

The war begins but it's the Wayne Central coach who suddenly steals the show. He paces back and forth behind the row of Wayne wrestlers, whistling and shouting instructions to his man on the mat.

"Stand up," he yells. "Keep that leg high. . . one minute . . . 20 seconds . . . too high . . . lower your hip."

Coach Fisher, kneeling on one knee on the opposite end of the court, is the opposite of the Wayne coach. He's quiet and occasionally utters a word of encouragement to his man.

The Wayne wrestler wins a point, we think, and apparently the match when the referee raises the lad's hand in victory.

"Beautiful," the Wayne coach throws his arms around the happy warrior.

There's a shrill whistle. The Wayne coach now works on the second bout.

"Get behind him," he shouts while leaning on two chairs. "Behind him. No mistakes, Bob. No mistakes. Stand up will you! Stand up."

Jeff Palermo, the Newark wrestler, takes his opponent down for a pin and lets everyone know it with all kinds of victory signs. He's a happy one. Why shouldn't he be? It's his first year as a varsity wrestler.

The Wayne coach keeps up the pacing behind the row of chairs and stops to remove the headgear from one of his wrestlers. The Newark man on the mats breaks out of a difficult situation and a loud cheer goes up in the stands proving that the fans know what's going on in the center of the gym.

A decision goes against a Newark wrestler and we can hear a few boos drifting toward the referee. We thought he was immune to jeers proving once again that the spectators must know what in billy-ho it's all about out there on the padded floor.

"Get up," yells the Wayne coach. "Get up. Keep moving. Get off your knees."

While the coach is imparting instructions and encouragement to his boy on the mat we observe a young 'un dipping into a brown bag and pulling out a jam sandwich. Then two hard-boiled eggs. It's a jamboree. We learn later from Sgt. The Ontario and Walworth school districts were centralized in 1949 and the present Wayne Central School was opened in 1953. Since centralization, many fine athletes have passed through the school's doors. There are few schools, if any, in Wayne County, or even Section V, that can boast of the athletic achievements of Wayne's sports teams in the last 26 years. I am sure no team comes close to the number of championship teams in soccer and wrestling, at least in the county. Wayne should be at or near the top in baseball and tennis, also. The Eagles have had some good track teams, and even though they have had only a few county championships in basketball and no Sectional champions, they have participated in the Sectionals many times.

Certainly much of the credit must go to the fine coaching staffs over the years, especially to Al Gentile, who was coach of three sports for the first 16 years and has been athletic director the last 10. But coaches must have some talented boys to build a record such as Wayne's and there have been many. From Clarence Mephram, who starred in soccer, basketball and track in 1949 or 50, to this year's fine bunch of athletes, including Tom Buchiere and Roy Lang, you could accumulate quite a list. It's not good to list names because you are always leaving out some of the better ones. The list could probably include the names of Harley Geil, "Duck" Morrill, Harry Hill, "Chuck" Minamon, the Slocum boys (Lee and Bill), Carmen Molino and several others from the 1950's. Also many of the boys from Wayne's two great basketball teams of 1964 and 1974, most of whom played two or more sports, including Bob Kelly, Don Bailey, Lon Schilstra, Ken Bradstreet and Jim Henderson from '64 and Jim Kelly, Chris Collins, Jeff Loucks, Clete Manning, Bob Hetu and Jerome Stevens from the '74 champs. Also Tom Gentile, Kevin Hill, Brian Douglas, the Taille boys - Gene, Dennis and Larry, and wrestlers Rick Lang, Charlie Catalano and Paul Dutcher, to name a few.

It's fairly easy to pick stand-outs in most sports, but to pick one outstanding athlete for the past 26 years is impossible. The person probably most qualified to pick such an athlete would be Al Gentile, and even he says too many things enter to make such a selection possible.

In soccer there is no question that Tom Gentile was Wayne's greatest all-around player, although Brian Douglas, Kevin Hill, Bob Kelly and Chuck Minnamon and others were excellent players.

In basketball I've seen all the players and would hate to pick one over the other. Certainly the two finest teams were in 1964 and 1974, but both played a completely different type of basketball. The '64 team played a deliberate, set type of basketball that stressed defense and was almost boring to watch at times as they stalled once they got ahead, but they accomplished their purpose by winning 20 consecutive games before losing to a powerful Waterloo team in the

1974 team was always looking for the fast break, came from behind many times and could explode at any time, running up large scores. Lee Slocum was a county scoring champion and Cliff Harrell was a fine all-around ball player.

