CLYDE—"I watched Notre Dame try it three times and it failed all three times. I was hoping it would fail again."

Some of the "secrets" discussed, were cost of bus-ing, insurance, medical supplies, coaching, field light-

ing, cleaning, etc., etc., etc.
Mr. Porray claims that football was defeated on two occasions when presented to the public and this is true. The reason for these defeats was omitted in his column. The reason and only reason for its defeat was because of exaggerated estimates given in the cost of bringing football into the school. People were afraid that as tax payers it was go-ing to cost them a great deal of

money. Mr. Bonanno sought this

information so he could present a realistic budget to the school board which was in proportion to the actual cost of setting up a program. This program if accepted by the school board would be offered at no cost to the tax payers of the school district.

A group has recently been formed called the Wayne Central Athletic Booster Club and it is their intention. it is their intention to fund this program by direct finan cial aid. This will be in addi tion to the generous offer by the Ontario Golden Eagles.
The Eagles are willing to donate over \$4,000 worth of equipment to the school district.

Mr. Porray mentions that Mr. Forray mentions that the administration and the "group" are trying to sneak this program in with out a referendum. My question to him is when were the sports of soccer, baseball, basketball, track tonic wreefling.

soccer, baseball, basketball, track, tennis, wrestling and all of the programs offered at Wayne Central, not mandated by the state, ever put up for a referendum?

I'd also like to know how many programs offered at Wayne Central are at no cost to the tax payers of the district such as the one we are proposing for football.

Another point he makes is that a football team is going to effect our soccer team adversely because there are not enough boys to go around.

enough boys to go around. This is a complete fallacy. In last years Golden Eagles prolast years Golden Eagles program there were 70 boys of Jr. High and Sr. High level participating. These same boys did not participate in any fall program at Wayne Central. It is our intention to give these boys an opportunity to play an interscholastic sport. Not every boy has the ability or desire to play soccer and I believe that the Golden Eagles success in fielding two teams is attributing to this.

Many schools, Penfield and Pittsford to mention just two had great soccer teams when

had great soccer teams when they added football and still have great soccer teams.

There are 19 schools in the Wayne Finger Lakes League and of all these schools we are the second largest. If the other schools many of which are smaller, are able to support

smaller, are able to support football in addition to soccer I can see no reason why the Wayne Central can not.

Mr. Porray states that one of our greatest assets is our right to vote and he is right. We voted in the members of our school board to realise asset. we voted in the members of our school board to make deci-sions such as this one before them now. Make your feel-ings pro or con known to them just as you would to your congressman or Senator; but remember in the final analysis it is their job to make the decision, regarding school programs.

CLYDE-"My prediction can true," said a smiling Clyde-Savannah Coach Nick DerCola. "I said defense and rebounding would win it."

The Eagles, who had built as much as a 20 point lead midway through the third period, fronting 40-20, had a 16 point edge going into the final period at 44-28, and as late as 6:11 of the final period, had a 17 point lead at 50-33.

Dear Sir:

This letter is in response to the football boosters' propo-sal for a three year pilot pro-gram of senior high football at Wayne Central, which is supposed to be financed by this citizens' group. I would like to voice my op-

position to any such program, especially if it is insti-tuted by the school board rather than through a vote by district resident.

As far as I can see, there is no way this citizens' group can legally guarantee to finance such a progrm for three years, let alone for a longer period of time. Human nature period of time. Fruman nature and conflicts being what they are, sooner or late the district would have to pay for the pro-gram, and the taxpayer will end up paying the full shot.

The boosters argue that Wayne Central students are being deprived of the opportunity to earn college football scholarships. I have seen no figures on the number of scholarships which could be expected each year, but I doubt if it could be more than two even in a good one or two, even in a good year.

I have also yet to see any real student desire for this program. I do not want to be unfair, but it seems to me that it is the fathers, rather than the boys who would be involved, who are really pushing for it. From what I have seen and heard about the adults be hind the Golden Eagles pro-gram, quite a few are the "win gram, quite a few are the "win at all costs" type of sports en-thusiasts, a phiolsophy which has no place in a school ath-letics program, which should be designed to teach young people good sportsmanship and the benefits of physical fitness.

Another problem is the federal Title IX, which requires equal opportunites and expenditures for female stu-dents. Since the boosters have refused to finance girls foot-ball or a similar program, the district (taxpayers) would have to pay for it. As far as I'm concerned, cheerleading, as suggested by one football promoter, hardly qualifies as a sport. To be fair, perhaps we should have boy cheerleaders for the girls' program.

In these days of personal and governmental economic hardships, with Wayne Cen-tral facing the loss of over \$100,000 in state aid this year, I cannot see how the school district could institute such a district could institute such a program. It would end up costing hard-pressed taxpayers more money, despite the promises of the promoters, even if only for the construction of more locker space to house the equipment.
