Bob Schlegal and Pete Hightower, a couple of big boys who saw some action last year, are also battling for a starting position. There are some schedule changes this year. First of all, last year, the "B" schools played each other twice and the "C" schools only once. This year all teams will be played twice. Wolcott and North Rose have com-bined and will be a "B" school along with Clyde-Savannah, Soatong with Cyde-Savanian, so-dus, Newark, Williamson and Wayne. Marion and Red Creek are "C" schools. This gives Wayne 14 league games and as they are allowed only 16 regular season games, only two exhibition games will be played this year.

As mentioned, Brighton plays here tomorrow night, Septem-ber 13, and Wayne will host Webster Saturday, September 25, 7:45 p.m. under the lights. There will be only three night

All night games were scheduled in the first part of the season when hopefully, the weather would be warmer. Wayne wanted more night games but the other league teams felt night games gave Wayne an advantage and would

not play them.

Pollack's goal came at the 11:28 mark of the third period on a pass from Chris Agoliati.

"I'm supposed to move up from fullback when there is an opening," Pollack said after game. "Chris (Agoliati) dribbled down the sideline and crossed the ball to me. I slid the ball under the goalie's legs

"Pollack will never get a bigger goal than that one," Cornell coach Dan Wood said after the victory. "This game has to help our ranking. If we're still 12th in the state next week the guys who vote