In tennis probably no one could match the feats of Mark Fleming. He won 102 straight sets, winning the "B" Sectional singles championship twice and having a career record of 57 wins against 4 losses.

Several boys had fine records in wrestling, including Carmen Molino, who had a great career at Wayne and went on to star at Cornell and tried out twice for the Olympic team. Charlie Catalano won 20 consecutive matches and Rick Lang won 24 before losing in the Sectionals. Paul Dutcher had a career record of 33 and 1 and last year Roy Lang won 27 matches while losing only 2.

Track is one sport I don't know too much about but I know that Marty Doyle did very well in both track and cross country.

The competition is probably keenest in baseball. Frank Vascukynas was probably the best pro prospect with several no-hitters, but Bobby Tobin pitched Wayne to their only Section V championship. Brian Douglas was another great pitcher and Harley Geil was one of the top natural athletes.

In bowling, Steve Chinelli won two Sectional single championships, which certainly makes him one of the best in that sport.

The purpose of this article is not to try to pick the most outstanding athlete from this fine group, but to pick one boy whom I feel would be a good representative of the top ten, not only in athletic ability but in sportsmanship, desire, attitude, consistency and play under pressure. A boy whom I feel a coach would want to enter in a decathlon of school sports or a super star contest. I am going to give all the statistics and some of the highlights of this boy's career so that when some "super star" comes along in the future, someone might be able to refer to this article to see how he stacks up with the stars of the past.

The boy I have chosen was probably not the top athlete in any of the three sports he participated in, but I feel he ranked in the top three of all of them and was an all-star in each sport. I have chosen this particular person because I had the privilege of seeing him perform in nearly every one of the contests he participated in in two sports, have all the statistics available and have marveled at his great ability many times. He proved that ability means much more than size.

I'm not going to keep you in suspense. My choice is Chris Collins because to me he fits all the categories mentioned above.

Chris entered high school in the fall of 1970 and graduated in the spring of 1974. He played soccer, basketball and tennis and served as a substitute only in his first year in tennis. I'll run down his achievements in each of his sports in that order.

starter as a freshman and started every game during his career. His team the first year, had a 15-1 record, won the class B and county championships, but lost in the finals of the Sectionals to Spencerport, 5 to 2. As a sophomore Chris was the team's leading scorer with 16 goals as his team again won the county championship with a 15 and 3 record before again losing to Spencerport in the finals, this time 2-0. Chris was picked for the first county all-star team along with Randy Luke and Jamie Buck.

Chris poured in 20 goals in his junior year as his championship team finished the regular season with a 13-1-2 record. In the Sectionals, Wayne tied Churchillville-Chili 1-1 in double overtime and then lost the next day 1 to 0 in the semi-finals. Once again Chris was chosen on the county all-star team, being a unanimous choice.

As a senior Chris played on what to me was one of Wayne's greatest soccer teams as they had most of their boys back from the year before, but once again stumbled in the Sectionals and lost 1-0 to Honeoye Falls. Chris led the team in scoring with 28 points on 16 goals and 12 assists, and once again was a unanimous county all-star. In his four years on the varsity, the team won 54 games while losing only 5 and tying 4 in regular season play, and outscored their opponents 58 to 14 as the team won the B championship all four years.

Chris was great in soccer, but I feel his greatest achievements were in basketball. As in soccer, in his four years of basketball he was never a substitute. As a freshman his J.V. team won the championship with a 15 and 3 record. After playing three games on the J.V.'s as a sophomore, he moved up to a starting position on the varsity and never relinquished that spot.

His varsity debut was far from spectacular as he scored only three points against Lyons, but a couple of games later he has his stride as he poured in 21 points against a heavily favored Sodus team as Wayne won 83 to 74. The sports editor of the Wayne County Star, watching his great performance, pinned the nickname of the "Mini-Marvel" on him. Cliff Harrell also had a great night, scoring 33 points.

