


FOREWORD




There


Dear Seniors,

This autumn Wayne's cheerleaders were chosen from a number of worthy girls. The final selections elected Jean Miller and Carol Keeley as Varsity Captain and Co-captain, and Betty Suwijn and Cindy Van Hoover as J.V. Captain and Co-captain. These squads not only encourage better school spirit, but also promote high standards of sportsmanship. Also reorganized this year were the Girls' Leaders Club and girls' intramurals. Carol Keeley is president of this club, which revised its constitution, manages and encourages participation in girls' athletics, and aids the gym teacher as squad leaders. Helping her and Mrs. Wiegand, their advisor, are Vice President Jill Harris, Secretary-Treasurer Carol Tobin, and Intramural Chairman Jean Miller.

One of the most recent groups in our school is the Boys' Leaders Club. President Jim Henderson is assisted by Veep Bob Kelly, Secretary-Treasurer Kevin Cass, Intramural Chairman Bill Bridges, and Activity Chairman Rich Tobin. 