Two weeks later, Lyons came to town, looking for their 29th straight victory. They had joined the Wayne County League in 1971, won all 18 of their games and were victorious in their first 10 in '72-'73. With 67 Tim Shipley and 63 Al Simons averaging 20 and 17 points a game, no one had come close to beating them. The game was very close the first three quarters with Wayne leading 15-13, 27-23 and 45-40 at the stops. In the fourth quarter, Wayne scored 26 points, including 13 of 15 free throws in the final six minutes to upset one of the greatest Lyons teams, 71-62. As the Geneva Times said the next day, "Sophomore Chris Collins sparked the Eagles with 19 points on 7 of 12 from the field and 5 of 6 from the free throw line." It was Lyons' only loss of the year. Wayne finished in second place with a 12 and 4 record. Chris finished with an 11 point per game average and a 71 per

cent average from the line. The team beat Jefferson in the Sectionals before losing to LeRoy on a last second shot in overtime.

In his junior year, Chris was the only starter back and was joined by four boys from the J.V.'s, giving them an all-junior team. The boys wound up with an 8 and 10 record, but had many thrilling games. Wayne dropped their first game of the season at Red Creek in the last 23 seconds as Chris led the team with 16 points. He had 13 points in the next game as Wayne dropped a 51-50 game to Sodus on a free throw in the final second. That was the only close game Sodus had all season as they won all their games including the Sectionals. Wayne won their next four games before losing to Red Creek and Sodus again in the second half. The Red Creek game was another one-point, 68 to 67.

To prove Chris was human I must report he had one bad game. It came at Marion when he fouled out with only one minute gone in the second quarter. I am sure it was the only game in his career that he failed to score. Wayne lost the game 48 to 47.

Chris more than made up for that the very next game. Williamson came to town looking for revenge as Wayne had beaten them 55 to 53 in the first half of the schedule. The first quarter was close with Williamson leading 16 to 14 but they gradually pulled away, leading Wayne 35-30 at halftime and 48-38 at the end of the third quarter.

Williamson took a commanding lead, 53 to 41, but Wayne led by Chris' four baskets, closed the gap to 55 to 51 with three minutes left.

Williamson refused to fold and with 1:16 left in the game had what looked like a comfortable 60 to 41 lead. At this point the unbelievable happened. Chris hit a 15 footer and Clete Manning drove the baseline to cut the lead to 60-55. Bob Hetu hit two free throws and Chris stole the ball and layed it up to cut the lead to 60 to 59 with :28 left. Bob Hetu hit two more from the line to put Wayne one up, but a Williamson foul-shot tied it up at 61-all with 14 seconds left on the clock. Chris then made the shot many of us will never forget. He hit a 24 footer from the right side with four seconds left to win it 63-61.

Wayne had scored 12 points in one minute and 16 seconds and Chris ended up with 30 points, including 14 in the last quarter and 6 in the last minute. Wayne ended the season with an 8 and 10 record and lost to Waterloo in the Sectionals. Chris was a third team County all-star and led his team with a 14.2 point average per game.

Wayne's 1973-74 team was what most people consider Wayne's greatest team ever. It's hard to compare the '64 and '74 teams because of their different styles of play, but there's no question that the '74 team was the most exciting to watch.

The team opened the season with a Sodus team that had won 22 consecutive games the year before and was Section V champion. The game was close all the way with Sodus leading 27-27 at halftime and Wayne leading 38-37 after three quarters. Wayne led 54-46 with three minutes to go in the game and

but Sodus rallied to win it 56-54 with two foul shots with 12 seconds left. Chris scored 18 points.

Wayne defeated all the other teams in the first half, including a game with Clyde-Savannah in which Chris scored 28 points on 12 field goals and 5 of 5 from the free throw line. They also defeated Lyons in overtime.

On January 29, 1974, was the game many fans will long remember. It was the rematch at home against the powerful Sodus team that by now had won 33 straight games. With the overflow crowd standing in the halls, Wayne took a 16-12 first period lead and extended it to 37-24 by halftime. Wayne added on three more points to their lead in the third quarter as Sodus trailed 49 to 33 going into the final eight minutes.

Sodus came storming back at this point to come within four points, 61-57, with 1:04 left, but that was the end. Jeff Loucks hit two free throws and Chris added four more to win it 67 to 57 and break the longest winning streak in the state at 33 games. As the paper said the next day, "The King was dead." Wayne had shot 45 percent from the field and hit 17 of 19 from the line.

Both Sodus and Wayne won the rest of their games to tie for the county championship. Included in those games was another unbelievable one. Wayne played at Red Creek and fell behind 60 to 52 entering the last quarter. It was then that Chris put on what was probably the greatest individual performance of any Wayne Central athlete. He scored the first eight points of the quarter to tie the score at 60 all. The lead changed hands a couple of times and Red Creek led 68 to 67 with 39 seconds left. Chris made good on a technical foul at this point to tie up the score. Wayne controlled the ball until, with three seconds left, Chris was fouled. He hit both ends of a one and one and, when Red Creek threw the ball in, he stole it and was fouled again. He made one of two shots and when Red Creek was hit with three more technical fouls he poured in three more, giving him six points in three seconds and Wayne a 74 to 68 win. He scored 38 points in the game on 10 field goals and 18 of 24 from the line, 17 of those points coming in the last quarter. Also in an overtime game with Lyons, Chris scored 20 points, including seven in the overtime.

He scored 19 points in his final game of the season before losing in the Sectionals to beat. He had 45 regular matches in his high school career and won them all as his teams also won the county championship all four years. Chris had little to do with the

first championship as he was a substitute and won the only match he played. As a sophomore he teamed with Mark Hedgepeth on the doubles team. With Mark Fleming and Paul Schmitt as first and

second singles, they probably had the only perfect season in Wayne County history. They won all 16 matches, all by 3-0 scores.

As a junior, Chris moved to second singles and once again had an undefeated season, although the team lost a couple of matches. He won the county championship but lost in the Sectionals.

His senior team was another great one as he as well as the doubles team of Kevin Schultz and Tim Heberle went undefeated. He was again singles champion and defeated three boys in the Sectionals before losing out. He was chosen the team's most valuable player.

Except for a freak accident, Chris would probably have been a star baseball player instead of tennis. He was a great Little League player and in an all-star game at Ontario in which yours truly was the umpire, he swung at a low pitch and as it fouled off his bat, it hit him in the eye. His eye immediately swelled shut and he was rushed to the hospital, where he was kept a few days. It was X-rayed and he was told there was a bone chip in it and he would be operated on the next day. To get rid of some of his energy he did a somersault in bed and the bone chip came out and he didn't need the operation, but he never played much ball after that.

He could have also starred in track as he was one of the best in junior high.

To summarize Chris' career, he was a varsity starter for four years in soccer, three in tennis and nearly three in basketball, never missing a game. In regular league play he won 45 consecutive matches without a loss in tennis, he and his teams won 54 soccer games while losing only 5, and in basketball their record was 52 wins and 19 losses. This means in 175 contests he participated in he was a winner 151 times while losing just 24 times, which is better than an .860 average. His teams won the county championship four times in soccer, four times in tennis and twice in basketball (once in J.V. and once in varsity). By being an undefeated regular for three years in tennis he was naturally a county all-star in that sport and was chosen a first team county all-star in soccer three times (twice by unanimous choice of the coaches) and one third team and unanimous first team choice in basketball. He was also chosen to the All Greater Rochester team, which is the top honor a boy can receive in this area. He was the smallest boy on the team. All of the teams he played with at the varsity level participated in the sectionals.

Team records like these aren't accomplished through the efforts of one individual

and Chris is the first one to realize that he had some great teammates and two fine coaches in Chuck Imhoff and Gerald Weisenreder, but some one has to lead the way as Chris did so well. It is a great thrill for me to say I saw all of his basketball games and most all of his soccer games. He was a real gentlemen at all times.

Chris has continued his great soccer skills at Oneonta State College where he was a regular starter as a freshman last year and this year was chosen to the first team on the State College's all-star team. His Oneonta team won the league championship. Both sound natural.

You fathers who want your son to be one of the all-time greats at Wayne Central better read these statistics over and then get him practicing. He's got quite a ways to go.

Bernie Porray's Sports

Except for some great individual efforts by wrestlers Roy Lang, Clint Osterhout and Dave Weisenreder, Wayne had little to "crow" about over the holidays. The J.V. wrestlers participated in a tournament at East Rochester on December 22 and finished a respectable fourth or fifth, with Dave Weisenreder winning the championship at 100 pounds and Clint Osterhout finishing first at 134. The varsity wrestlers took part in the prestigious Spencerport tournament, which featured the top wrestling schools in New York State - and some from Pennsylvania - and even though the team didn't do too well, Roy Lang established himself as one of the top wrestlers in New York State by beating four top wrestlers to win the championship in the 157 pound class. The only other boys who placed at all were Bob Wamback, who wrestled off for fourth place and lost, and Frank Affronti, who wrestled off for fifth place and also lost.

The varsity basketball team took part in the Spencerport Christmas tournament and lost both games, 89 to 59 to Spencerport and 60-45 to Oakfield - Alabama. The J.V.'s did much better, losing a close one in the final minutes to Spencerport, 65 to 58, and downing a good Oakfield-Alabama team 60 to 58.

The Spencerport wrestling tournament, which included such schools as Huntington, Long Island (which has 400 wrestlers out for the team) Pioneer (near Buffalo), Lancaster and Athens, Pennsylvania, Bath, Hilton, Rush-Henrietta, Bishop Kearney, Geneva, Victor and Wayne among its participants, was won by Huntington with 236½ points and five champions. Spencerport came in second. Wayne was not at full strength as Gary Marianetti was sick, Dave Affronti came home the first night and was unable to get back, and one of the better wrestlers has quit the team for personal reasons.

For Wayne, at 93, Bob Wamback had a bye, was pinned, had a 3:49 pin and then lost by a decision; at 100 Chris Friedman lost, had a forfeit and lost again; at 107 Dan Botsford lost, had a forfeit and lost a decision; at 114 Steve Friedman had a first round pin and lost his next two; at 121 Tom Jeffers lost, had a forfeit and lost; at 128 Ron Fisher beat a Bath boy 5-1, lost to a Lancaster boy 7 to 2 and lost to Rush Henrietta; Don Palermo, at 134, lost, had a forfeit and lost again. Jan Leaty had a bye and lost the next two at 140; at 147 Frank Affronti lost 5-3 to Bishop Kearney, had a forfeit, won 6-2 from a Bath boy and lost his final match.

At 157, Roy Lang, who was seeded number one, pinned a Spencerport boy, beat a boy from Hilton 8-1, decisioned a

Huntington boy 6-3 and in the finals took a 6-0 lead in the final period and then hung on to keep his shoulders off the mat in the final seconds to win 6 to 5 and give Wayne their first championship ever in a Spencerport tournament.

Dave Affronti lost a tough one, 6 to 5, at 169 the first day, went home to meet an appointment at night and, when the bus and wrestlers un-

expectedly stayed overnight in Spencerport, had no way to get back the next day. Rick Finney lost his first two matches at 217.

In the J.V. tournament at East Rochester, Ron James at 93 won by a pin, lost by a decision and then won by a pin to finish third. Dave Weisenreder, the brilliant young freshman at 100, picked up two more pins and a decision to remain undefeated and add the East Rochester championship to the Penfield championship he won the week before. At 107 Bill McGuire had a pin and a decision before losing in the finals to finish second. Bob Lis at 114 finished sixth at 128. Clint Osterhout had a decision and a pin and a miracle pin. He was losing 10-0 with 20 second left in his match when he reversed his man and pinned him with one second left. There's a lesson for you boys. Never give up! In other matches, Bob Zimmerman and Steve Leaty finished seventh, Ken Manning eighth and Paul Perry fourth.

In the basketball tournament at Spencerport against Spencerport, Wayne played poorly and was never in the game. They were down at halftime 47 to 26 and never got any closer. Except for fine play by Bob Bebernitz and Bryan Loucks it might have been worse. Larry Collins led the Wayne scoring with 15 while Mark Bellinger had 11 and Bob Bebernitz 9.

In the consolation game, Wayne played a good game except for the second quarter when they were outscored 24 to 12. Wayne came back strong in the second half, but poor rebounding kept them from catching up. They were out-rebounded 33-15. At that, they outscored their opponents 23 to 21 in the second half.

Larry Collins played a great game and scored a career high of 25 points. No one else had more than six as Wayne lost 60 to 45. Tom Tretter of Oakfield-Alabama, who scored 24 points against Wayne and 30 against Kendall the night before, was awarded the most valuable player award over the more publicized Roosevelt Bouie of Kendall.

Coach Stoner's J.V.'s played a fine game against Spencerport the first day and were within two points of the lead when big Harry Huntley fouled out in the final minutes of the game, the fifth of Wayne's big men to foul out. The reserves lacked the

height and Wayne lost 65 to 58. Spencerport won the game by cashing in on a majority of their one and one free throws. Jeff Zonneville was top point getter for Wayne with 12, while four other boys had 8.

In the Kendall game on the second day, Harry Huntley and Mike Burns combined for 31 points to give Wayne a 60-58 win. Harry had 17 points and 17 big rebounds to lead the way.

All the teams swing back into action this week. The girls were at Clyde-Savannah yesterday afternoon (Wednesday) to play Pal-Mac and Clyde-Savannah and close the regular volleyball season. Sectionals start next week.

The boys basketball teams entertain Red Creek at home tomorrow night (Friday).

The wrestlers will be at Newark on Saturday night at 6:30 and 8. The freshmen were at Webster Spry on Wednesday.

Next Tuesday, January 13, the basketball teams will be at Sodas and the wrestlers will be at Pal-Mac on Wednesday.

Bad night for favorites as 3 fall in Wayne

It was like the moon was hung upside down last night in the Wayne County basketball league. To be specific, it was a lousy night for favorites as three of the four choices were upended.

Only the Sodus Spartans managed to escape the shocking turn of events, Coach Ed LaRock's team belting North Rose-Wolcott, 82-41.

The rest of the league was nothing but surprises where the Red Creek Rams shocked the Lyons Lions 59-55; the Marion Black Knights scored their first victory of the season, stunning Wayne 75-70, and the Williamson Marauders upended the Palmyra-Macedon Red Raiders 69-64.

All of which had to make the Clyde-Savannah Golden Eagles, league leaders, mighty pleased to have the night off.

Joe Collier was the main thorn in the side of the Lyons Lions as the Red Creek ace had a "tremendous game," according to Ram coach Don Hartley.

Collier hit on nine of 13 field goal attempts but more important, he stopped Bobby Scott, the league's leading scorer with just eight points.

"He did a real super job," declared Hartley.

The Rams, who led from start to finish, though tied at 50-50, also got a big job from Pete Schneible, who rebounded well, brought the ball up against the Lyons press and tossed in a game-high 22 points.

The Rams startled the Lions by jumping off to a 24-13 first period lead and held on the rest of the way as Lyons cut the difference to 36-26 at the half and to 44-42 after three periods.

The Lions finally caught up at 50, but Collier popped in a jumper and that

Dave Buisch had 12 points for the Lyons while Tom Smith added 10.

Schuler really took over when Pal-Mac lost Mike Kibble, who picked up three early fouls and spent much of the game on the bench.

Williamson rallied from a 14-13 first period deficit to a 31-26 halftime lead and made it 53-44 after three quarters. Pal-Mac managed to close within three points late in the game, but the Marauders went to the foul line to protect their lead.

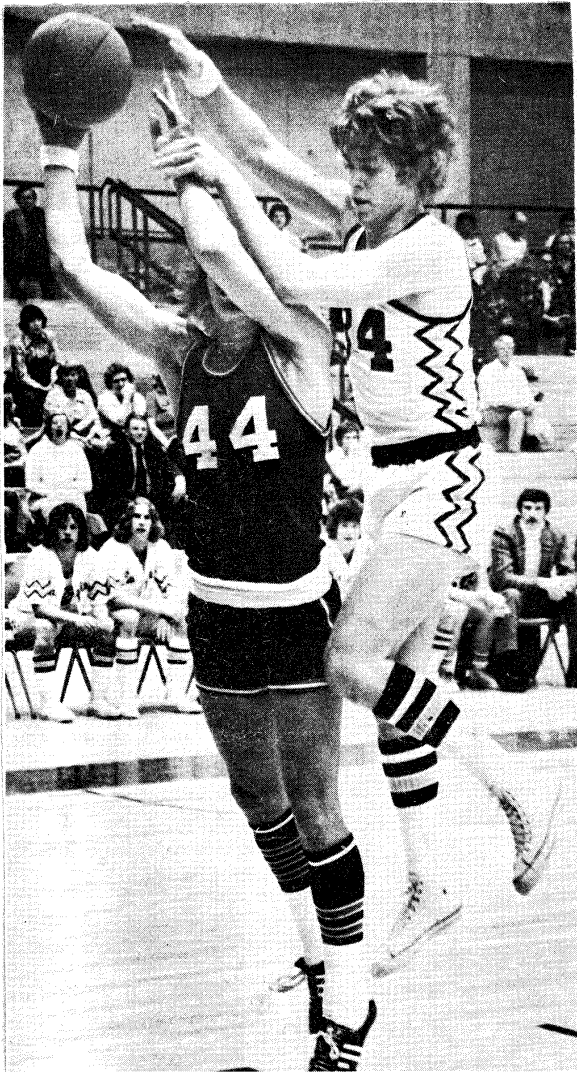
